The opinion says: The law requires that liquor dealers shall close their places of ENGRAVERS-P business promptly at 9:30 p. m., and shall transact no business therein or therefrom after that hour until 6 a. m. of each weekday. The bartender and proprietor of a saloon shall be required to leave the saloon at this hour, closing the same for every purpose, and it shall be unlawful for him to remain therein for any purpose whatsoever that would be considered the transacting of business, the law not only prohibiting the sale of liquor during the prohibited hours, but also requiring that the places of business shall be closed and that they shall remain closed."
