Nineteen Hundred or More Have Been Rescued and Accounted for and it Believed that Few Were Lost, Though Official Reports Have Not Been Received in Washington Yet

Washington, Feb. 6 .- Nineteen hundred and twelve of the 2179 American officers and men on board the Cunard Liner Tuscania, torpoed and sunk in the war zone, were reported accounted for in a dispatch to the state department tonight from the American embassy at London. and 2 of the 32nd division. Liner Tuscania, carrying 2,179 American soldiers, has been torpoed and national guard troops from Michigan sunk off the Irish coast, but official and Wisconsin. 
