

Muleshoe emergency service agencies responded to another house fire Friday, this time at the Muleshoe Housing Authority on West Ave. K.



According to McNeill, the value of the buildings. proposed budget includes a Kindergarten expansion grant, Head Start funding, or any tax increases within the school district.

Based upon documentation presented to Sthe board Monday, the proposed budget shows a \$356,860 increase from FY 2005-05, with the majority of the increase, \$210,224, coming from state revenue. Local revenue projected at \$163,484.

Some of the largest differences listed include an \$111,160 increase in Instruction funding; a \$79,959 increase in Instruction Resources funds; a \$24,096 increase in school administration funds; and a \$36,118 increase in the district's Student Transportation costs.

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NOTICE OF PROPOSED INCREASE IN **ENVIRONS GAS RATES**

On February 25, 2005, Atmos Energy Corporation ("Atmos" or the "Company") filed a Statement of Intent with the Railroad Commission of Texas (the "Commission") to increase its gas rates in the unincorporated area ("Environs") surrounding the Cities of West Texas Service Area (the "Cities"). This proposed increase in gas rates willing to apply to customers residing inside the city limits of the West Texas

In its filing, the Company proposes to change its Environs base rates and service charge tariffs to the same level as those current rates previously approved by the Cities for customers inside the city limits. The service charge rates have been in effect inside the city limits since April 10, 2003 and the base rates have been in effect inside the city limits since May 1, 2004. The Company proposes to change the Environs rates effective April 1, 2005. The Commission may suspend the proposed effective date for up to 150 days.

The proposed changes will affect all classes of Environs tariff customers, including Residential, Commercial, Industrial, State Institution, and Public Authority customers. The Company's Air Conditioning Customers, who currently take service under a separate tariff, will instead be served under the Residential tariff. There are approximately 17,306 Atmos Environs tariff customers (15,071 Residential, 1,916 Commercial, 182 Small Industrial, 16 State Institution, and 121 Public Authority). The proposed changes in Environs base rates are expected to increase the Company's annual revenues by approximately \$440,274. The Company also proposes to implement and apply a new Weather Normalization Adjustment clause to the bills of customers in weather-sensitive classes (Residential, Commercial, State Institution, and Public

The typical monthly residential customer bill (assuming consumption of 6 Mcf) and the typical monthly commercial customer bill (assuming consumption of 30 Mcf) will be affected as follows by these changes:

The various changes in base rates and nonrecurring charges proposed by Atmos would increase the Company's total revenues in the Environs by approximately \$470,651 on an annual basis, or 9.7%. The proposed change in revenues is a "major change" under state law. The new Environs rates will not exceed 115% of the average of all rates for similar services in all municipalities served by Atmos Energy within the

"This indicates almost three inches more moisture in the soil than last year," Crenwelge said. He added that the average available moisture values, or amounts of plant-available moisture in the soil, show the same

Readings indicate an average of 6.2 inches of moisture in the upper five feet of the soil, as compared to 3.2 inches in 2004. Despite the above-average rainfall last year, the data collection revealed that the moisture did not completely fill the five-foot soil profile.

Crenwelge said several factors contributed to this. "It should be noted that the soil infiltration rate, or how fast water can enter the soil, becomes slower as the soil surface becomes wetter. Water will pool on the surface and then flow from fields as runoff. Since the fields were already wet at the surface, much of the moisture ran off the field before it could soak into the soil," he said. He added that as soils become wetter, water is "wicked" down into the lower portion of the soil profile, which may take some time, especially in heavier clay soils.

"Also, the soil was wetter at the five-foot level than it was last year. Therefore, some moisture soaked deeper than the five-foot



If the bunion is not severe, you may be able to relieve pain and pressure by softball team wearing shoes that are wider, taping your foot or wearing pads to cushion the bunion. Physical therapy, special shoe inserts or surgery may be necessary to treat the bunion. Unfortunately, bunions tend to run in families.

Hammertoe Shortening of the tendons that control toe movements is a condition known as hammertoe. The toe knuckle the toe back. Over time, as the toe rubs against your shoes, it may become stiff and enlarge even more. Without your large toe resting against the walking balance.

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



In the mid-1980s, Dr. Gordy Klatt, a Tacoma colorectal surgeon, wanted to enhance the income of his local American Cancer Society office. He decided to personally raise money for the fight by doing something he en-
