Further confirming the inexhaustible supply of water in the Black Water valley for irrigation purposes, O. P. Burnham last Friday brought in an-other irigation well on the northwest corner of his 400 acre tract of fine land located 10 miles northeast of Mule-

The well a hole of 16 inches diameter, was put down by A. B. Hays to a depth of 100 feet where the big supply of water followed the drill back up to within seven feet of the top. The well was put on the pump Priday evening of last week and run that hight, Saturday, Sunday and part of Monday, and it is declared by Mr. Burnham that he is confident the well will develop into one of 1,500 gallons capacity. The pump has a draw down of only about 25 feet where the water stands five feet above the pump which was set at the 30 foot level. To say that Mr. Burnham is greatly pleased is only expressing it mildly.

The water from the testing of the new well is being run onto a plot of 20 acres that is to be sowed to wheat this fall He will also irrigate 20 acres of or acres of a laffala, 40 acres of Indian corn, and some other acresge tracts which have not been positively determined.

BAILEY COUNTY SOILS ARE RICH IN LIME AND ESSENTIAL INGREDIENT IN CROP PRODUCTION, SAYS REYNOLDS

CROP PRODUCTION, SAYS REYNOLDS

That limestone is plentiful in the soils of Bailey county, is the state-ment made by Fred S. Reynolds, county farm agent, following an exhaustite test made last week.

The tests conducted by Mr. Reynolds were made on several different farms located in various sections of tecounty. "Soils rich in limestone are sweet soils," as aid Mr. Reynolds."—Those soils lacking in limestone are known as "sour soils." A STUDY OF WHEAT
FOR FEED PURPOSES

Advisability of feeding wheat to livestock is a question which often confornts livestock feeders when the prices of corn and wheat are close together. E. T. Robins, extension specialist at the lillinois experiment station, reports that coarsely ground wheat is worth as much or more as the same weight of shelled corn for hogs. When wheat is 75 cents a bushel and can be ground for five cents or dear 35 cent corn. Chtaper corn. however would likely be a more economical feed. Ground wheat, according to Mr. Robbins, has about the same value for other stock as for hogs.

Information from the Ohio experiment station advises that tankage or some other similar protein supplement should be feed to hogs, with wheat, for best results. At this station, rations consisting of wheat and tankage have given better results than equal amounts of wheat and corn plus the usual albowance of tankage. J. W. Wuichet, the extension specialist, states that wheat should always be ground or cracked. Soaking is not as good nor as economical as grinding.
