

At this time the thing of most inportance is the planting of suitable ... crops for silage, that the dairyman and stock farmer have the cheapest c. and best forage possible at home. Crops for Silage.

Harmon Benton, Agronomist recomends that the best crop to grow for silage is Indian corn in sections where the crop is reasonably certain. Corn is a doubtful crop except during unusual seasons and isolated areas in approximately the western two-thirds of Texas. Corn should be ... the principal silage crop in the eastern one-third of the state, supplemented by the sorghums; Red Top, .. Honey Drip and Texas Seeded Ribbon cane are the best silage sorghums for eastern Texas. Honey ... Drip and Seeded ribbon cane will usually produce the heaviest tonnage of the sorghums but owing to their rank growth they are difficult to handle in this section. Red Top is preferred by most farmers for silage when sorghum is grown instead of corn.

In the western two-thirds of the state, the sweet sorghums would rank first for silage purposes approximately in order named:

1st, Red Top; 2nd, Honey Drip; 3rd, Texas Seeded Ribbon Cane. The kafirs would come second to the -sweet sorghums, followed by feterita 69 and mile in the order named.

The silo offers a most satisfactory -method of storing feed during years of abundant crop production to be coused during years of crop failures or limited production. The only additional expense to the farmer would be interest on the silo, and silage stored, and the increased value of the silage during times of crop failures would more than offset the interest.





For Texas may be given new representation in Congress on the basis of the 1920 census and the question of Congressional redistricting may come up again. West Texas does not propose to have the present State Senate redistrict the State congressionally or to permit any new inequalities of representation to continue longer than it takes to change them. West Texas had to wait six years for justice in the matter of Congressional representation and to this good day ti has not obtained its proper representation in the State Senate. West Texas should not permit the present State Senate to have anything to do with reapportioning the State on the basis of the next census, and unless we misjudge the temper of the people of West Texas, it is going to be insisted that full representation in the Senate be given to that section before the figures of the 1920 census are touched by that body.

This is only one aspect of the injustice which should be corrected, but it is an absolute reply to the plea for further delay on the ground that another census is to be taken. Such a plea is adding insult to the injury which the State Legislature has permitted to continue against West Texas for more than eight years already. West Texas now has an organization through which to speak. Such injustice will not be permitted to continue without vigorous and constant protest in the future. And from now on, not only State officials, but the West Texas members of the Legislature themselves are going to be made aware of the fact that the studied neglect of the fundamental interests of that rapidly developing and constantly growing section will not be tolerated in silence. We are not suggesting that the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is going to become a political organization. That is precisely what it will consideration to the valid and just laims of West Texas at all times. It will not ask more than justice to the people and taxpayers and the various legitimate interests of West Texas. But upon that it will insist. - Star-Telegram.

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



We understand that the cause leading to the tragedy was as follows:

Sometime ago Mr. Graves bought two sections of land near Wake, and borrowed a part of the money to pay for same from Jess Norris, and Mr. Norris, in consideration for same, was to receive one section of land, but when time for settlement came, Mr. Graves did not deed Norris but one-half section, and as a conse-Mrs. George Zarr and daughter, quence the other came into liquidaright to same, placed Joe Rotan, a nephew to him by marriage, on the land, Mr. Graves having moved to · Floydada to send his children

When he (Graves) learned that \* Rotan had moved on the place, he + sent him a note to vacate, but later + he and his family visited them, and \* friendly relations were restored.

All the people of Mt. Blanco were shocked by the tragedy, and tell us that so far as any of them knew the two men were on the best of terms.

In questioning some of the people of Wake and Mt. Blanco as to how the two men spoke of each other, we were told that it was with the highest

On the afternoon of the killing, it is stated, Mr. Graves, his daughter, Mable, and son, Billie, came out from Floydada to attend a' supper which was to be given at the school house that night. Bill Stovall was with them, and they stopped at K. J. Matthews' and left Mable, the men saying they were going on over to the Stovall place, which is just east of where Joe Rotan lived. It seems that the men had just turned the corner, and were proceeding toward the Stovall place, when Mr. Graves noticed Rotan working on a fence, and suggested that they go and see what he was doing, so they turned around and went back. Billie, Mr. Graves' son, stated that they stopped, and his father spoke to Rotan, the conversa tion being about as follows:



Son Joins Army.

When the war broke out Mrs. Wagner's one son joined the French Army as a private in the One Hundred and Forty-eighth Infantry regiment. His wife and two children were in Belgium at the time and they, together with other unfortunates, saw their village and homes fall into the hands of the advancing Germans. Meantime, the husband was killed in action on the Somme, and his widow committed a crime: her "crime" was to give a French soldier a drink of water.

Of course, when the Germans learned this, it was deemed a punishable offense, so she and her son were hustled off to the village square where a dozen or more peasants were standing mutely. Their crimes must have been far more heinous than her's for they were awaiting death.

Huns' Ghastly Humor.

Ghastly humor actuated one of the German officers when he saw the widow and her boy, a youth of 12, approach. He handed the youngster a rifle and explained to him that both he and his mother would be saved from punishment if he took aim and fired-with intent to willat one of the helpless peasants be-

He thrust the rifle into the boy's hands and gruffly ordered him to raise it to his shoulder. When the lad obeyed the German officer stood

Mother and Son Slain. A shot rang out, but the speeding bullet was not aimed at a peasant. The boy had wheeled about and aimed at the hulking form in gray goading him to kill. The German officer was dead. It was only an instant, however, before the latter's companions, furious with anger, had slain

both the mother and son. Somehow or other, the baby girl, then 6 months old, was not deemed culpable by the Germans and she escaped. The grandmother today thinks neighbors have cared for her and she wants the child, who is the only survivor of the Wagner family as far as the grim hand of war is con-

Mrs. Wagner tried through attorneys in Paris to locate the child, but failed. Then she sold her farm, sought Senator Harding of Ohio, and through his intervention the State Department investigated her story and finding it true gave her the coveted passports.
