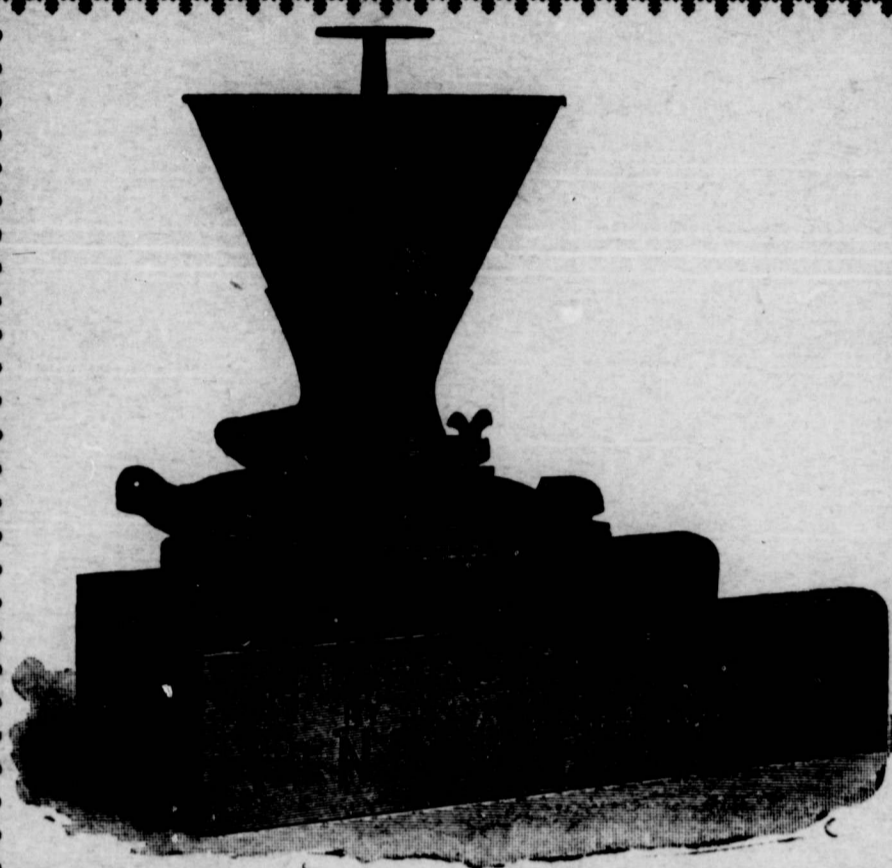

Well, what did you say about that railroad meeting? Don't you think that we ought to have it?

Say, you Big Springs people, why don't you see that your phone line is extended from Gail out to Lubbock via Tahoka? You cannot comprehend the business it would divert from the Pecos Valley road to your town. You are standing in your own light.

Some of the inhabitants of this place and of other places with a population of less than ten thousand, are protesting to the post office department against paying post office box rent. In view of the fact that people in rural districts and people living in towns of ten thousand and over, have their mail delivered to their doors free of cost, it seems to be an unjust discrimination to charge two to four dollars per year for the privilege of going to the post office and getting one's mail from a box. At least that is the way some people look at the matter, and not without good reason, as any one can readily see.

J. M. Parrish, living about fifteen miles east of Estacado, suffered a very severe accident near his home Saturday afternoon. He was helping to unload a well machine from a wagon when the heavy machine slipped from the wagon, knocking him down, and the weight of the machine pinning him to the ground. His companions released him as soon as possible. He was in great agony and both legs were found to be paralyzed. He was taken to his home, ten miles away, and Drs. Odell and Carter were called to see him. On Monday evening Dr. Overton was called to see him and on Tuesday Mr. Parrish was brought to Lubbock for treatment. It was found that the bones of the back were not broken, but that considerable hemorrhage had taken place around the spinal cord; causing pressure against the cord, producing paralysis. Mr. Parrish is in a critical condition, but much hopes are entertained for his recovery.

Another Railroad.

The following is clipped from a Big Springs paper of recent date:

"The people of Big Springs will be given an opportunity tonight to accept or reject a proposition to build another railroad to our town. The proposed road is to run from San Angelo to Lubbock and will cross the T. & P. road at Big Spring, Colorado or Stanton. If the road does not come here and goes to either Colorado or Stanton, it will hit our town a pretty hard blow, and one that she will not recover from soon.

Mr. E. P. Speers, vice-president of the Dallas and New Mexico Railway, will meet the citizens of Howard county at the court house tonight and submit a proposition to them which they can accept or reject. If we reject it the proposition will be made to other towns, as the road appears to be a certainty and our town can get it if we go after it in the right way.

Be sure to attend the meeting, as it is to the interest of every one that we secure this road."

Speaking of the same proposition, the Fort Worth Record of September 10th, among other things says:

"The parties figuring reside in Dallas and have ample capital behind them to complete the enterprise. The road, if built, will extend north, enter the town of Lubbock and proceed to Amarillo, on the Fort Worth & Denver City road."

Arrested for Perjury.

On arrival at Wellington or Emporia shipments that cannot make destination within the 28 hour limit will be unloaded for the required feed, water and rest as provided for by the U. S. These trains are intended to take care of the small shipments which would otherwise have to be handled on way freights, but on account of the necessity of gathering these shipments all along the line we cannot guarantee the above schedule at all times.
