



Commissioner Jonese urged among other things, that the office of Commissioner of Pensions be maintained for at least three years longer and that the present pension law be so amended that veterans may receive the benefit of all surplus mony which will probably accumulate in the Pension Department within the next few years. Under the present law the office of Commissioner of Pensions will be discontinued in January, 1919. The department was created by an act of the Legislature in 1909 and authorized to continue for a period of only ten years, at which time all work connected with the department would revert back to the Comptroller's of-



Prominent ministers from other States who will address the convention are Dr. W. H. Geiswelt, pastor of the Third Baptist Church of St Dr. E. E. Dargan of Nashville, Tenn;

Mr. Pevoto said that the pregram would not be made until the convention assembled. He mentioned, however, as some of the more important matters to come before the body, the reports on the home and foreign missions of the Southern Baptist Convention, a report on the Baptist Seminary at Fort Worth, of which the Rev. L. E. Scarborough is president; reports on the Baptist Sanitarium of Dallas and the Baptist Sanitarium of

The educational situation of the enomination in Texas will also be anvassed and plans will be made to omplete the fund of \$1,000,000 which the convention undertook to raise for educational purposes three years ago. Only about \$700,000 of

he amount has been subscribed. The question of obtaining a new State charter for the convention will be taken up during the convention. 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
