





NOTICE OF PROPOSED INCREASE IN **ENVIRONS GAS RATES**

On February 25, 2005, Atmos Energy Corporation ("Atmos" or the "Company") filed a Statement of Intent with the Railroad Commission of Texas (the "Commission") to increase its gas rates in the unincorporated area ("Environs") surrounding the Cities of West Texas Service Area (the "Cities"). This proposed increase in gas rates willing to apply to customers residing inside the city limits of the West Texas Service Area.

In its filing, the Company proposes to change its Environs base rates and service charge tariffs to the same level as those current rates previously approved by the Cities for customers inside the city limits. The service charge rates have been in effect inside the city limits since April 10, 2003 and the base rates have been in effect inside the city limits since May 1, 2004. The Company proposes to change the Environs rates effective April 1, 2005. The Commission may suspend the proposed effective date for up to 150 days.

The proposed changes will affect all classes of Environs tariff customers, including Residential, Commercial, Industrial, State Institution, and Public Authority customers. The Company's Air Conditioning Customers, who currently take service under a separate tariff, will instead be served under the Residential tariff. There are approximately 17,306 Atmos Environs tariff customers (15,071 Residential, 1,916 Commercial, 182 Small Industrial, 16 State Institution, and 121 Public Authority). The proposed changes in Environs base rates are expected to increase the Company's annual revenues by approximately \$440,274. The Company also proposes to implement and apply a new Weather Normalization Adjustment clause to the bills of customers in weather-sensitive classes (Residential, Commercial, State Institution, and Public Authority)

The typical monthly residential customer bill (assuming consumption of 6 Mcf) and the typical monthly commercial customer bill (assuming consumption of 30 Mcf) will be affected as follows by these changes:

The various changes in base rates and nonrecurring charges proposed by Atmos would increase the Company's total revenues in the Environs by approximately \$470,651 on an annual basis, or 9.7%. The proposed change in revenues is a "major change" under state law. The new Environs rates will not exceed 115% of the average of all rates for similar services in all municipalities served by Atmos Energy within the same county.

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


Thank God for the Good **News of His Grace!**

f I could somehow know that I had but one more opportunity to stand before Christ's people and share God's word, I would like to think that final sermon would be centered on the good news of God's grace.

What grace? The grace of God as expressed through Christ Jesus and His death on the cross.

Grace that is freely given. Grace that is truly a gift and can only be accepted as such.



Grace that is free but that is far from cheap.

Grace that is freely available to you and to me but that cost the Giver more dearly than mortal minds can fathom.

If mortals like us were big enough, strong enough, wise enough, to reach up into the night sky with a paper cup and scoop up a drink of the Milky Way's liquid light, maybe

If I had only one sermon left in me, one final opportunity to speak, with all my heart I hope it would be a message focused on the cross of Christ and centered on the good news of His grace. No other message is worth preaching.

That, after all, is what it means to be not a "minister of the law" but a "minister of the Gospel," the "good news" of God's grace.

It's a sad but telling commentary on our fallen natures that we humans tend to react to such good news with cynicism and mistrust and, even at times, hostility

Stephen became the first Christian martyr because he preached the gospel of grace which holds that since the grace of God is a free gift-not wages that can be earned or a commodity that can be bought-all people, Gentiles and Jews, stand on level ground at the foot of Christ's cross.

And what a tribute to God's grace that Saul of Tarsus, who had held the garments of those who stoned Stephen, would later in one blinding instant find his passion for the





For the first time since the first two weeks of January, Turkey was the major buyer of U.S. cotton. Smaller quantities were sold to China, Indonesia, and Mexico. Net sales of 5,000 bales for delivery in 2006 were mainly for Indonesia and South Korea.

Export shipments reached a new marketing year high at 432,200 bales, a 27 percent increase from the previous week and 24 percent more than the fourweek average. Primary destinations were China, Turkey, Pakistan, and Indonesia.

In the spot cotton market, online sales by producers in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas increased in the week ended April 21 as sales totaled 12,273 bales compared to the previous week when 8,945 bales were traded.

In other news, the Bush Administration said Wednesday it will formally notify the World Trade Organization that it plans to fully comply with its ruling involving U.S. cotton subsidies that resulted from a complaint filed by Brazil calling the subsidies "unfair" to the world market. The U.S. has until July 1 to comply with the ruling which would impact Step 2 export payments and cotton export credit programs.

Many in the industry believe the changes initiated by the WTO will not fully affect the U.S. cotton industry until the 2006-07 crop, however, traders certainly will keep a watchful eye on the situation.

Meanwhile, USDA reported 11 percent of the 2005-06 U.S. cotton crop had been planted as of April 17. Although the figure was down from the same period last year when 15 percent of the crop was planted, the department noted that planting progress still is in



1. Slow the retiree population growth.

As discussed above, enrollment growth because of early retirement imposes a severe strain on the system. Because the early retiree population is considered to be a "high cost" population for health care spending any effort to keep those experienced active teachers in the classroom would help stabilize the financial position of the plan.

2. Coordinate benefits.

The benefit plan must be carefully structured to appropriately coordinate with medical coverage available to older retirees (Medicare) and other insurance options, including co-insurance, that may be available to early retirees.

3. Reasonably adjust contribution assessments.

The state contribution must be increased in proportion to the adjusted assessments made to school districts, active teachers, and retiree premiums.

"We are always concerned that proposals to adjust retiree eligibility and insurance coverage often inspire a sort of panic and skepticism among those likely impacted," said Sheets.

The possession of accurate and straightforward information is key for teachers to be confident our goals are true and carefully developed, according to the superintendent.

These necessary adjustments will require some sacrifice. However, they are key if the school district wants to avoid diverting critical dollars from the classroom, teacher pay raises and enhanced retiree benefits, he said.

job about a month, said he's been around law enforcement officers much of his life, so he decided he wanted a career in the field and went back to school to get it.

He was hired by Sheriff CD Fitzgearld just days out of the law enforcement academy in Amarillo and is still partnered with other deputies while he learns his way around.

Interacting with the public is the best part of his new job, he said.

"I like helping people," Cowley said. "I've known several people in this business, so I did my best, went back to school and got this job.

"Growing up in Earth, I worked in a body shop and knew a lot of the cops there. I have some friends with that are PD officers here."

That, combined with the nearness of family, and the ways of people in the Panhandle, have combined to make Castro County an easy fit for Cowley.
