The act of the Thirty-Third Legislature land, who has allowed his land to forfeit for nonpayment of interest, if he desires to repurchase it under the right given by the act, shall notify the Commissioner of his desire, and that the Commissioner and the other members of the board shall rethe reappraisement the former ninety days in which to purchase the land at the reappraised price. EXERCISE OF RIGHTS

It was pointed out in the Mrs. Horace T. Owen left opinion of the Attorney General Tuesday for Lubbock where she that if the former owner could is spending a visit with her rela- exercise either the right of repurchase given by the act or the right to reinstate under the existing law at his option he would have an unfair advantage of other persons who might desire to purchase the land and would be in a position to trifle with the State. For example, such former owner could notify the Commissioner of his desire to repurchase and could thus have the land reappraised, and if it were reappraised at a smaller price than the former price, he could exercise his right to repurchase, but if it were reappraised at a higher price than the smaller former price, he could decline to repurchase and exercise the right to reinstate. The Attorney General held that it was not the purpose of the law to give the former owner such opportunity, and that as soon as the former owner, under the act of the Thirty-Third Legislature. notifies the Commissioner of his desire to repurchase the land, he has thereby elected his remedy and his right to reinstate no exists.

> On the contrary, it is plain that much can be gained in things essential to the welfare of the business. The granting of such little courtesies to employes promotes a spirit of respect, good will and a more intelligent interest in the business.

> Surely the thousands of the most progressive business men who have shown an interest in the welfare of their employes by granting them this favor bear an eloquent testimony to the mutual benefits derived therefrom.

**Method for** Making **Business** More Rushing By F. N. BLANCHARD

The manufacturers and other business men of this country would like to have business more rushing and not so quiet as it is at present. They can easily bring about such a condition of affairs, as it is a simple matter. All they need to do is to increase the wages of the producers so they will have the money to buy back more of the things they have produced. That would relieve the present stringency and times would become easier. Those who own the machines that the workers use for producing certain articles are all the time storing up more and more profits, and as they are

in the minority and the workers compose the vast majority, the workers' proportion of obtainable money must necessarily diminish as fast as the wealth of the capitalist increases. When a panic comes the position of the capitalist is somewhat like that of the monkey who put his hand into a jar of nuts and got his hand so full that he was unable to withdraw it.
