Under an international bread policy formulated by the inter-allied food council in London, all bread made af-One realizes that these are war ter September 1, for France, Engare streaks with fair crops in many times a girl comes to the door to read land, Italy the United States and the other allies, will be made of mixedflour containing 80 per cent wheat flour and 20 per cent substitute ce-

All present baking regulations in conflict with the new plans are rescinded, including the half and half regulation controlling flour sales to householders, and that permitting bakers to use only 70 per cent of their normal supply of wheat flour.

All rationing of bread among the allied nations will be discontinued and plenty of the new "victory bread" s assured the civil population at a time when the wheat situation in Germany and Austria is anything but

Ready mixed flour in the proportions allowed by the food administration, in accordance with its milling standards will be available for purchase by householders, although this is not compulsory. They are urged, however, to buy the ready mixed vic-

lies on householders voluntarily to mix their bread in same 80-20 proportion required of bakers.

All so-called "victory flours" may be sold without substitutes, the regulations provide but at no greater price from the miller, wholesaler or retailer than in the case of standard wheat flour. Whole wheat or graham' flour may be used without substitutes, but it must contain at least 95 per cent of the wheat berry.

BURLESON MUST APPROVE ALL TELEPHONE RATES

Washington, Aug. 29.-Under orders issued today all changes in telephones rates must be summitted to Postmaster General Burleson for approval before coming effective and the companies are required to make a charge for installing new telephones or changing the location of

A statement by the postmaster general says the new changes are necessary to conserve labor and material and to eliminate a cost which is now borne by the permanent user. of the telephone. Installation charges where the rate is \$2 a month or less

= IN THE -West Texas State Normal College

President J. A. Hill and Prof. D. A. Shirley of the West Texas State Normal College have just returned from Fort Sheridan, Ill., where they attended a conference of U. S. Army Officers and College Officials. As a result of that conference the State School at Canyon makes the following announcement to the public.

- 1. The West Texas State Normal College has been designated by the U. S. War Department as a station for military training and will proceed to provide equipment, barracks,
- 2. The War Department will detail a U. S. Army Officer to open a training camp here about October 1 and continue same indefinitely.
- 3. The U. S. Government will furnish free tintion, board, clothes, and pay \$30.00 per month to all who enter-4. All men who are 18 years of age or more and have completed a standard high school
- or who can pass College entrance examinations are eligible. 5. Boys under 18 who have finished the high school course will receive free military training. Further remuneration cannot be promiled at this time.
- 6. Boys over 18 who have not finished high shool and who cannot pass College Entrance Examinations may take the military training free of cost, but the government will not now make any promise of other remuneration. In case this institution should be designated as a vocational training school such boys might then be placed upon exactly the
- same basis as others. - 7. Boys will all live in barracks and will be under military discipline 24 hours per day, 7 days per week.
- 8. Boys will be required to do 13 hours per week of Military work, and 3 hours of recitation on our "War Aims", It is desirable that all boyc take French and technical English. Military instructions will consist of rifle shooting, bayonet training, physical drill, and close order drill.







Castle, Director of the Bureau of Communication, Washington, and this uncertainty is due to the fact of the roundhouse in Slaton, moved that the report may mean any of mans. This informant is further quoted in the press: .. .

"The Bureau of Communication does not wait for an inquiry from the family when a soldier is reported missing in action. The name, regiment, and company of the man are sent at once to the searchers in all the hospitals. Effort is made to find the soldier who saw the missing man last, and it is likely taht survivors of the engagement in which the man disappeared may be found in some of the hospitals. Those who took part in the engagement are asked, when found, whether they knew the missing man, whether they saw him at any time during the fight; if not, whether they have any hearsay knowledge of what happened to him.

"The evidence obtained, no matter ow conflicting, is forwarded to Washington, where bulletins, succesively, are issued to the family, with a caution as to what information is




