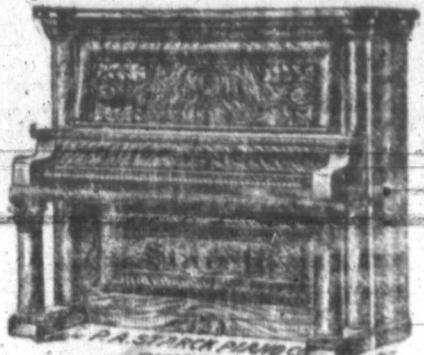

## SALOONS LOSE 30 MINUTES

Late Ruling of Attorney General—Saloon Keepers Must Not Remain After 9:30

Austin, Oct. 23.—Under the construction placed on the 9:30 closing law by the attorney general's department today, in a lengthy opinion, the bill becomes more nearly a 9 o'clock law, if the bartenders would have their establishments cleaned up and glasses washed ready for the opening on the following day.

The opinion says: "The law requires that liquor dealers shall close their places of business promptly at 9:30 p. m., and shall transact no business therein or therefrom after that hour until 6 a. m. of each week-day. The bartender and proprietor of a saloon shall be required to leave the saloon at this hour, closing the same for every purpose, and it shall be unlawful for him to remain therein for any purpose whatsoever that would be considered the transacting of business, the law not only prohibiting the sale of liquor during the prohibited hours, but also requiring that the places of business shall be closed and that they shall remain closed."

**SURVEYOR GUINN'S COMMENT**

Recent Decision in Court of Criminal Appeals Elicits Comment From County Surveyor.

Lubbock, Tex., Oct. 27, 1913.  
To the Avalanche:

Referring to the comment made in the Dallas News, with regards to action of the Court of Appeals at Austin in the Post case. It will be remembered that a copy of a letter from me along this subject was published in the Avalanche several months ago, and that this decision bears out the exact position then taken, but that the people may fully appreciate the importance of this decision; I want to discuss from the actual records of the facts, just what the school fund of Texas has been, and will be saved by the adherence to this decision.

It will be noted, that the construction of a law passed in 1887 was the leading issue, and so few people know anything about this law, it will be necessary to again give the general outline and results of this law.

During that period, Texas had a great area of unappropriated public domain. She had many thousand acres of land but could not find any purchasers, and when a purchaser was found, Texas was unable to employ surveyors to survey the land out. Consequently very little surveying was done. A few base lines were run and a great scope of country was surveyed upon paper from those base lines. Naturally many errors were made, many conflicts existed, and as the land was so cheap, the State did not feel able to hire surveyors to straighten out matters. Consequently there was an act passed, permitting the Land Commissioner to appoint special State surveyors to

re-survey school lands, asylum lands and lands alternating therewith. Also any land that the State might be interested in etc., providing the owners of the land paid all expenses.

Provision was also made, that when such field notes were made and signed by the Land Commissioner, they should be returned to the County or District surveyor in which the land was located, and they should thereafter be regarded as official field notes, etc.

Now, the abuse and construction given to this law by the Land Commissioner has brought about this controversy, and has been carried to an extent that the most gigantic graft ever opened to a State officer is possible under the present construction of the law, and one which this decision "says" must be shut off.

Lets look into the records a little and see just what has been done and approximately how many thousand acres of school land has been appropriated under this act.

It will be necessary for me to refer to the records of my office, and the position that I have taken since I came into office, in order to clearly illustrate the injustice done the school fund of Texas.

When I took charge of the office of County Surveyor, I saw that there was a great excess in the large blocks of land west of us. Under the laws of 1895 every acre of this excess, not clearly embraced within well established boundaries, is subject to application to survey as school land, and it becomes the duty of the County Surveyor to survey it as such and it is the duty of the Land Commissioner to pass on this land, and if he finds that the land has been properly surveyed he shall award to the parties making the

Let them look well, give credit to those deserving, and oust those who have made such conditions possible.

The common people are becoming educated and wise to trickery and graft, and the day of graft in Texas is a day when the grafter has to be much above the ordinary man if he gets away with the goods and escapes detection.

survey. Applications were made to me and I made the surveys, making something like 20,000 acres of land in one county subject to recovery or that much more than the original field notes indicated in the blocks.

I was never able to get the Land Commissioner to accept my survey, but he appointed a State surveyor under the acts of 1887, and this surveyor resurveyed this land for the owners of these large blocks, at their expense, and made corrected field notes including all this excess. Thus giving these few large land owners this body of land without one cent compensation to the State.

I have sections of land in my office, as resurveyed under this act, containing 971 acres. These corrected field notes are certified to by Mr. W. D. Twichell as State surveyor under the act of 1887, and improved by Mr. Robinson, Land Commissioner. When they were sent to my office for record I refused to file them, and wrote the Attorney General (Mr. Lightfoot) and ask him to give me an opinion. I took the position that such construction of the act of 1887 was detrimental to the interest of the State and I thought an incorrect construction. The Attorney General would not give me an opinion, but would refer me to the different articles and to the Land Commissioner.

When Mr. Looney was elected, his assistant (Mr. Smedley) wrote to me and asked if I had filed the corrected field notes, stating that he had noticed my correspondence with his predecessors. I informed him that I had, as I never could get an opinion. He said that he thought my position a correct one, and that he was of the opinion these field notes were not legal. It was this question that the Court of Appeals at Austin said was an unlawful and improper construction to place upon the acts of 1887.

Now, lets analyze the results of this decision. Here we find

all the resurveys under the acts of 1887 invalidated. In conversation with Mr. Smedley (Assistant Attorney General), he estimated that there had been something like 4 million acres of land appropriated under this act throughout the western portion of the State. Putting a very low and conservative estimate of the value of this land, we have to the credit of the school fund of Texas 20 million dollars, or about one-third the value of the present value of the school fund in Texas.

Think of the magnitude of this proposition. All the fines collected from oil suits, railroad consolidation suits, etc., in Texas is very insignificant compared with this sum. Besides it takes land that rightly belongs to the people, and makes this land subject to settlement and improvement. It increases our taxable values, and recovers land that has undoubtedly been appropriated through graft and trickery.

Should our Attorney General never do another service for our State, he has accomplished enough in this one particular course to forever make his name sacred to the posterity of our
