





# Leadership, 'New Atmosphere' Cited For GOP Success In House

WASHINGTON — When it is time to vote in the House, an electronics counting machine lights up like a basketball scoreboard.

Each member votes by putting a card in a slot and pressing a button. Immediately, the vote is recorded on boards on either side of the chamber, showing the number of ayes

and nays. The totals change quickly, as in a fast moving ballgame.

The same board also records the time remaining for completion of the vote, which must be finished in 15 minutes. When Rhodes, the short, calm looking Republican leader who musters the votes to sustain President Ford's vetoes of Democratic programs. Four times this year, Rhodes

has stood by his desk watching the Democrats try for the two-thirds needed to override a veto. Four times, he has been a winner.

It has been a remarkable performance for Rhodes and the other Republicans who, last January, were at the bottom, damaged by scandal, badly beaten in the fall elections, led by an appointed President who was considered a weak and unenthusiastic occupant of the White House.

## FTC Soon To Announce Firm Will Stop Ads About Edible Plants

WASHINGTON — The Federal Trade Commission soon will announce that General Foods Corp. has signed a consent order which prohibits advertising claims that a plant is suitable for human consumption in its raw state where:

—The impression is conveyed that the plant was not actually cultivated for human consumption, or

—Where a raw plant — described as "wild" — is shown being eaten in the ad.

The provisionally adopted consent order stems from a proposed complaint challenging four advertisements for Post Grape-Nuts in which Euell Gibbons, the well-known author of books about wild plants, is shown picking and eating or pointing to certain wild plants and suggesting that the plants

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How have the Republicans done it? And have they helped their party and the President by their uncompromising opposition to Democratic bills designed to improve an ailing economy? Or have they built a record of negativism that will hurt Mr. Ford and other Republican candidates in 1976?

The Republican victories have come in the House of Representatives, where the GOP is outnumbered 289-145.

The main reasons for success have been capable leadership by Rhodes and others of a com-

pet, disciplined minority; weak leadership of the fragmented Democrats and the energetic work of President Ford, who is not the pushover the Democrats had expected.

"Well," said House Majority Leader Thomas (Tip) O'Neill Jr., "if I were leader of a party that controlled the White House, I wouldn't have any worries about anything coming down the line because you have everything from the President's Air Force No. one, two, three, four, five down to every piece of patronage and every piece of job and plus the prestige you know when the President of the U.S. calls you on the telephone, no matter how mighty you are in the Congress of the U.S., you are a little bit swelled with pride that you are in talking with the mighty, as the President is."

An example of the Ford telephone technique came during the fight over the President's veto of a \$5.3 billion emergency job bill, which was \$3.3 billion more than Ford wanted to

pend. He requested only money for public service government jobs for the unemployed and summer youth employment. The Democrats added funds for public works projects, small business loans and other federal programs.

Rep. Paul N. McCloskey, R-Calif., had told a liberal group in Santa Clara County, in his district, that he would vote to override the veto.

"But when he got back to Washington he started worrying about the Democratic job bill's expense. 'In the last campaign, and over the years, I had made a point of budget control,' he said."

Then on Wednesday, just before the vote, as McCloskey was talking in his office with Westinghouse broadcasting executives, the phone rang. It was President Ford, calling from Air Force One, on his way to speak at West Point. "It was the first time in eight years I had a call from a President," said McCloskey, who challenged Richard Nixon for the

mosphere of the House. In 1974, when McCloskey had a tough campaign, then Vice President Ford spoke for him in Santa Clara County at the risk of offending California conservative Republicans who do not like McCloskey.

McCloskey faced a dilemma. He had promised the folks back home to vote to override the veto. But the President was convincing. He decided to stick with Ford and uphold the veto.

A new atmosphere in the White House has also improved Republican unity.

Rep. Robert H. Michel of Illinois, the Republican whip who assists Rhodes in lining up votes, said that under Nixon, "you felt that if you had something to say in a negative way, you'd better not say it."

Although Nixon had served in the House and Senate, Michel said, he did not enjoy the give and take and maneuvering of Congress. Ford loves it.

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Sex, Age Did Not Matter—

# Female Assistant Opens Eyes Around Her

**WASHINGTON** — When President Richard M. Nixon visited Saudi Arabia in 1974, his wife Pat was not invited to the official dinner held in his honor. Instead, she was relegated to a separate function, for women only.

That was in keeping with the Arabian peninsula's stern traditions of separation of the sexes, which require women to spend most of their time in the home and to cover themselves head-to-toe in veils and robes when they leave.

But over the past nine months a 25-year-old woman who is an official of the U.S. Treasury Department has been bending those traditions with increasing regularity — and far from arousing the animosity of her hosts, she appears to be winning their approval.

In six trips to the Middle

East, Robin Cleary, a 1971 University of California graduate who got her first government job less than two years ago, has criss-crossed the oil-rich peninsula several times, visiting not only Saudi Arabia but Kuwait, Abu Dhabi and Qatar as well.

In those journeys, as part of a team of U.S. officials, she has attended innumerable meetings with Arab business and government leaders, mainly as a staff administrator but in some instances as the primary representative of the U.S. government.

Although there have been some rocky moments, such as hostile stares when she toured a village marketplace in Western dress or her exclusion from the most important meetings on her first trip to one country, Cleary has found increasing acceptance from

he spent 16-hour days at the side of William E. Simon, managing Simon's schedule as federal energy chief, fielding queries from Congress and the press, and serving as Simon's alter ego in a variety of administrative roles.

As a result, when Simon became treasury secretary last year, he made Parsky an assistant secretary, a \$36,000-a-year policymaking post that no one as young as Parsky, then 31, had ever before occupied in the Treasury.

"Readiness for responsibility is not determined by age," Parsky contends. "Experience is important, and experience usually comes with age. But young people are more likely to show creativity and they often have a lot more energy than their elders."

When the time came to pick his own assistant, Parsky decided that sex did not matter any more than age. "Robin was the most qualified person for the job," he said. "She was intelligent, very interested in what we were doing, and willing to work very hard."

For Cleary, working hard has meant — when she is not traveling — being at her desk by 8:15 in the morning and leaving when the last task is done — usually 12 to 13 hours later, sometimes not until midnight. Saturdays she works 9 to 5, and most Sundays she works afternoons.

At first the job was little more than an internship. Cleary went almost everywhere Parsky did, sitting in on his meetings, reading his correspondence, saying little and absorbing a lot. But gradually she took on administrative duties: suggesting action on government memos and replying to queries from the public, helping Parsky decide what meetings to attend and substituting for him as deputy assistant secretary, a \$36,000 post. (Cleary's own salary, after a recent hefty raise, is \$21,816.) When Parsky was preparing a speech seeking to calm public fears over investment of foreign oil money in U.S. banks and corporations, Cleary suggested he deliver it in Los Angeles because she felt concern was running particularly high in California on that issue. The forum chosen: The Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce.

Cleary's introduction to the Middle East and its antifeminist traditions came when Parsky was given command of the program aimed at increasing U.S. ties with Arab oil countries.

Under the program, Parsky has brought together specialists from the State, Treasury, Commerce and Transportation departments to provide technical assistance to these countries. In some cases, as with Saudi Arabia and Iran, special joint commissions have been set up for U.S. and foreign officials to exchange information. In others, Parsky and his aides have arranged for less formal contacts with U.S. technologists and businessmen.

The objectives: to accelerate industrialization in these countries, thus making them better customers for U.S. exports, and to expand the number and variety of personal contacts between their citizens and Americans, thereby helping calm the

hypertense atmosphere that currently surrounds relations between the United States and the oil producers.

As Parsky began to immerse himself in the problems of this program, so did Cleary.

When he was planning his first trip to the Middle East, she asked him why he was only going to countries with which joint commissions were being set up. Besides Saudi Arabia, she argued, other Arabian oil producers were important — particularly Kuwait, perhaps the most financially sophisticated of the Arab states.

As a result, Kuwait was added to the first trip and plans were made to visit Abu Dhabi and Qatar later. When it became clear that journeys to the Middle East were going to become a regular part of Parsky's routine, he decided that Cleary had become too important a member of his staff to be left behind.

Cleary admits she was apprehensive as she left on the first trip. But when the plane first flew into Riyadh, the

scalding capital city of Saudi Arabia with its flat-roofed houses and modest government palaces sprawling across the desert floor, she felt an immediate kinship.

"The first thing I thought of was Palm Springs," she recalls. "There weren't any golf courses, of course, but it was the same dry heat, the desert, the open air. People have land around them. They're not crowded in."

Establishing that kinship was not easy at first. It was not until her last day in Saudi Arabia, on that first trip, that she was invited to an official function. And the Saudis tended to ignore her when she was with the American party at less formal meetings.

But she worked at becoming accepted. She took care to wear dresses that came below the knee — to the floor in the evening — and her clothes were all high-necked and long-sleeved.

When Arabian officials visited Washington, temporarily doffing their burmesees for Western business suits, Cleary spent

hours arranging government briefings and other meetings for them.

On her next trip to their countries, she found that many of these men — back behind their own desks and re-attired in their traditional garb — accorded her more cordiality and respect. Thus, when Parsky was tied up with development ministers, he was able to assign Cleary to meet with bankers, without giving offense.

Parsky, Cleary and the others involved in their effort harbor few illusions about the extent of their success in improving the climate between the United States and the Middle Eastern oil producers. The price of oil, they acknowledge, is likely to be a source of tension for years.

But they believe it is important to dispel illusions that might increase those tensions and to smooth commercial and other ties between the two cultures.

"We were in Kuwait when the radio broadcast a report saying that the United States had threatened to bomb the Middle East if the price of oil did not come down," Cleary said. "A Kuwaiti official, a friend of ours, said he might once have believed the report. But knowing us and some other American officials he had met, he said he would wait for a later report."

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Arab officialdom.

"It has not been the kind of embarrassing situation for me that I feared it might be," she said. "I've been very pleasantly surprised."

On her more recent trips, she added, it has not been unusual for a burmese-cloaked official to lean toward her and murmur how he has sent his daughters abroad to schools and hopes they can ultimately assume government or technical jobs in his country.

When Robin Cleary went to work for the federal government last year, breaking down Arabian cultural barriers against women was the last thing on her mind. She started out in the Treasury Department's congressional relations office and then became "special assistant" to Assistant Treasury Secretary Gerald L. Parsky, who heads a little-noticed government effort aimed at increasing business, financial and technical ties between the United States and leading oil producing countries.

As such, she had embarked upon an uncertain route by which some newcomers to government — men as well as women — move into dull and routine areas of responsibility, while others work their way quickly into positions of significant influence or power.

A "special assistant," depending on the person's talents, chance opportunities and the attitudes of the official being assisted, can be assigned to such relatively trivial duties as being sure the secretaries type diligently and the coffee urn sizzlers dependably, or given responsibility for translating subtle administration policy to bankers, businessmen and diplomats.

In Cleary's case, the job has evolved in the latter fashion, partly because of her ability and partly because of Parsky's attitude.

Parsky, himself a graduate of such a job, argues that when used correctly, it can be one of the best possible training grounds. For more than a year

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# Hunter's Style Dish Featured

Everyone must be tired of hearing how economical and versatile chicken is, but it's true. And when company's coming for dinner, the red meat specials are nil, fish costs as much as sirloin and no one eats liver, what else do you suggest?

The following menu, serving six generously, features chicken in a simple but classic French dish, chicken chasseur or hunter's style. That type of dish is called a chicken saute, although the technique used really is braising. The chicken is browned in hot fat, then cooked in an aromatic liquid. The technique can be used with literally hundreds of different flavor combinations, but chasseur means that it has been cooked in a combination of mushrooms, tarragon, thyme, white wine and tomatoes.

There's no sit-down first course on the menu, but there are two appetizers that often become conversation pieces because they are as simple as they are different.

Radishes rarely are used on their own. They're mixed in salads and that's about it. So it can be a shock to see a bowl full of totally unadorned radishes. With a dab of cold, sweet butter and a pinch of coarse salt, however, radishes become an exciting new thing. Put the radishes in a bowl of crushed ice to keep them chilled, serve the butter in a small crock with a knife for spreading and put out a small bowl of coarse salt.

The other appetizer is fried chicken ravioli. Buy frozen ravioli, defrost them, then fry them in sufficient oil to cover. You can use a deep fryer, but you will use less oil if you do the frying in a deep skillet. The ravioli will cause the oil to splatter when they are first put in because the dough is damp, but using a mesh spider screen will keep that to a minimum. As soon as the ravioli are fried to a crisp brown, place them on a serving platter lined with an attractive paper napkin. Sprinkle them with salt (or have guests do it to their own taste) and serve within a few minutes. The ravioli filling will be too hot to eat immediately, but if the ravioli are held to long they lose their crispness.

For dessert, there's an incredibly rich, baked chocolate pudding with coconut and walnuts. The recipe makes more than the six servings you'll need, but chocolate lovers invariably crave seconds on this one.

**Dinner For Six**  
 Radishes with Sweet Butter  
 Fried Chicken Ravioli  
 Chicken Chasseur  
 Chocolate Ambraves  
 1. Put dry the chicken parts just before dinner time in a large bowl. Season with salt and pepper. Remove to a platter.  
 2. Wipe all the chicken is browned, add the sliced mushrooms to the skillet and cook over low heat until mushrooms begin to brown. Increase heat and cook until almost all the liquid has evaporated.  
 3. Add the chopped radishes and stir to combine. Sprinkle on the first and cook for about 2 more minutes.  
 4. Add the tarragon and both the thyme and bay to the skillet, stirring constantly. Add the tomatoes, tarragon, salt (or saute) (optional) and thyme. Season to taste with salt and pepper.  
 5. Arrange all the chicken back in the skillet, cover the top with the remaining liquid and cook for about 25 minutes or until chicken is done. (This meat piece probably will be done before dark meat. Remove when done.)  
 6. Remove chicken to a warm platter. If the sauce is not concentrated enough, boil it briefly, uncovered, for 5 minutes. Pour over the chicken and serve immediately. Makes 6 servings.  
**Sautéed Grated Zucchini**  
 1. Grate zucchini.  
 2. Sauté in butter.  
 3. Season with salt and pepper.  
 4. Sprinkle with cheese.

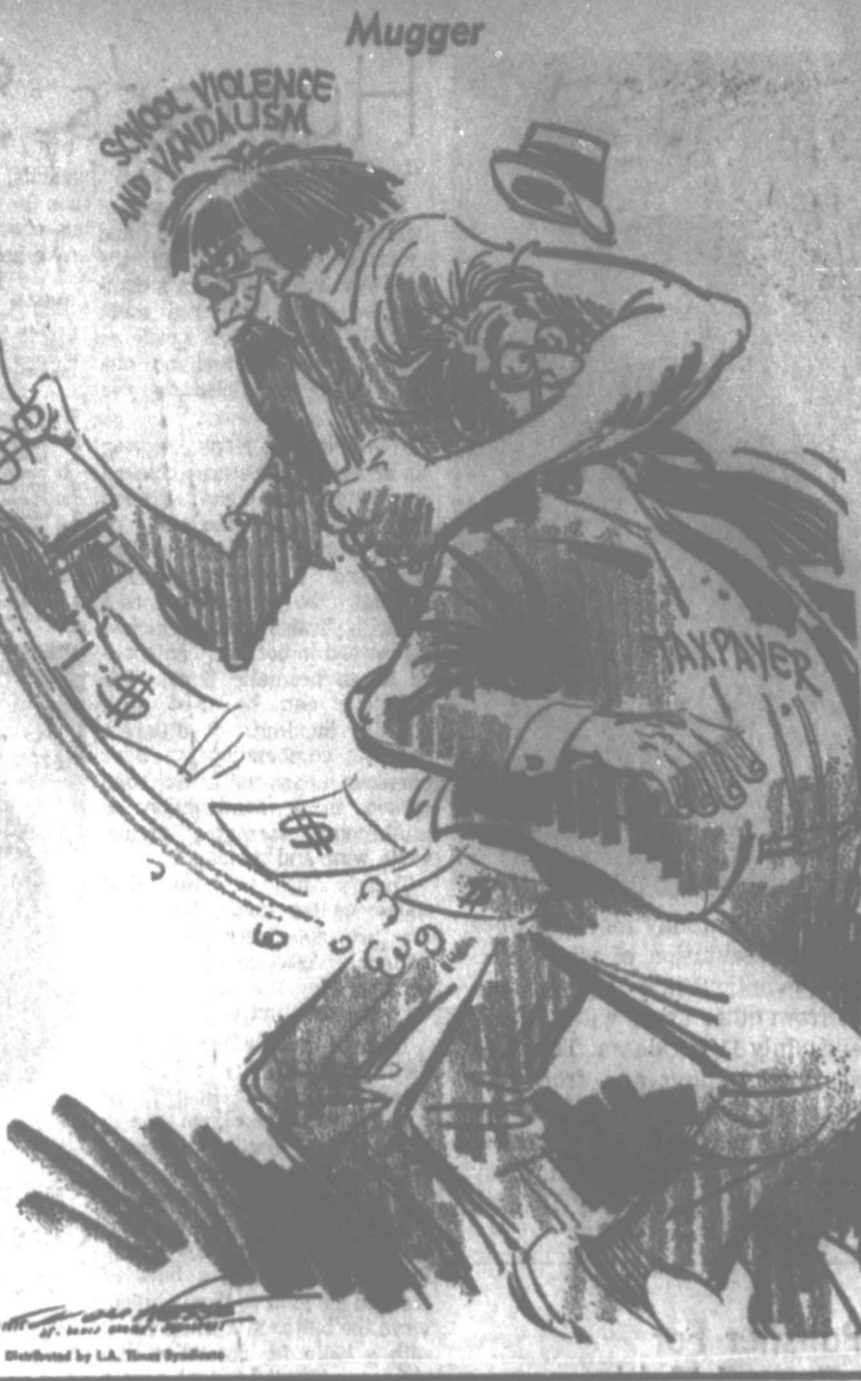

# Ashland Reports On Funds Transfer

NEW YORK (AP) — Ashland Oil, Inc., said today a company investigation of overseas financial practices revealed the questionable transfer of funds in three instances.

The three instances included payment of \$30,000 to a Nigerian consultant and a total of \$190,000 to two government officials in Gabon.

The company said the payment to the Nigerian official was "in connection with general business opportunities in that country." An Ashland official said that prior to the payment to the official in Gabon "he was advised by one of the officials that the monies would be used by both recipients for social welfare and public purposes."

As part of a consent decree filed with the Securities and Exchange Commission and a federal court last May, the Kentucky-based oil company agreed to investigate overseas cash transfers and disbursements which the SEC said had not been properly disclosed in the company's financial statements.

The announcement today was based on a report that the company said was delivered Thursday to a board of directors meeting in New York.

# Cost Estimate On Alaska Pipeline Up \$1 Billion Since September

The estimated price tag on the Alaskan oil pipeline has climbed nearly a billion dollars since last September and the estimated cost by a mid-1977 start-up date likely will jump higher.

Part of the nation's drive toward energy independence by 1985, the 800-mile Alyeska pipeline from the North Slope to the ice-free port of Valdez has run afoul of the same pitfalls that confront any huge construction project—the prospect of rising costs for labor, materials, equipment and food along the chain of construction camps bordering the twisting route south to the sea.

Additional costs likely will show up eventually in the price of Alaskan oil.

Unaccounted in the new estimate are allowances for contingencies and greater interest payments on the project designed eventually to channel two million barrels of oil daily to Valdez for shipment to the United States. At first the line will deliver only 1.2 million barrels a day, reaching peak capacity perhaps a year later.

Alyeska Pipeline Service Co. officials, representing the eight owner companies of the line, peg the estimate's new cost at \$8.375 billion, based on a review completed last April 30.

Last September the cost estimate was set at \$5.508 billion.

"Increases in the control estimate have resulted from construction experience since that date, improved definition (greater knowledge) of construction and support requirements and compression of the construction schedule to meet the planned July, 1977, start-up date," Alyeska officials explain.

Originally the pipeline was to have been completed no earlier than late 1977.

# Rail Commission Puts Off Decision On Gas Rates

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Railroad Commission was expected to wait until next week, possibly Monday, to tell Lone Star Gas Co. how much more—if anything—it can charge its 4 million residential customers.

City attorney Alex Bickley of Dallas told the three-member commission Thursday that Lone Star was favoring industrial customers at the expense of the individual.

He said the company had better beware of a possible "up-

raising" by householders.

On May 2, the commission tentatively allowed the company to raise its natural gas distribution charges by 8.83 cents to 94.19 cents per thousand cubic feet.

"We're satisfied with the order like it is—we don't want any change," said Bickley.

Lone Star, however, has asked the commission for an increase to \$1.21, or about 47 cents more than it estimates it is paying for a cubic foot of gas.

Lone Star lawyer W. D. Weisbrach said any commission order would affect the 470 cities the company serves.

He said the commission had not fully reviewed Lone Star's facilities and rates since 1969, and since then the company has spent \$80 million on a West Texas pipeline and \$37 million searching for new gas reserves.

Because of rising gas costs and inflation, he added, "We have never earned the return the commission intended us to earn."

"The (gas) system was designed to serve the residential customer," he said, "and it's discrimination if the (individual) consumer doesn't meet his fair share of the costs."

Bickley and city attorney S. G. Johnson of Fort Worth represented their cities and others in the Texas Utilities Advisory Council, which is opposing Lone Star's request.

Bickley said residential consumption of gas increased by 26 per cent from 1964 to 1973, while industrial use increased 123 per cent and "electric generating systems by more than that."

But he said industry and the generation were getting "all the benefits" of lower rates.

He noted that the cities had estimated Lone Star's rate base at \$143.6 million but Lone Star had pegged it at \$288 million. The figure is important because

the commission uses it in determining a "fair value" rate of return on the company's investment.

"The higher the rate base the higher charge to the domestic consumer," said Bickley.

Weisbrach said he was wrong, that the company had used a rate base of \$217 million in its application for a rate increase.

"Energy is a precious commodity," said Bickley, "but it is far more precious to the individual—for life itself—than to a customer who will make a product out of it."

Bickley presented a proposed gas rate order which he said contained an "unusual fee-

ture." It would require 16 cities to pay an extra four cents per thousand cubic feet of gas to Lone Star to pay off money the company claims they owe.

The charges arose when the commission permitted Lone Star to "pass through" higher gas costs on gas purchased by Lone Star from Lo-Vac Gas Co., but the 16 cities refused to pay.

The cities and the amounts—compiled by Lone Star—are Galveston \$47,260; Saint Jo \$3,960; Mexia \$18,721; Boham \$25,470; Sulphur Springs \$37,690; Irving \$275,894; Flower Mound \$1,730; Watauga \$9,531; Granbury \$9,828; Burkburnett \$27,145; Electra \$13,308; Quanah \$17,898; Vernon \$44,692; Wellington \$15,413; Wichita Falls \$263,950; Lewisville \$26,537; Richardson \$178,308; and Grand Prairie \$144,388.

After the money is paid, Bickley said, the four-cent differential would be eliminated. He said the cities had agreed to pay the temporary extra charge.

## Federal Agents Easing Efforts To Track Down Bootleggers Of Illegal Fireworks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal agents are easing their efforts to track down bootleggers of illegal firecrackers this Independence Day season.

Mary K. Ryan, acting director of the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission's bureau of compliance, explained that last year's surveillance activities were fruitless.

"We didn't produce many undercover buys. A couple, no more," she said. The commission enforces the federal law

against the sale of certain fireworks.

A June 6 memorandum from the agency to regional offices directs investigators to spend only half as much time as they did during the last Fourth of July season in contacting fireworks dealers and attempting to make undercover purchases of contraband explosives.

However, most states have laws regulating the sale or possession of fireworks. State and local officials enforce those laws.

The commission has esti-

mated that 6,000 Americans were treated in hospital emergency rooms in 1973 for fireworks-related injuries. But manufacturers of legitimate fireworks contend that many serious injuries are caused by big, illegal firecrackers or homemade devices.

The National Safety Council, urging parents to be vigilant to protect children, said more persons have died in fireworks accidents in U.S. history than were killed in the Revolutionary War.

## Guadalupe Park Lists Fire Curbs

The restrictions ban smoking while traveling on backcountry roads and trails and open wood fires in the community fire circles at the Pine Springs and Dog Canyon campgrounds.

Charcoal fires confined to metal grills provided at the Pine Springs campgrounds are still allowed, Crisman said, as well as contained fuel stoves.

Backpackers must obtain permits for overnight trips into the back country, Crisman said, and must camp only in one of the park's seven designated back country campgrounds.

## Offshore Panel Says Job Completed

HOUSTON (AP) — The Texas Offshore Terminal Commission, created three years ago to develop a plan for construction of a desalwater offshore terminal, has voted itself into permanent adjournment and asked that the commission be dissolved.

The commission passed a resolution Thursday which said the group "has completed the work for which it was created" and then requested that the governor and the legislature dissolve the commission.

The commission submitted a report to the legislature which recommended that a desalwater terminal be built 29 miles offshore from Freeport. The re-

port suggested the development be financed by tax-exempt bonds guaranteed by terminal users.

The legislature has not taken action on the recommendation. Commission Chairman Joe Albritton was not at the meeting but said in a statement that the commission staff will liquidate its assets and close its office by Aug. 31.

Albritton said the commission should be able to return about \$60,000 to the state treasury. The state legislature created the commission with a \$60,000 budget.

J. E. Mims, vice president of Seadock, Inc., a consortium of

oil companies planning to build a Texas offshore petroleum unloading facility, said his group plans to apply for a construction permit as soon as possible.

Mims said the Interstate Commerce Commission is in the process of drawing up regulations for desalwater ports, but that it will be late this year before the commission is ready to accept applications.

Mims said it would be about the third quarter of 1976 before construction could begin.

The Seadock facility, Mims said, was first expected to cost about \$417 million but "you're rapidly approaching double that from just inflation alone."

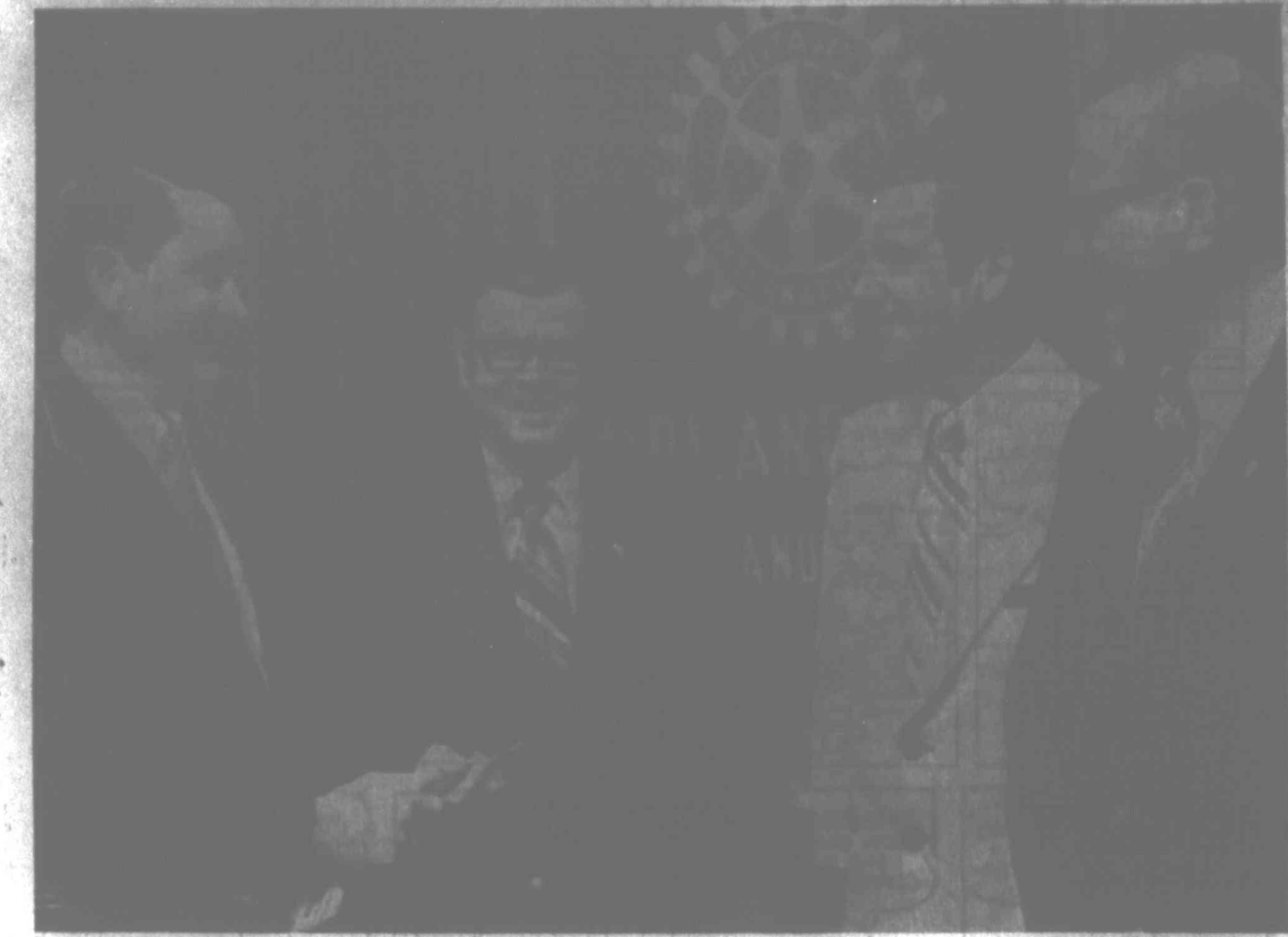

An Indian in the house was reported killed in an exchange of gunfire, but it was not known when he was killed.

## Nessen Says He, Staff To Work On Ways To Improve Briefings

WASHINGTON (AP) — White House Press Secretary Ron Nessen says that he and his press office staff will spend the weekend at Camp David, Md., working on ways to improve the White House press briefings.

The disclosure came after a briefing Thursday during which Nessen sharply criticized unnamed newsmen for "blind, mindless, irrational suspicion and cynicism and distrust" and threatened to discontinue his daily news briefings in their present form.

At the briefing, Nessen said in what obviously was a prepared statement: "I think some people here are too quick to make unsubstantiated charges or implications that I am lying or that my credibility has been destroyed..."

He went on to say that "in the present atmosphere" he felt the daily briefings were not adequately serving their purpose of relaying information to the American people.

Nessen said he has discussed possible changes in briefing procedures with some of his aides and with unnamed members of the press corps.

He declined to say what revisions might be considered.

Meeting with newsmen later at their request, he said, "We are considering making a better atmosphere here at the White House and opening it more than that is."

He told reporters, "We really are not considering abolishing the briefing. We never really considered it."

### Uganda Arrests More Britons

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — President Idi Amin has arrested "some more Britons" to be taken before a military tribunal, the Uganda government radio announced today.

The broadcast from Kampala said they "will possibly face the same trial as Denis Hills because their cases are even worse than that of Hills."

Amin sentenced Hills, a 61-year-old British teacher and lecturer, to death for describing the Ugandan president as a village tyrant, in an unpublished manuscript. Amin has said he will spare Hills' life only if British Foreign Secretary James Callaghan comes to Uganda, but Callaghan says he will go only if Amin first removes the death sentence.

Miss Westbrook will attend Midland College, and Brown plans to enroll in Texas A&M University.

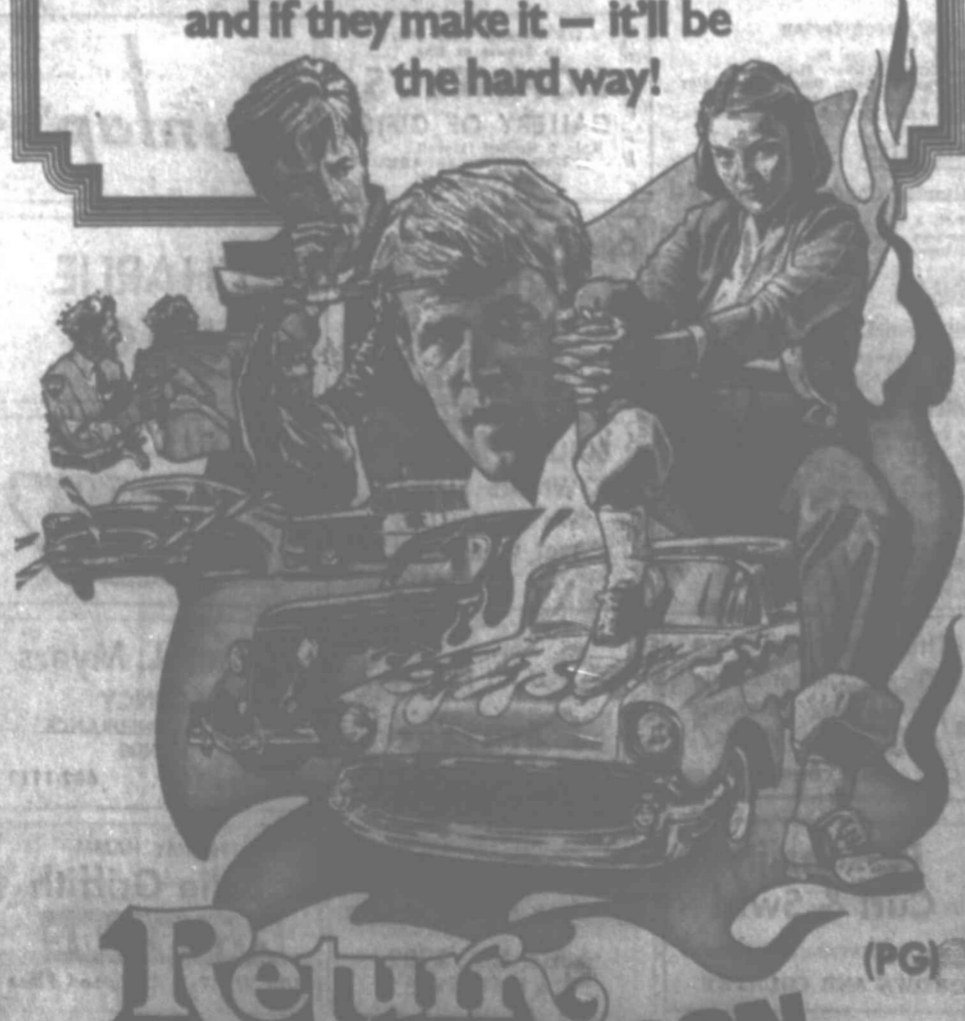

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# 4 Newsmen Reject Kissinger's Offer To Be Press Spokesman

WASHINGTON (AP) — At least four newsmen, three of them correspondents at the State Department, have turned down offers to become Henry A. Kissinger's press spokesman.

In one case, the secretary of State telephoned the reporter's boss, appealing that he be granted a leave of absence. The appeal was rejected after Kissinger conceded the national interest was not at stake.

Note Kissinger appears to be edging toward Robert Funnell, a career foreign service officer who has served for several months as the deputy to Robert Anderson, the current and third spokesman since Kissinger be-

came secretary in September 1973.

Anderson, an ex-ambassador to Dahomey, is waiting for another overseas post. He agreed to take the spokesman's job for a year and is now more than two months past that point.

Funnell has had some brief experience with newspapers and news agencies in California. Over the last few months he has been conducting the daily press briefing once or twice a week.

Looking for a replacement for Anderson, Kissinger first approached Ted Koppel of ABC, then Richard Valeriani of NBC, and, afterward, Jeremiah O'Leary of the Washington Star

and Smith Hempstone, former chief editorial writer for the Star.

Koppel, Valeriani and O'Leary cover the State Department regularly and are members of the self-styled "Kissinger 14," the group of 14 reporters who have flown with him on "shuttle diplomacy" in the Middle East and on other long trips.

All gave the offer long consideration but finally decided against it. Among their collective reasons were a reluctance to leave journalism, the physical demands of the job and uncertainty that they would have sufficient access to Kissinger.

Hempstone reportedly told a Kissinger talent scout that he wanted to write a book instead.

The spokesman when Kissinger became secretary of State was Charles Bray. Loyal to William P. Rogers, the outgoing secretary whom Kissinger frequently overshadowed, Bray immediately moved to another job in the public affairs office.

To fill that vacuum, Kissinger called on Robert J. McCloskey, then the U.S. ambassador to Cyprus who had served as spokesman in the past. McCloskey stayed through the 1973 Arab-Israeli war and some disengagement diplomacy, then moved up to be ambassador-at-large.

In came George S. Vest, a polished diplomat who had specialized in NATO and European affairs. He lasted six months after trying earnestly and only partly successfully to keep the press informed. Occasionally, Vest drew on his own knowledge when unable to see Kissinger, sometimes thereby straying from the department's position.

He is now director of the department's bureau of political and military affairs.

# 35 Northern Ireland Children In U.S. For Vacation From War

ST. CLOUD, Minn. (AP) — Far from the bombs and bullets of Belfast's strife that have brought terror to his childhood, 11-year-old Paul Stewart stepped off a bus in St. Cloud. There was no one there to meet him, and he cried.

Paul was one of 35 children from Northern Ireland who arrived in America Thursday for a six-week vacation away from their war-plagued homes in Northern Ireland.

Due to a mixup, Paul had missed his stop on the bus that was delivering some of the children to sponsoring families in Minnesota.

"I wasn't really scared," he insisted. "I just didn't know what to do."

A short time later, everything was straightened out and Paul was sharing a breakfast of omelette and orange juice with some of the 13 children in the Red Mulvaney family of Elk River, Minn.

St. Cloud was the end of a journey that started Wednesday night in London for the 35 children. Their airplane landed in Winthrop early Thursday morning. One child was left with a Canadian host family while the remaining children and their two chaperones boarded a bus for the United States.

"The children are very, very tired," said Sarah Hughes, the Belfast mother who has been the main organizer behind the summer vacation. One of her sons was killed by a bomb in Belfast several years ago.

"I thought of my own children, and I just had to get these children out of Belfast," she said. "Some of these children are very deprived. Most of them came from the war area in Belfast."

Mrs. Hughes said she and the National Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Children chose the children, mostly ages 9 to 12, who made the trip. She said all the children come from working class homes.

"I read in the papers that some of their family had been killed," she said. "And I went to visit their homes to see if they'd like to get away from the war for the summer."

She pointed at one boy and said, "The father of this wee one was a policeman who was shot."

Mel Sinderson, a retired Navy man who lives with his wife Shirley and three children in Mounds View, Minn., had many plans for his guest, 10-year-old Michael Crawford.

"We're going to fish, play baseball and work in the garden," he said. "I've got a Little League team I coach."

Last year a service club sponsored a program which brought children from Northern

Ireland to stay with families in the Upper Midwest. This year the club decided to channel its efforts into a recreation center in Northern Ireland, but Mrs. Hughes and others perpetuated the old program by finding individual sponsors.

# Magazine Pays Settlement To Heroine In Attack

JERUSALEM — Time magazine has paid a \$13,333 out-of-court settlement to the heroine of the Savoy Hotel terrorist attack, the woman's lawyer said Thursday.

In its March 17 edition, the news magazine characterized Kochava Levy, 31, as a prostitute and said that she had ducked into the Savoy Hotel the night of March 5 moments before the terrorist attack in order to avoid a police sweep of streetwalkers.

Tel Aviv lawyer Ayre Marinsky said the magazine issued no retraction or apology to his client because he had asked for none.

"I wanted something to make Kochava's life a little better," he said.

Marinsky said that the settlement was four times greater than any libel award ever made in an Israeli court.

The Time magazine office in Jerusalem had no comment.

Mrs. Levy, wife of a policeman and mother of a 7-year-old daughter, said she might put the money into a savings account for her child for she might purchase an apartment.

During the terrorist episode, Mrs. Levy was one of nine hostages held in the waterfront hotel by the Arab commandos.

She alone was able to speak with them because she knew Arabic and she attempted in vain to negotiate the release of the hostages.

# Mathews Says HEW Post Hard, Thankless Task

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (AP) — Dr. F. David Mathews, nominated to be secretary of health, education and welfare, says he hopes the public realizes "what a hard and often thankless task this post has become."

Mathews, 39-year-old president of the University of Alabama, made the comment at a news conference shortly after President Ford sent his name to the Senate for confirmation.

He would succeed Caspar W. Weinberger, who resigned, reportedly to return to California because of his wife's health. Weinberger has been mentioned as a possible GOP gubernatorial candidate in that state.

Mathews, who would be the seventh Cabinet member chosen in Ford's 10-month-old administration, said he hoped it was clear that he did not seek the nomination — "It is rather a draft to assume an extremely difficult assignment, and it should be remembered that the nomination must be confirmed by the Senate."

But Mathews also said, "I am honored by President Ford's personal confidence in me and pleased that he himself brought my name into this matter."

HEW, which spends one out of every three federal dollars, is beset by money problems. Colleges and universities are seeking more aid, health costs are soaring and welfare rolls are at an all time high.

Mathews, who has been president of the 13,000-student university since 1969, said he would seek a leave of absence from the school's board of trustees while serving in the Ford administration.

# Title Fight Gloves Are Put In Jail

**KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP)** — Two pairs of bright red eight-ounce boxing gloves spent the night in sealed boxes behind the high walls of central prison.

"I been fighting 20 years and I never saw them put no gloves in jail before," Muhammad Ali said. Heavyweight champion Ali and British challenger Joe Bugner had selected the gloves they will wear in Tuesday's title fight. Security for the gloves is as strict as for everything else involving the match.

Four gloves gotta go to jail," Ali chuckled. "Boy, you sure are careful over here."

Organizers of the first battle for the heavyweight crown in this part of the world are tightening the security screen as the contest nears. Extra guards were posted Friday at Merdeka Stadium and casual visitors barred.

Security at the mid-morning bout on July 1 will be as rigid as for any single event in this country's troubled history, a police source said. The usual

measures to control crowds and protect the boxes are being extended.

Special seating arrangements are planned to keep the throng from getting too close to his majesty, known as the Yang Di-Pertuan Agung, or Paramount Ruler. King Tunjoo Abdul Halim Mu'Adzam Shah Idris Al-Mertuan Sultan Badlishah, 46, is a lame duck, his five-year term expiring on Sept. 21.

A new constitutional monarch and deputy were elected by the country's nine royal houses last

week. It was not known how much royalty would see Ali vs. Bugner, but at least one Sultan was expected in addition to the king.

Uniquely Malaysian security problems are posed by communal stress between the Muslim majority and the Chinese minority and by the Communist underground.

Devout Black Muslim Ali may inadvertently rouse communal feeling, one diplomat said this week. Ali prays at local mosques each Friday and

has delivered several fervent lectures on the goodness of Islam and how Allah helps him in the ring.

Swarms of Ali fans come mostly made up of Malay Muslims. Bugner followers include more Chinese and other non-Malay citizens.

The organizers have taken special pains to have Bugner visit Muslim schools and get Ali photographed with Chinese school children, the diplomat said.

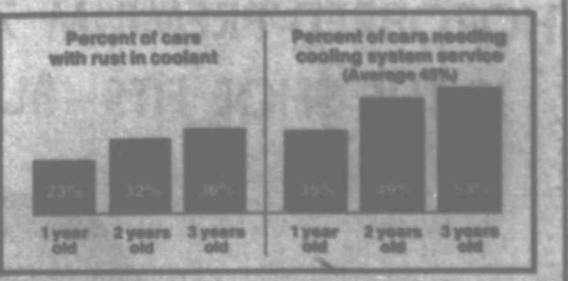

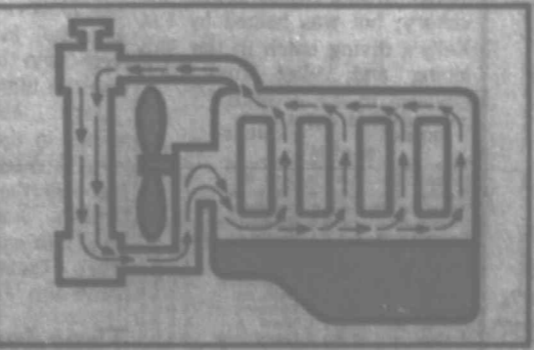

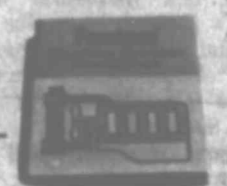

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# Federal Executives Told How To Get Around Civil Service Laws

WASHINGTON — Forty key federal executives attended a secret, four-day seminar set up by the White House in January 1973 where they were lectured, shown charts and given detailed instructions on how to get around civil service laws to place "politically responsive" people in important career government jobs.

The secret briefings at the Executive Office Building, next door to the White House, were confirmed Thursday in congressional testimony by two former Nixon administration aides who attended all or part of the seminar sessions. The two men, Robert Davison and W. Stanley Armstrong, held responsible political jobs at the White House and actively within their career personnel systems.

Both men were called by the House Manpower Subcommittee and later, Housing and Urban Development. All three of those agencies have been investigated by the Civil Service Commission which found varying degrees of irregular, or illegal, political activity within their career personnel systems.
