The loss falls heavily upon all of occupants, as well as the owner the building, Mr. J. C. Phillips. though we have not been able to an estimate of the losses, we ow from the general appearance of ings the fire, smoke and water dame will amount to almost the total ount of the value of the stocks. <br> Mr. Hill occupied the back of the ilding and about three-fourths of front half, the Lubbock News | Stand the front of the east half of the building and Drummond-Hope and Grover Merrill the west part of the building. Mr . Hill did a large tailoring and elothes pressing business and many suits of clothing belonging to various people in Lubbock were in the building to 'be pressed and cleaned, and many of them will be entirely lost. The Lubbock News Stand had just recently moved out of the Merrill Hotel into this building and had quite a large stock of magazines; tobaccos, etc. DrummondHope Electric Company carried a large stock of electrical supplies, and repair equipment, all of which was badly damaged by both fire and water. Grover Merrill had an office with them and had many valuable books and papers there, that are more or less damaged. <br> Mr. Phillips will sustain considerable loss on the building. He carried only $\$ 3,500^{-}$insurance, which will likely not repair the damage. <br> Mr. Hill we understand carried $\$ 800$ on his plant which will not begin to cover the loss. <br> Drummond-Hope were partially covered by insurance, the amount we failed to learn. |
