

> The amount which every man is now required to allot to his wife and children, irrespective of the amount of pay which he is receiving, is \$15. For each man getting over \$30 this will be a reduction. If he wishes to continue to contribute to his wife and children the same amount as before, he may make a new allotment for the difference through the War Department or Navy Department. Thus, for example, if he had farmerly allotted \$18 to his wife and children and wishes to continue to do so, he must make a new allotment of \$3 through the War or Navy Department, as the Bureau of War Risk In surance will in the future handle only the \$15.00 compulsory allotment. Prompt notice of these facts has been sent to men in all branches of the military and naval service, but it will, of course, require some time for the new forms to be executed and returned to Washington. Many men may decide that they do not wish to continue to allot as much as before. In such cases the Government cannot compel them to keep up the former allotments, and the family may receive only the minimum compulsory allotment of \$15 and the same government allowance as before.

In many cases men have made al lotments to parents, brothers or sisceive any payments whatever.



The quarter ended with the ball in the middle of the field. Amarillo began the second quarter by fumbling the ball and missing two or three attempted forward passes, but despite these handicaps they kept the ball and Hayden carried the pigskin aeross for the second touchdown. As he had the wind at his back this time, he was able to kick goal after his touchdown. That was the end of the scoring in the second quarter.

Between halves, the Amarillo High School boys and girls swarmed on the field and gave a snake dance. There was planty of rooting, led by yell leaders, George Vineyard and George Thompson. The spectators were so anxious to watch every detail of the game that they continually were encroaching upon the field, and Peter Ansley, head linesman, could keep them off only with threats of penal-

The Amarillo players became a little careless and were penalized several times for being off side. As a result the number of yards to gain became so great that they failed to make first down for the first time in the game. Lubbock took the ball and executed a beautiful forward pass play for a gain of about 25 yards.

The visiting team was unable to make first down, however, and Amarillo took the ball. The players bucked the Lubbock line hard, and within a few minutes Reeder had gone over for the third touchdown. Hayden's kick was just a trifle short.

Amarillo kicked off to Lubbock. The latter tear opened up with several attempted forward passes. The ball during one forward pass play was touched by an opposing player, but the Lubbock player caught the ball and made a substantial gain. Being anable to gain any more, the Lubbock team made a long punt which the Amarillo lads were unable to catch and Lubbock scored a safety which counts for two points.

The quarters were only twelve and one-half minutes long instead of the customary fifteen minutes. The Lubbock team put up a stiff fight and the local boys are anxious to go there for a return game soon. Lubbock has not a regular coach, but Howard Wheelock and Charles S. Lofton, a manual training instructor, have been aiding in the training of the boys.







Peden Back From Washington

Tells of Simplified Program of Conservation and Necessity for Winning the War in 1919

"Washington's definite and positive program is to win the war next year," said Administrator Peden of the Federal Food Administration for Texas, who returned to Houston September 11, after a conference of the 48 State Food Administrators with Herbert Hoover on September 4 and 5. "Every thought, every energy, everybody must concentrate upon that one major operation. All else must be secondary thereto," continued the

"By winning the war in 1919 we may save millions of lives, not to mention billions of dollars and precious treasure; and let us also remember a quick, decisive, complete victory within 12 to 14 months will mean a gigantic advantage in dictating the peace terms of the world, compared with our position at the end of several years more of war.

"Really, there is only one wise, economic, humane thing to do, and that is to get busy (everybody-teamwork of the highest type) and settle the issue next year.

"Mr. Hoover told me in parting he had never before believed we could accomplish this objective so soon, but during his recent trip to Europe be became convinced we could do so during 1919, provided every man, women and child in the country will see and do his duty thoroughly.

We had a large attendance and most interesting confer ence. Mr. Hoover's recital of details concerning his European trip and his conferences with the Food Administrators of Great Britain, France and Italy was eagerly listened to by all the administrators present. One of the pleasant features of the convention was the presentation to Mr. Hoover by the 48 administrators of a large and beautiful Silver Loving Cup. Mr. Hoover's voice quivered with emotion and his eyes filled with tears as he, in his modesty, expressed his thanks and apprecia-

"Mr. Hoover stressed the fact that while we now have ar increase in bread grains in the United States and Canada, there is a marked and serious shortage in fodder grains here and with our allies, and also a shortage in green feeds and hay. The Southern States especially, and Texas in particular, therefore, are urged this fall to plant larger crops than ever before of stock feed crops, including wheat, oats and rye for grazing
