Lario Completes King Producer

The Gar-Kent (Strawn) field of King County gained its second producer and a 3-mile east extension, with completion of Lario Oil & Gas Co. Midland No. 1 J. N. Selt reentry operation, 21 miles northwest of Claremont.

It gauged a 24-hour pumping potential of 55 barrels of 28.4 gravity oil and 23 barrels of water with gas-oil ratio of 255:1. Production was through perforations at 7,257-7,278 feet natural.

Originally drilled by Nova Equipment Co., it was abandoned in 1953 at 6,149 feet.

Senate Sets Amount Of Decontrolled Gas

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate accepted a proposal today to delay for several years the major consumer price increases expected to follow removal of federal controls from the price of natural gas.

The amendment by Sen. John V. Tunney, D-Calif., approved on a 56-40 vote, limits the amount of natural gas that would be freed of controls. However, even with the Tunney amendment, the price of all gas would be allowed to rise moderately.

Tunney estimated his amendment could save Americans \$5 billion on their gas bills by 1980.

Moving toward final passage of far-reaching natural gas legislation, the Senate also planned to vote today on two amendments that would force big oil gas companies to divest some of their energy holdings.

The gas bill has two major sections. One is designed to avert a predicted gas shortage this winter. The other sup-

ported by most Republicans deregulation the gas would be freed of controls forever once a contract expired. Most gas is purchased by pipelines from producers under contracts that average about 10 years.

The bloc of Republicans and energy-state Democrats has known several times that it has the votes to deregulate or to move price controls.

The Republican proposal would end controls immediately on new gas produced from this winter after Jan. 1, 1976. Controls would end on existing reserves, including a several gas offshore gas reserves, after a 2-year period.

Under this plan, the huge increase in natural gas prices now under contract as well as American homes, schools and factories would be allowed to rise this winter at field rates. The price could be six or seven times as high as the current rate of about 32 cents per cubic foot.

The Federal Energy Administration ordered the industry to keep the gas under control for a 4 percent increase, which would be a third of the price of a winter shortage.

Peking Toast Chilly Rather Than Warm

Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger and Chinese Foreign Minister Chiao Kuan-hua exchanged chilly toasts tonight at a banquet marking the end of the American official's visit.

Kissinger, who was the host of the concluding dinner, said that "We are satisfied with our visit." He then told the Chinese the way to better relations was through respect for each country's national interest.

"This is useful," he said. Chiao spoke for less than two minutes, including translation, and was markedly formal.

The lack of warmth came as a surprise since U.S. officials had indicated earlier they expected an improved atmosphere compared to a dinner given Sunday by the Chinese.

At that affair, Chiao lectured Kissinger on the dangers his government sees in the U.S. policy of détente with Russia.

The dinner tonight, which was held in the Great Hall of the People, had been the last scheduled event before Kissinger was to depart Thursday.

WASHINGTON, AP — The House today passed a bill to lift political restrictions on federal employees, more than the two-able government workers. The bill would allow federal employees to run for political office, but it would not allow them to hold office while still employed by the government. 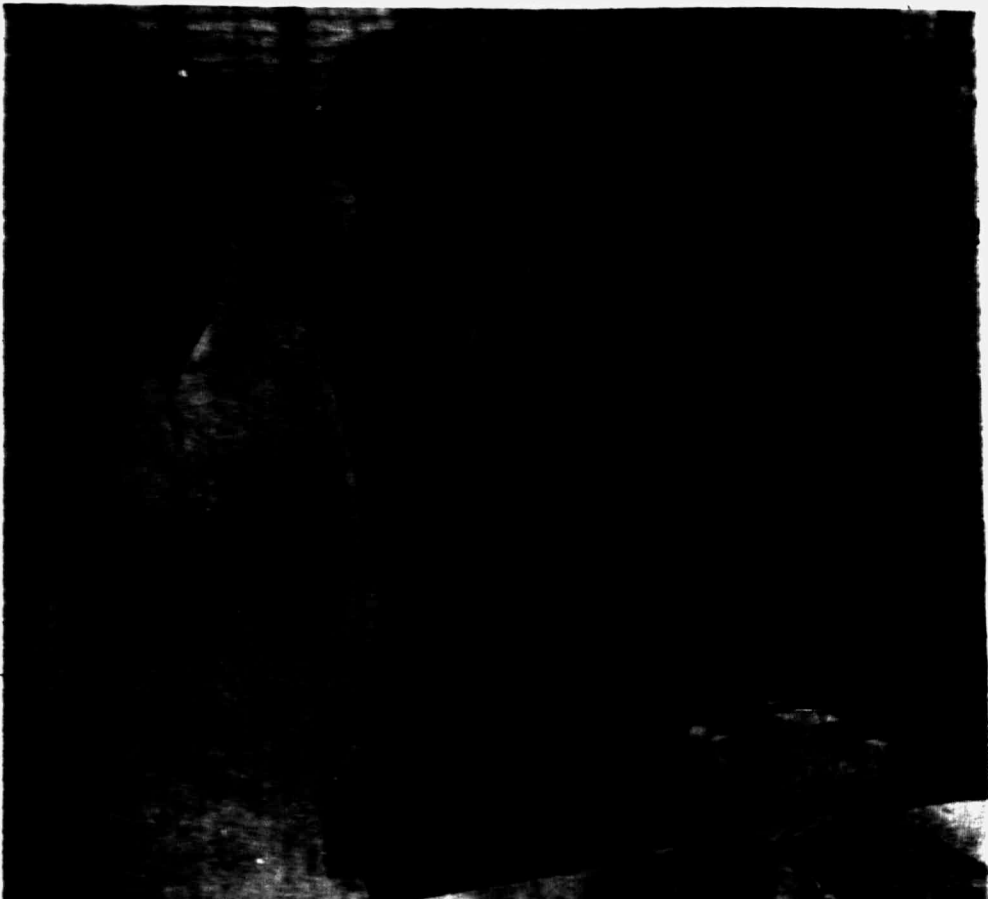

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

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — President Ford has been ordered to give a video tape deposition as a defense witness during the trial of Lynette Fromme, who is accused of attempting to assassinate him.

place convenient for the President.

MacBride ordered that Ford's testimony be taken within 10 days. Asst. U.S. Atty. Donald Heller said he expected to hear from the White House on the order by Friday.

Miss Fromme's court-appointed counsel, John Virga, said Ford might be able to refute statements by other witnesses that the gun checked as

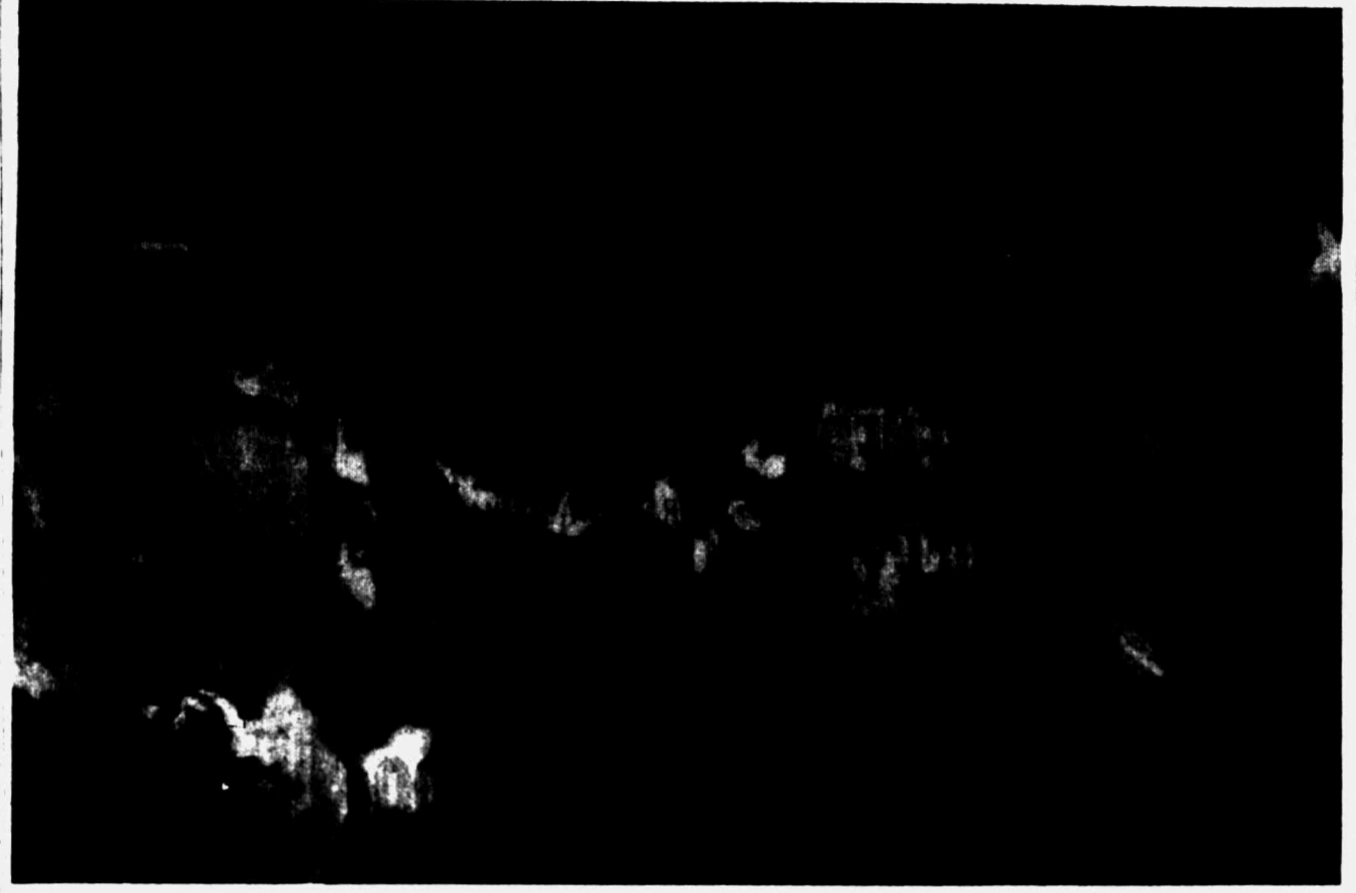

The Armenian region formed a large part of the old Ottoman Empire and is now divided among Turkey, Iran and the Soviet Union. The Armenian minority in Turkey was subject to widespread persecution early in this century.

The dead man was one of Turkey's leading diplomats. He searched for the getaway car and had been ambassador to Vienna since November 1973.

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Laos Independence Celebrations Fulfillment Of Dream

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP) — Independence day celebrations in Laos this month marked the fulfillment of a dream by Ho Chi Minh in a North Vietnam's late revolutionary leader Ho Chi Minh — to dream of a Communist Indochina. The celebrations also cemented the power of the Pathet Lao over the country. The 30th anniversary festivities saw the emergence of the Lao People's Revolutionary Party and its leader, Kayson Phomvihane, a 55-year-old revolutionary with strong ties to North Vietnam.

The real focus of the celebrations was the Pathet Lao capital of Vieng Xay, where top Communist leaders from North Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos met in a mini-summit which appeared to demonstrate solidarity among the three Indochina states.

Since the Communist victories in Indochina last spring, Cambodia, North and South Vietnam and Laos each have shown a strong interest in maintaining their national independence. Cambodia's close ties to mainland China and the preference of Vietnam and Laos for the Soviet Union also demonstrated that the four countries would not, in many cases, act with unanimity.

But the Vieng Xay meeting — according to a number of West-

ern observers — stressed the common origins of these revolutionary regimes which can be traced to the formation of the Indochinese Communist party by Ho Chi Minh in a Hong Kong soccer stadium in February 1930.

Prince Souphanouvong, the nominal leader of the pro-Communist Pathet Lao, stressed these origins in his remarks commemorating the unsuccessful full declaration of independence from France after World War II.

"Our Lao people are extremely proud and jubilant to have been under the clear-sighted leadership of the ICP," he said. "Now the Lao People's Revolutionary party has also written pages of wonderful history."

Most Lao people were previously unaware of the party and before this anniversary almost none could identify its leaders, except Souphanouvong, who was overshadowed by Kayson Phomvihane, a 60-minute keynote speech in Vieng Xay and Phouma, the ailing 74-year-old neutralist who in name only heads the Lao government as

Western observers say Souphanouvong, half brother of Prince Phouma, is anxious to retire, having seen the fruition of his life-long dream of a peaceful unified Laos. The observations feel that he will probably go abroad after the general elections, scheduled for next April. The future role of King Savang Vatthana is less clear. The Pathet Lao's 18-point political program stresses respect for the throne, and in political seminars people are told that the 68-year-old monarch will stay.

But one American diplomat said the king was "inconsistent" with the Communist system. The king reportedly retains his conservative and basically anti-Communist views, but he is respected by the Pathet Lao, a Western diplomat said.

Meanwhile, relations between Laos and the United States are cool, although most Western observers say diplomatic ties between the two countries will remain intact.

"There appears to be a mutual misunderstanding," Western diplomat said of U.S. relations with Laos. Kayson's address noted that continued relations with the United States would depend on America's willingness to "heal the ruins of war" in Laos.

Responding in private to that statement, one U.S. diplomat

said, "If that's the case we should be out of here tomorrow." Laos didn't sign the Paris agreements which were designed to bring peace to Vietnam and Indochina and U.S. law prohibits giving aid to countries who have confiscated our property. We are not bound to honor the Paris accords which North Vietnam blew sky high and violated in the greatest fashion."

The 22 American officials and six Marines guarding the U.S. Embassy appear isolated. One U.S. official said the Embassy would like to wipe the slate clean and start again on a new relationship with Laos, but that U.S. laws prevent it.

The Pathet Lao did not seem overly concerned with its ties to the United States. Its primary concerns are organization, mobilization and re-education of the three million people of Laos.

The population, especially in the towns, has been organized into groups and committees based on occupation or living units. These groups engage in political seminars and work details to clean up or improve their areas of responsibility.

For the past month, thousands of people in Vientiane have been cutting grass, unplugging drains and generally cleaning the capital on weekends. Longtime residents here say there is a new spirit among the people, who see themselves

as participating in productive work and the political decision-making process. Some people who did not flee the country in the said, "I don't know how to plant rice or weave bamboo. I want to go to California but we are not allowed to leave." But for most of the more than two million subsistence farmers and hill tribespeople, life revolves around the soil and is expected to change little. Small-scale, widely scattered rice agriculture does not lend itself to collectivization.

Judiciary Article Sole Reason Many Back New Constitution

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is another in a series of nine stories prepared by The Associated Press on the proposed new state constitution that will be voted on Nov. 4. This article discusses the provisions concerning the judiciary.

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas needs judicial reform so desperately that many top officials support the new constitution principally because of its simplified judiciary article.

But included among the critics of the article are a few heavyweights, including the presiding judge of the state's highest criminal court, John E. Onion Jr.

Reform is needed, says Onion, but he is not in a hurry to support it.

Texas Supreme Court Chief Justice Lee Greenhill, however, says it does.

How can a water make up his mind when the state's top two judges differ? Especially when they use the same language to justify their positions?

Here is Onion: "It's not necessarily the punishment but the swiftness and certainty of punishment. I believe that deters crime. What good are speedy trials if you don't have speedy punishment?"

Greenhill, who presides over the state's highest criminal court, says his main opposition is to the loss of his title as presiding judge.

The main features of the judiciary article are the merger of the Supreme Court and the Court of Criminal Appeals and the creation of a unified judicial system under the administrative control of the Supreme Court.

The five criminal appeals judges, and the court's two special commissioners, would become Supreme Court judges, raising the total from nine to 16. Death and retirement will drop it back to nine.

So Onion wouldn't be out of a job, just a title.

"I'm not sure there's that much difference between being an associate justice on the Supreme Court and being presiding judge on the Court of Criminal Appeals," he said.

Onion argues that criminal appeals will be prolonged, not speeded up by giving the 14 courts of civil appeals criminal jurisdiction and allowing the Supreme Court to hear appeals from those intermediate courts.

The time it will take for the top court to decide whether or not to take a case, added to the time needed to write opinions on those it accepts, will clog up the criminal docket worse than it is now, Onion says.

Onion finds opposition to his position on his own court. Judge Truman Roberts predicted two years ago the court's huge caseload would lead to a scandal. Onion said recently that problem has been solved. Roberts disagrees.

"We have heard arguments in 120 cases, which we have not decided, another 50 have been filed for arguments, and there are approximately 2,000 cases around the state in which notice of appeal has been given. This court simply cannot handle 2,000 cases," says Roberts.

The courts of civil appeals, with a total of 42 judges, have a caseload one-fourth the size of the caseload of Onion's and Roberts' court.

The AFL-CIO opposes the judiciary article because it allows the state to appeal criminal cases where a trial judge declares a law unconstitutional and where the Supreme Court feels it needs to clear up conflicting views of the new courts of appeal.

Some county judges who never went to law school oppose the article because it would give the legislature the power to take away their jurisdiction to try cases and put it in new circuit courts whose judges must be lawyers.

Some district and county clerks oppose it because local voters would be allowed to merge the two offices.

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

PEKING — The shooting galleries around the Heavenly Temple Park in Peking were like those to be found in any western amusement park with one exception. Instead of clay papes or ping pong balls bouncing on a jet of air, the target was a four-jet imperialist bomber.

Wandering through the park during the celebrations marking the 30th anniversary of the foundation of People's China, we saw a smartly dressed eight-year old shoot down his first imperialist bomber.

The youngster, his hair carefully combed, his immaculate white shirt topped with a bright scarf of the little red soldiers, was watched by his amused mother. The little boy was just one of tens of thousands of Chinese, and a handful of foreigners, thronging the park, which is one of the favorites of the people of Peking. Like the five other parks in the capital, it had been turned into an amusement park for the national festivities.

HUNDREDS OF stands for games and diversions, open air theaters performing lyrical and folklore shows were erected among the garlanded trees, hung with streamers and large red lanterns, multicolored fairlights and banners bearing revolutionary slogans.

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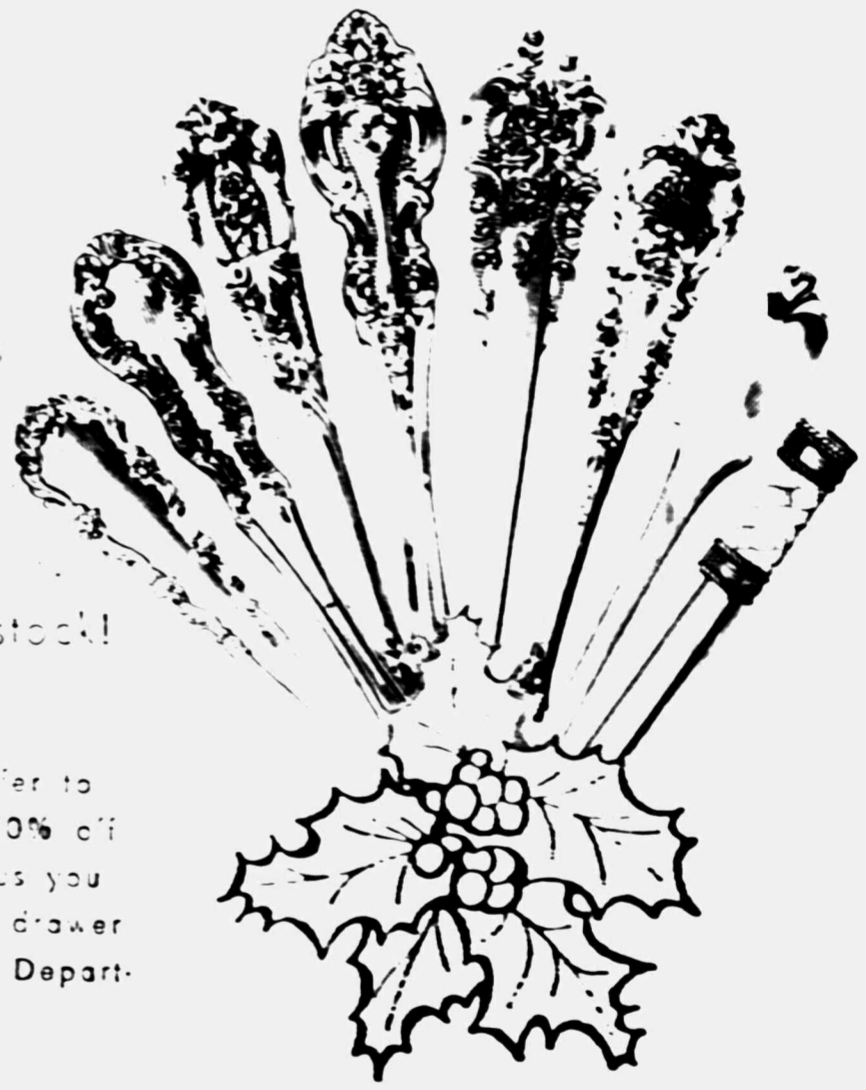

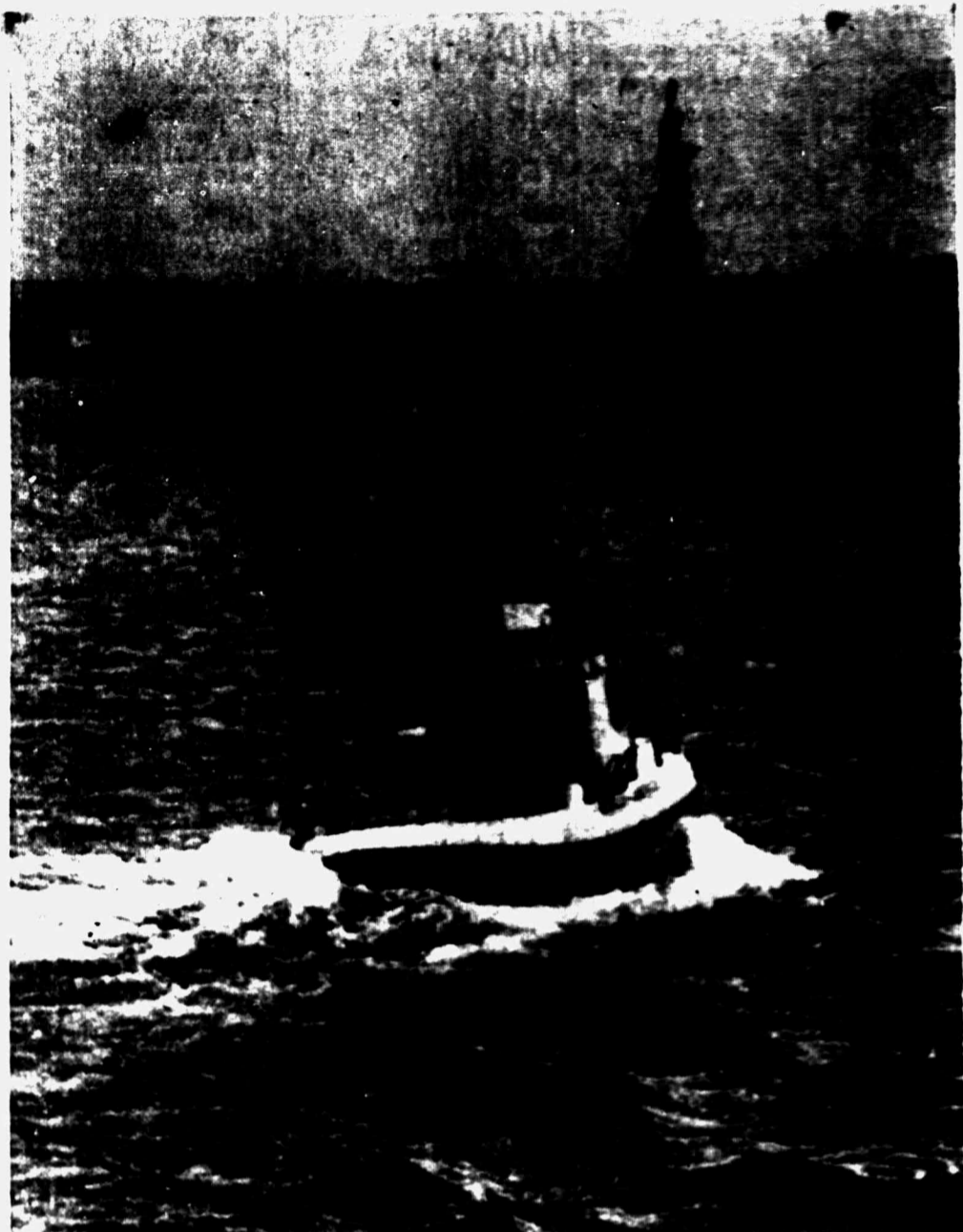

Jobs Scarce For Japan's Students

TOKYO—Amid the continued economic recession, Japanese college students are facing the prospect—for one of the first times since the 1930s—of finding themselves without jobs by the time they graduate next March.

The nation's "best" companies usually choose graduates of the "best" colleges annually. Once in, they are kept on the payroll until reaching mandatory retirement—at 55, 57 or 60, depending on the firm—unless they rob their employer or beat up a director. They receive periodic promotions and raises unless they make a mistake which causes their firm a loss of face—often more important than a loss of money in Japan.

Now, with one third of the 1,586 companies listed in the first and second sections of the Tokyo Stock Exchange announcing they will hire no one this year and with 15 per cent of the nation's top firms following suit, the door to top corporations has grown exceedingly narrow.

To make the point clear, with Japanese families of high ambition or good breeding, the fact that their children enter a good school and thereafter a good company, prestige overpay being the norm, since small- and medium-sized companies often pay better than big or top companies, is of utmost importance.

Continue Door-Beating—Despite urging by university placement officials and company recruiters, that students seek positions with small and medium-sized companies, students continue to beat upon the doors of major industrial and trading firms.

Reflecting the seriousness of the situation, and like in many other countries, formal meetings with a view to marriage arranged marriages are still popular in Japan. Weekly magazines have been publishing lists of potential brides and grooms.

Graduate Behavior—To make the point clear, many young men who are to graduate from university next March have engaged in the following behavior: They would not have been engaged in three or four years of college, and the individual has been a failure. Individual students who were apparently successful in their studies were apparently not so successful in their behavior.

The skills given to students in the past are being questioned. They do not know how to work with their hands, and they do not know how to work with their minds. They are not prepared for the kind of work that is required in the modern world.

Quite A Contrast—The contrast between the behavior of the students and the behavior of the employers is quite a contrast. The employers are looking for graduates who are prepared to work hard and to learn from their mistakes.

Several Forms Of Word—Japanese has several forms of the word "I," ranging from the polite "wakushi" to the informal "washi," and the overly polite "watashi." The Japanese language is full of such forms, with the result that many young Japanese people cannot manage proper use of their native language in more polite forms.

This also is the firm of the Japanese, at least three times to show their lack of business, but are careful not to overstay their welcome.

Gunmen Slay Turk Envoy To Austria

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Police and ambulances converged on the embassy, but an ambulance physician said Tunaligil was already dead.

Three men armed with sub-machine guns stormed into the Turkish Embassy at noon today and killed the ambassador, police and Foreign Ministry officials said. The three escaped in a white Mercedes-Benz.

Turkish diplomats told Austrian police they believed the killers of Danis Tunaligil, 60, were "English-speaking Greeks." But police said they had no independent information to confirm this.

Greece and Turkey have carried on a long rivalry over Cyprus, which was worsened when Turkish forces invaded the Mediterranean island in July 1974. Turkish troops still occupy part of the island, which has a Turkish minority and Greek majority population.

The dead man was one of Turkey's leading diplomats. He had been ambassador to Vienna since November 1973.

The official described one of the attackers as about 5 feet 3 and about 25 years old. He said there was confusion about the license plate on the escape car.

Tunaligil was married and the father of a 15-year-old daughter.

After university studies in Istanbul, Tunaligil entered the diplomatic service in 1939. He served in Milan, Italy, and Geneva, Switzerland, before being named ambassador to Vienna in 1973.

In 1952 Tunaligil became section chief in the Turkish Foreign Ministry and two years later was appointed chargé d'affaires in Moscow. In 1960 he took over as ambassador to Jordan and in 1964 went to Belgrade.

Between 1968 and 1970 he was political director in the Turkish Foreign Ministry. Tunaligil was killed by several bullets fired from the submachine guns.

Americans Kidnaped In Lebanon

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Two American employees of the U.S. Embassy in Beirut were kidnaped today in one of the battle zones of Lebanon's Christian-Muslim war, the Embassy announced.

The Americans were kidnaped about 7 a.m. as they were driving to work at the Regional Service Center a printing plant for the U.S. Information Agency, an Embassy spokesman said.

He refused to reveal their names until their families were notified.

The two were stopped by unidentified armed men at a roadside on the Corniche al-Mazraa, a broad avenue that leads from a high-class seaside neighborhood through Muslim districts. Two major Palestinian guerrilla groups have headquarters on the avenue.

A Lebanese employee who was with the Americans was released and brought word of the kidnaping to the Embassy.

The spokesman said there was no word from the kidnapers but Embassy security officers were in touch with the Lebanese police.

Premier Rashid Karami received U.S. Ambassador G. M. Harriss today after getting word of the abduction.

Another Midlander Convicted Of Conspiracy In Stock Sales

NEW YORK (AP) — A Manhattan federal court jury has convicted two more Texans of conspiring in illegal sales of stock in a "shell" corporation based at Midland, Tex.

The verdicts were brought in late Monday night against M. S. Knusely, 65, of Midland, former president of the corporation Select Enterprises, Inc., and Robert E. Ford, 50, an Abilene attorney.

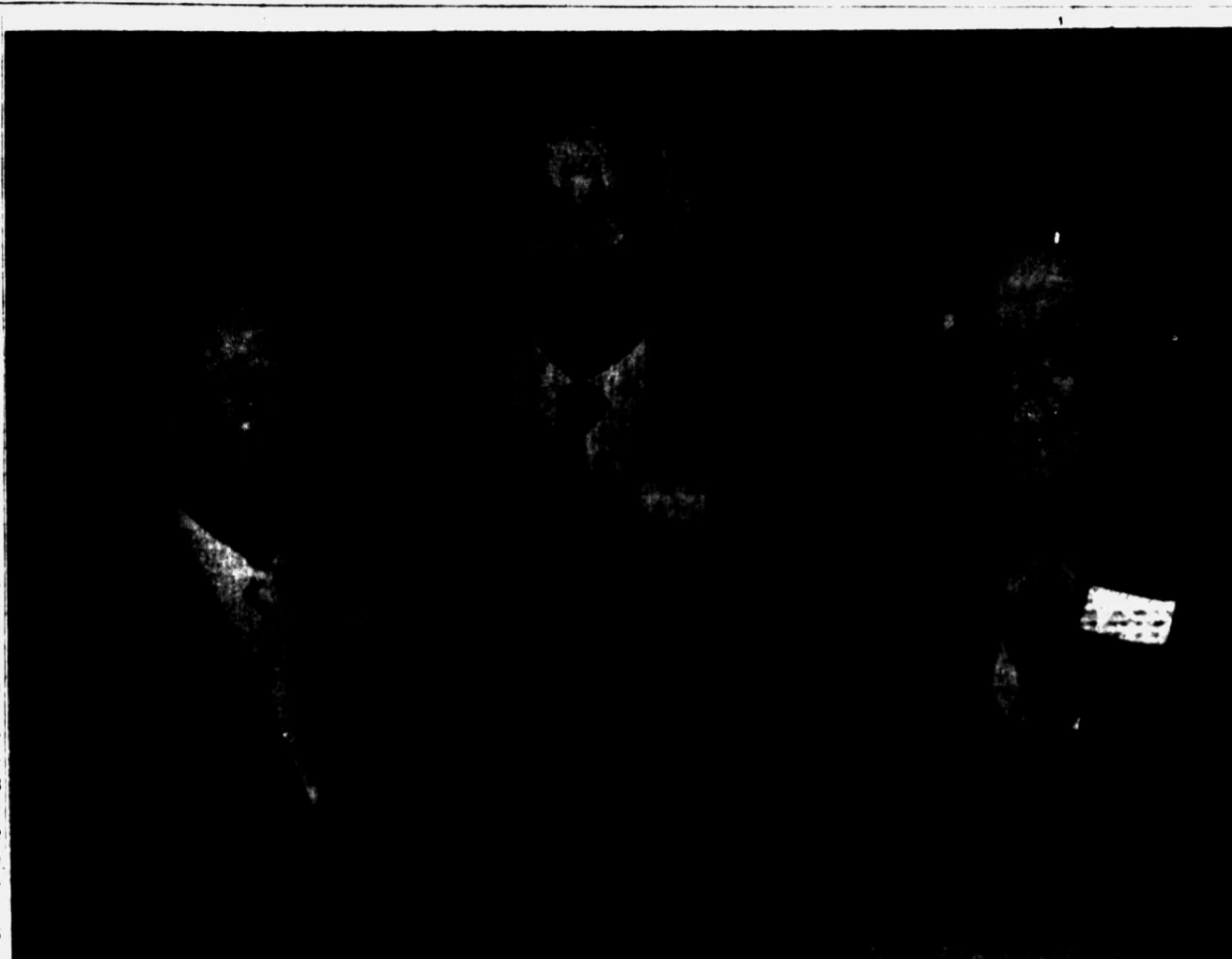
A number of other defendants, including two former Nevada state senators, were found innocent by the same jury while still others had entered guilty pleas.

September Food Prices Drop Some

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumer prices increased five tenths of 1 percent in September, largely because of higher prices for transportation, education, medical services, utilities and clothing, the government said today.

But for the first time since 1971, there was a decline in food prices at supermarkets — a drop of two tenths of 1 percent since August. The Labor Department said prices fell sharply for fresh fruits, vegetables and beef.

The September figures mean consumer prices are increasing at an annual rate of 8 percent, which is below the 9 percent annual inflation rate forecast by the government for the first nine months of 1975. Consumer prices have increased 5 1/2 percent and for the 12-month period ending in September they increased 7.8 percent.

The Labor Department said a consumer price index in September stood at 163.6 of the 1967 average of 100, meaning it cost \$163.60 last month to buy the same goods that cost \$100 in 1967.

Irish Siege Continuing

MONASTEREVIN, Ireland (AP) — Heavily armed troops and police laid siege through the night to a house in which Irish terrorists held Dutch industrialist Tiede Herrema captive on the second floor.

Police marksmen kept their weapons trained Tuesday night on upstairs windows of the house in this rural market town 40 miles from Dublin, but there was no break in the deadlock between police and the kidnapers.

An official spokesman said the kidnapers had made no new demands since police stormed into the house Tuesday.

Franco's Condition Grave

MADRID (AP) — Gen. Franco's last dictator had died on Tuesday, and officials said he was in a very serious condition.

He had a satisfactory night and is still in power. But he was in the Pardo Palace and had suffered an acute heart attack two days outside Madrid and a high fever, but he was recovering, his doctors reported.

Gen. Franco is 82 years old and has been in power since 1939. He is believed to have been afflicted with Parkinson's disease.

The 82-year-old dictator was in a very serious condition Tuesday, and officials said he was in a very serious condition.

Senate To Vote On Natural Gas Measure

WASHINGTON (AP) — The big oil-gas companies to divest Senate may be ready to accept some of their energy holdings. The gas bill has two major sections. One is designed to provide for a natural gas shortage.

The other, supported by most Republicans, would phase out all federal controls on natural gas prices.

The bloc of Republicans and Democrats has shown several times that it has the votes to deregulate, or remove price controls.

The Republicans' proposal would end controls immediately on new gas produced from on-

shore wells after Jan. 1, 1975. Controls would end in 1985 on offshore gas, which is about 16 percent of U.S. production.

Most gas is produced by pipelines from to buy gas this winter at field prices under contract that would end as soon as existing contracts expire.

This "old" gas, about 70 percent of U.S. production, is what most Americans use to heat their homes.

In an effort to soften the consumer impact of deregulation, Tunney offered his amendment to keep this gas under controls until the supply is exhausted.

Under this plan, the huge in-state pipelines that serve American homes, schools and factories would be allowed to produce under contracts that average about 10 years.

The Tunney amendment would retain controls forever but would direct the Federal Energy Commission to raise the level of controlled prices.

The Senate voted 42 to 37 on Tuesday to limit the field price that will be permitted under emergency sales procedures aimed at averting a severe gas shortage this winter.

MOSCOW (AP) — Venus 9, an unmanned Soviet spacecraft, has gone into orbit around Venus and has become that planet's first artificial satellite. Tass reported today.

The spacecraft was launched June 8. The Tass report did not say when it was put into orbit nor did it give any other details.

The Soviets launched another unmanned spacecraft, Venus 10, six days after Venus 9, and it was speculated at that time that an attempt would be made to land one of them while the other would orbit the planet as an observer.

House Passes Bill Lifting Political Restrictions On Federal Employees

WASHINGTON, AP — The House today passed a bill to lift political restrictions on federal employees, a move that would allow them to run for office during working hours, on government premises or while wearing any uniform or badge from their jobs.

The bill, which also applies to employees of the semi-independent Postal Service but not to members of the armed services, would be forbidden to use official authority or influence to affect an election, to coerce anyone to vote or to vote, or to contribute money of effort to a campaign. Solicitation of funds in government offices would be forbidden and employees would not be allowed to give campaign contributions, even voluntarily, to superiors.

The measure also would create a three-member Board of Political Activities of Federal Employees, appointed by the President, to hear cases of alleged violations.

The House Republican Policy Committee said the bill would restore first-class citizenship to employees who run for office during working hours, on government premises or while wearing any uniform or badge from their jobs.

The Civil Service Commission also opposes the bill, but it has received vigorous support from many federal civilian employees, some labor groups, particularly the registered Democratic and government workers' groups.

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Study Indicates No Gains From Busing

WASHINGTON, AP — A study by the U.S. Department of Education indicates that busing to desegregate schools has not resulted in significant gains in academic achievement for black students.

The study, which was conducted by the National Center for Education Statistics, compared the scores of black students in bused and non-bused schools on a variety of tests, including reading, language arts, and mathematics.

The researchers found that black students in bused schools did not score significantly higher than those in non-bused schools. In fact, in some cases, scores were lower.

The study also found that black students in bused schools were more likely to be absent and to have lower attendance records.

The researchers concluded that busing has not resulted in the gains that were expected. They suggested that other factors, such as the quality of the schools and the attitudes of the students, may be more important.

The study included the filing out of a questionnaire on racial attitudes.

Researchers said they found that black students in general have positive attitudes toward white students, but the study showed that black students who were bused had more positive attitudes toward white students than did those bused.

The study also showed that white students in mostly white masses had a positive attitude toward black students, but white students in mostly black masses had a slightly negative attitude toward black students.

The researchers added that these masses were not bused, and would not be justified to conclude that any black students.

Dr. Barnard Just An Ordinary, Simple Farm Boy

The Washington Post WASHINGTON — "Do you think I've done so badly?" he cries. "I'm just a simple, ordinary farm boy, you see..." A recurring phrase that belies the simplicity of its owner with each utterance. And no, answer his question, Dr. Christiana Barnard hasn't done badly at all. How many other heart surgeons could maintain their credibility while bunning the cigarettes?

And this all began in 1967, in Cape Town, South Africa, with the first human heart transplant. The patient, Louis Washkansky, died after 18 days. But the doctor, a lanky, handsome fellow, lived through some pretty uproarious times.

The operation was, as they say, a success. "It was not as people think that I trembled when I did it," Barnard says in an accent decidedly Afrikaans. "I did not know what repercussions there would be. Oh, I enjoyed it. It felt so important then..."

"AND ALL OF A SUDDEN I am confronted with Face the Nation, face the critics, unscrupulous reporters. I'm very innocent little country boy I don't know about such things. Now I am wise and know that not everybody's motives are good. Then I would walk into a room and they stood next to some nice looking

woman and they take my picture." In oblique fashion, Barnard is discussing the string of pretty women he was paired with by the press after his shot to fame. "My social life was the same before the transplant as after," he will say, and maybe so. But after the great operation, Dr. Barnard's first wife, Louw-je, claimed she discovered love letters written to him by Gina Lollobrigida — information she did not keep to herself. "Yes," sighs the doctor. "I walk into a room, someone stands me next to Gina Lollobrigida. Well I'm a man after all."

NYC Loan Plan Appears Doomed

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Robert Morgan, D-N.D., voted panel being studied by a Senate against considering the loan guarantee proposal.

Meanwhile, the House economic stabilization subcommittee resumes hearings today on the impact of a possible New York City default and is scheduled to hear witnesses from the management industry.

Rep. Thomas Ashley, D-Ill., said he expected it to be approved by only two votes. There are 15 members of the subcommittee.

Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., chairman of the Senate subcommittee, said he would like to see any loan guarantee bill passed by the end of the year.

There is an indication of a possible compromise. A Senate bill would allow the city to borrow up to \$1 billion from the federal government to pay off its debt.

Tommy Collins Dies At Lamesa

LAMESA, Texas (AP) — Tommy Collins, a well-known Texas rodeo star, died of a heart attack at his home in Lamesa, Texas, Monday.

Collins, 52, was a member of the Lamesa rodeo club and had been in the hospital for several days. He was survived by his wife, Mrs. Collins, and two children.

DALLAS (AP) — Parents of the Dallas school desegregation suit have asked the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans to order an implementation plan this year of a Dallas school desegregation plan.

The motion by the plaintiffs Tuesday came a few days after U.S. District Court Judge William M. Told the New Orleans court it would delay implementation of the plan until August unless ordered otherwise. The court had ordered Taylor to implement a plan by January.

Joseph C. Maxwell. He was a key figure in the discovery of the great Church-Fields-University portion of the huge McElroy field.

He also was responsible for many discoveries in Crane, Ward and Winkler Counties, as well as Lea County. He became one of the outstanding independent producers of the state. In 1951 he was involved with the discovery of the five-pay West Dollarhide field.

George B. McCamey. McCamey enjoyed the distinction of having a West Texas town named for him and he drilled almost countless wildcat wells, many of which were in the Permian Basin and other sections of the nation.

He discovered the McCamey field in 1925. His competition with the oil business covered 62 years, a phenomenally long time full of accomplishment.

Robert W. Patterson. Patterson scoured the Permian Basin as few did so long and so well. He also was a landman, staff coordinator and, finally, a banker, public relations officer and supporter of civic affairs.

He came to Midland with Gulf Oil in 1926 and for many years was known as Mr. Gulf in this area.

Neville G. Penrose. He has been one of the most aggressive wildcat drillers of the Permian Basin. His most famous discovery was the Penrose field, and he was involved in the Dreyke and Brunson strikes in New Mexico.

Fred Turner Jr. He brought to the Basin's oil industry the end of a determination, outstanding business faculty and an uncanny ability to see the unseeable beneath the earth's surface.

He was involved in the discovery of the West Lovington field, the Shafter Lake and the Parker multipay fields.

Ronald K. DeFord. DeFord had two outstanding careers, as a highly distinguished geologist in the Permian Basin and as an innovative and respected professor of geology at the University of Texas. He also was the first president of Midland Community Theatre.
