AMARILLO DOCTOR IN ENG.

The following letter from Lieut L. F. Parker, of Tahoka, will begin Terry county received nearly two Dr. R. L. Vineyard of Amarillo (who is in the army medical service) to his sister. We reprint same because

Leeds, Med. School, Leeds, England, July 24, 1918.

Time goes on-four months and two days since I left, and in some ways it seems yesterday and in others it has been a long, long year. One thing that makes it seem so short is this English weather. I am writing by a good fire now and have continued to wear my winter clothes. The sun shines a few minutes and then it rains a few hours. We all are "fed up" on English weather and are anxious to move on to France. Our stay and visit in England has been both profitable and pleasant. We have been treated as guests since we finished our three weeks' hard training at Blackpool which is on the northern coast. I have seen all the British Isles from the southern border of Scotland to the southern coast of England and from (deleted) where I' landed, May 6, to the English channel. The country is very beautiful and antique. . The accent of the people-their dress and their customes. and habits as well as the different ways of locomotion soon impress you that you are not in good old U. S.

As I entered the little dinky train

distance of about 240 miles) I thought we would be all night-we left (deleted) at 5 p. m. and got to London at 10:40, on May 6. Their system has got ours skinned and you an put an ordinary passenger train, engine and all, on four big Santa Fe box cars-but they run like greased lightning-no conductor or brakemen-they take your ticket at the end of your journey. Each coach is divided into about four compartments and about seven or eight can ride in each one. They ride facing each other with a partition separating each room. All compartments are No. 1 and 3-which means first and third class. There may be some sleepers between Edinburg and London, but I haven't seen them: All coaches or compartments are for smoking and if you want to light a cigarette, the lady sitting next to you may do the same. The English people all smoke and drink and take it as a matter of fact business. The bacco smoke since I left New York they do their 4 p. m. tea.

I have witnessed some sights since I have been here in England. As a whole, the American doctors I have been with, have been banqueted, dinnered and toured the whole country. by train and car. We certainly have lacked for nothing along that score-




