WASHINGTON (AP) Republicans boycotted a hearing today by a new House intelligence subcommittee focusing on the Central Intelligence Agency's own secret probe of its misdeeds. The boycott forced cancellation of testimony by CIA Director William E. Colby. Subcommittee chairman James V. Stanton, D-Ohio, said the refusal of Republican members to attend the open hearing was "apparently prompted" by the resignation of Rep. Lucien Nedal, D-Mich., as chairman of the full committee.

Asked to turn over secret material in advance of anothermeeting of the subcommit planned for next week, Colby seclared: "I'll do it to the ex tent that I can and still protect he secrecy of the material."

Cancellation of Colby's testimony came shortly after Stanton declared that he knows of "successful assassination plots" but refused to identify any victims. A subcommitt member, Rep. Michael Har-rington, D-Mass., said he be-lieved Stanton's statement was based on "in-house gossip.

## Panel Says Aerosols May Cause Cancer, Hurt Atmosphere

WASHINGTON (AP) - The gas that propels underarm deodorants as well as many other sprays may damage the world's upper atmosphere and increase the risk of skin cancer, a federal task force warned today.

If so, it may be necessary to ban fluorocarbon, gas from those super-civilized cans of perosol deodorant, antiperspirant and hair spray, the group

The cosmetics themselves could be used. But if no other gas propellant could be used in these products, the cosmetics would have to be applied with roll-on applicators, tubes, flasks or hand-squeezed atomizers.

"There seems to be legitimate cause for serious concern," the panel concluded after a five-month review of wornings that first surfaced a year ago that fluorecarbon gas may demage the protective ozone layer in the upper atmosphere.

It recommended: -Immediate consideration of a requirement for labeling aerosol products using fluor--International cooperation on studies and perhaps control

of fluorocarbons. -Restriction of fluorocarbon tues especially in apray-case if ocarbons may contribute to

a more detailed study by the National Academy of Sciences confirms their suspected dan-

-And quick passage by Congress of a proposed Toxic Substances Control Act that would provide broad federal authority to regulate not only the fluorocarbons, but other possibly hazardous substances.

In response to the task force report, a group representing the aerosol fluorocarbon industry said "recent and potential discoveries and measurements of chlorine compounds in the atmosphere may ultimately invalidate the theory that fluorozone depletion. The Aerosol Education Bureau statement quoted a Du-

Pont Corp. research scientist, Richard Ward, as saying the government report "essentially concurs with the industry's position that there is no appreciable danger in continued use of fluorocarbon compounds while studies are completed." The task force, headed by the President's Council on Environmental Quality and the Federal Council for Science and Technology, said fluorocarbons present a classic example of society's ability to poison its environment on a global scale. by some seemingly trivial ac-

The fluorocarbons - generally chemical compounds of carbon, hydrogen, chlorine and fluorine - are commonly known as "Freen," one of their trade

The task force reported that some 13.8 billion pounds of two fluorocarbons known as F-11 and F-12 have been produced so far worldwide, excluding the Soviet-Eastern Europe bloc.

About half of the total was produced and used by the United States One way or another just

about all fluorocarbon eventually escapes into the atmosphere - sprayed, leaked or dis-

The task force said there is no complete proof, but substantial reason to believe, that once released the fluorocarbons work their way up to the stratosphere and break down there to release chlorine atoms.

The stratosphere is laced with onone, a three-storn form of oxygen which is rare among the two-atom oxygen of the lower atmosphere.

The task force said chlorine liberated by fluorocarbons in the stratosphere may break down ouone. A reduction of ozone may let more ultraviolet radiation through and the increased radiation may increase skin cancers throughout the







WASHINGTON (AP) - Jubal Hale, a federal official who listens to Beethoven records while drawing a \$19,693-a-year federal salary, says he's ready to start looking for another job.

Hale told a Senate committee Wednesday that he's had little else to do in his four years as executive secretary of the Federal Metal and Nonmetallic Safety Board of Review.

The Associated Press previously revealed that the board hasn't had a single case to re-view during those years. Hale told the senators he thinks Congress ought to abolish both the board and his post. ly as you can," Hale told the Senate Government Operations Committee, which is considering a bill by Sen. Charles Percy, R-Ill., to abolish the

Percy agreed, saying, "There has never been a clearer case for any one particular bureaucratic reform as the abolition of this review board.

The board was authorized by a 1966 act and went into operation in 1971 to hear appeals from noncoal mine operators ordered to shut down for violating federal safety standards. Although more than 3,000 such since 1971, none has ever been appealed to the board.

Hale testified that he has been trying to get the message across to Congress for some time that the board has nothing to do. He said once, in 1973, he was called before a House committee to justify the board's existence. But no one asked him any questions, Hale said.

He also said he has been aending annual one-page re-ports to Congress explaining that there's nothing to report.

"There's an element of sardonic humor in these reports,"

Hale claims that things are so slow at the office that he spends his time listening to Beethoven records and reading.

"Is there any reason to continue this board other than to improve your cultural life?" Percy asked.

"I don't think you've got any choice but to abolish the Hale said. "And I'll certainly have to look for other work.

Percy told Hale, "Your atti-tude is refreshing." Percy also said he hoped the official could continue to enjoy Beethoven-but at night, on his own time.

Acceptance by the Big Ten became a virtual certainty Tuesday when Michigan's athletic board of control voted to accept the plan. It was the sixth school in the 10-member league to vote affirmatively. A simple majority will be needed when the school presidents take the official action.

'The Big Ten Conference is in a process of individual ratification by its members with reference to playing in other bowls, Wiles Hallock, executive director of the Pacific-8 said Wednesday. "The Pacific-8

the Big Ten and the Pac-8 meet in the Rose Bowl game with no other teams from those conferences permitted to play in other bowls.

Michigan has been shut out of post-season activity the past three years despite a 30-2-1 composite record. Ohio State won the league title in the 1972-73 season. The past two years, a conference vote gave the nod to OSU when the Big Ten race ended in a tie for the title.

Big Ten leaders will meet Aug. 4 for final action. There is no meeting set for the presidents of the Pac-8 schools until December, but Hallock pointed out that ratification could come in one of several ways, including a vote by mail or a conference telephone call connecting all the school leaders.



## Black Immigrants Look In Vain For Promise Of America

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Speacers moved here from Lundon, thinking it would be good experience for their children to live in America. The experience has been a dangerous one, filled with fear and hatred.

It ripped the silence at 4:30 in the morning of New Year's Eve, blasting out the front windows and driving metallic fragments into the plaster of the

The family inside, Ormistan and Glenda Spencer and their three sons, are perfectly nice people. But nobody knew or cared. Someone just knew they were black.

This is not a story from the files of the Deep South of the 1950s. This is a present-day story, a New York City story of

Why here? Why now? Nobody knows for sure. Opinions abound. Some see it as an unfortunate incident - the work of a few nuts. Others see the violence against a black family as inevitable in a proud community that has worked hard to get what it has - a community that has tried to

stay white. It's been five months since the blast. The Spencers still live in their two-story, \$40,000 home. The parents, in their early 30s, commute to their midtown Manhattan jobs. She's a secretary, he's a production manager in a graphics shop. Their children attend nearby public schools. But it's not quite that serene.

Three men were arrested within days of the bombing. One was Michael Biggio, 29, who lived and still lives in Rosedale, a half-block from the Spencers. He's accused of masterminding the attack. The two others, both from Brooklyn, were hired to build the bomb, police say.

The first trial - involving Biggio and one other defendant started in May. The primary federal agency involved, the Bureau of Firearms, Tobacco and Alcohol, charged that antown Manhattan, Rosedale is a small community by New York City standards, mostly middle class with lots of blue collar workers and civil servants. The streets are lined with trees and two-family homes, mostly built after World War II.

Its citizens are still believers in the American dream and, by God, nothing is going to change Many moved here from neighborhoods that "turned,"

as they say. "Turned black," no one needs to add. The community watched as

neighboring communities

Albergo went door to door, talking to his neighbors.

"I told them to go and talk with a black man if he moved onto the block. Maybe he's a nice guy. Maybe he's not. Maybe he's a stiff and you're stuck with it. But I've known lots of white stiffs, too," says Albergo.

Rosedale officially deplores the Spencer Incident. But months after the incendiary device exploded, only two white couples had expressed their sympathy and support for the Spencer family.

"So what?" shrugs Albergo. This is the U.S.A. Nobody would beat a path of welcome if they were new and white." The citizenry is outraged about press coverage of the af-

"Not everybody who lives in Rosedale is a bigot," says Albergo. "Name me a comm that doesn't have a bigot or two. Rosedale is no different than any other community in the United States,"

In the wake of the Spencer incident, most Rosedale residents have made an informal pact not to talk to the press until there is something positive to report. To attempt to reach that positive position, about a dozen community leaders and leaders of human rights groups are meeting for what they call

Also in the wake of the Spencer incident came the forma-tion of a group called ROAR. At first it stood for the Rights Of All Rosedale and later it was changed to Return Our American Rights.

The leader of the Rosedale ROAR is Jerry Scala, manager of a plastics factory in nearby

Scala says the Block Associ-

ation is no longer doing the job it should. "He (Albergo) has heard too much preaching," save Scala,

Scala maintains that the community's support of ROAR is broad-based and he hopes to obtain 4,000 to 5,000 members. He now has 200 members. Originally from Brooklyn, Scala minces few yeards,

"We've got our quota blacks," says Scala, "ROAR hopes to awaken people to the fact that politicisms are not doing anything for the other ethnic minorities. We are fast losing our American rights.

A 1972 report by the New York Human Rights Commission said that conflict in Rosedale has been seething for a long time. It told of a 1971 incident in which 30 to 50 men and teen-aged boys vandalized a \$53,000 home because of a rumor that it had been sold to a black. It later turned out that two Chinese men had bought

WASHINGTON - Richard Nixon had \$33.35 left over, according to a confidential audit, from the \$100,000 that Congress granted him to cover his transition expenses. He managed to stay within the allotment, however, only because the government generously didn't charge him for the big expenses.

For instance, the taxpayers were stuck with \$265,580 in salaries for 54 federal employes who continued to work at the San Clemente compound. Among those whose salaries weren't charged to Nixon, as we previously reported, were his personal butler, maid, three chauffeurs and a medical corpsman.

In addition, eight Navy mess stewards worked at San Clemente during Nixon's adjustment to civilian status. The General Accounting Office, which conducted the confidential audit, offered this justification: "They were used primarily to dismantle the kitchen equipment," which had been installed for Nixon while he was President.

Nixon also should have paid rent for his office space at an annual rate of \$77,470. But under the law, the General Services Administration could waive the rent. He was granted such a waiver last August.

Of course, Congress never expected the Nixons to pay the annual \$622,000 cost of their Secret Service protection out of the transition budget. The GAO also decided that the government communications staff assigned to Nixon

furnishings which, the GAO suggested happily, "can be recovered when they are no longer needed." Not counted were five color tv sets, which the White House Communications Agency declared surplus and left to Nixon.

 An astonishing \$52,815.95 was spent for stationery. This bought "over 460,000 sheets, 260,000 envelopes and 20,000 each of three kinds of acknowledg with envelopes." Apparently, Nixon was stocking up for the future, since most of the stationery is still unused. Another \$12,000 went for postage.

- Nixon spent \$75, according to the audit, to change his safe combinations. He also paid \$896 for picturemounting supplies. These miscellaneous expenses were listed, curiously, as part of a \$9,430.37 expenditure for "record preservation and copying work."

 Another \$6,505.30 went to pay for news service teletypes, telephone service and connection charges. Nixon wasn't billed, however, for the three courier flights that brought him security briefings, although "some passengers and shouldn't be counted as a transition ex- some of Nixon's personal belongings were also on these flights."

A separate, confidential report, prepared for House Government Operations Chairman Jack Brooks, D-Tex., discloses that it cost the taxpayers \$118,076.93 to "deactivate" the Nixon compound at Key Biscayne, Fla.

This didn't include \$1,780 spent to improve Nixon's heating system, \$738.95 for wiring improvements, \$1,520 for sod and \$2,000 to prevent beach erosion. Nixon also was bequeathed, courtesy of the taxpayers, storm shutters worth \$1,081.20, a \$390.18 privacy screen and a \$119.75 washing machine.

An additional \$14,041.36 was spent security building that Nixon no longer wanted on his Florida property.

As part of the deactivation, the government spent \$10,800 to remove bulletproof glass and replace it with plate glass windows, \$6,604,57 to remove a screening hedge and \$15,950 to restore the walls around the compound.

From all the Nixon property, the government now has in its warehouses \$128,708 worth of bulletproof glass, a \$65,770 security fence, a \$314 seawall ladder, a \$125.95 boat trailer and assorted items of furniture running into the figure. thousands.

Some items have been transferred to other agencies. The Air Force claimed two Nixon beds worth \$269.80, two golf carts valued at \$3,030 and a five-gallon bottle stopper listed at \$3.05.

The General Services Administration got Nixon's famous \$621.50 toemaker. which produced square cubes "because the President doesn't like ice cubes with holes in them."

There is an important point here. The financial chicanery that led up to 1929 was private - watered stock, pyramided holding companies and other evices that since have been regulated. But this time, the transgressions have been in the field of public finance reckless spending, actuarial deceit, careless management, government mechanisms designed to evade legitimate debt restrictions. The public policymakers of the '60s and the Ballyhoo financiers of the '20s were not really all that different. Experts have reassured us that government programs protect us against recurrent bank failure, unemployment and impoverished old age. Perhaps, but who will protect us from the fallibility of public finance? It is a caveat worth remembering the next time politicians advocate spending as an economic cure.

## Ford, In Race To Stay, Has Family Pledge

By ROWLAND EVANS

And ROBERT NOVAK WASHINGTON - President Ford's private word at an intimate White House stag dinner that "the Ford family is solidly behind" his decision to run for President next year removed the last shred of doubt that his candidacy is for real.

In the upstairs family dining room, Mr. Ford told 10 Republican congressional leaders on May 20: "I don't care what anyone says, I am in this race to stay and the Ford family is solidly behind me." That was taken as a denial of con-

tinuing rumors - all unconfirmed that Mrs. Ford is not yet out of the woods from her cancer surgery last September and that her health was influencing Mr. Ford's 1976 intentions.

Also present were White House staff chief Donald Rumsfeld; Robert Hartmann, the President's most intimate White House aide; Dean Burch, temporary head of the Ford pre-convention organization; and David Packard, the wealthy former Deputy Secretary of Defense (now back in California as board chairman of Hewlitt-Packard) who will be finance chairman of the Ford presidential campaign.

In the two weeks since that cozy, unpublicized political chat ended all doubt about the President's commitment to run, Mr. Ford has had a string of political wins, including his European trip, sustaining his veto of the jobs bill, and defeating Senate attacks on military spending.
