

The subject was "Bargain Days" and he took the position that the cost of producing a job offprinting is constant and that the profit after all the cost of producin is considered, is small and that any great discount in price must be offered at a loss On the other hand a merchant performs no work on his goods except to unpack them and put them on his shelves. His markup may be as high as 100 per cent and if he leaves them on his shelves his only loss beyond depreciation is the interest on the money he pays for them. WHY WINTER COOKING **REQUIRES MORE GAS**

Consumers who use gas for both cooking and heating realize why their bills are higher in winter than summer. They know that it takes much more gas to keep them warm during severe months than in periods of mild weather.
