The cold air in the Round Oak is taken in on the back just above the base, passed over the heated flue surfaces of the stove, and the hot air is dis charged from the top of the circulating flue, either in to the room in which the stove is located, or conducted by a hot-air pipe to a room above. The value of the circulating flue depends upon its capacity and upon that of its heated surfaces.
