### LESS LEGISLATION

The State of Texas Should Not Send a Bunch of Blockheads to the Legislature.

s and other states is conducted in haphazard, slipshod way that would not be tolerated by any private concern of the smallest pretensions to system is a notorious fact. The public business, in enactment and publication of laws important branch of public affairs.

It is now over 90 days since the legislature adjourned, and all the laws enacted by the regular session are in force, yet not one ordinary citizen in five hundred knows what those laws are. Even conclusive opinions, because they fective with the emergency clause, effective at once, and the laws not yet given to the people except the laws themselves as officially are to live under. proclaimed.

Take any large corporation, and it would not expect its employes and branch houses to comply with new rules and regulations enacted by the directorate until such rules had been placed in the hands of each man concerned.

Take the much abused railroads who are now compelled to learn account keeping from state and federal boards of instruction. They would not think of trying to hold their employes responsible for new regulations without knowing each had them in hand. In the case of new time cards, new safety rules and all changes in the government of each department, the roads place the new requirements in the hands of each employe affected and get his personal receipt for the same. It is common sense, it is business, it is justice to the employes and more protection to the property to do this.

The shooting occurred on South Pacific Street in front of the residence of J. C. Arnold and we give the following details as we have been able to obtain them.

Oswald was thrown from his carriage, where he was found unconscious, and he never regained his consciousness.
