





To insure maximum and profitable yields of corn it is highly important, according to the United States pare seed properly for planting. Far. ears are shelled. mers should devote as much time as necessary to the preparation of their work. They should discard all undesirable ears, after subjecting the corn to careful germination test, while subsequently they should nub,

First of all, it is essential that the grower carefully go over the seed ears he selected last fall in order to discard any that have discolored kernels or cobs or that have a dead ap- have been thoroughly tested as to pearance. Furthermore, he should throw out all extra light ears, as well as those with small or otherwise undesirable kernels, kernels with very sharp beaks, or with germs of poor development and appearance. The ears retained for seed purposes should show good development and maturity ,be heavy for their size, and contain solid, vigorous looking kernels of fairly uniform size and shape. These desirable ears should then be tested to determine whether all the kernels will grow.

RAINFALL FOR MONTH OF APRIL 5.41 IN. RECORDS SHOW

Rainfall for the month of April was 5.41 inches, records kept by the Government weather station here show. This amount fell in nine days of rainfall, bringing the total moisture for the year thus far up to 10.21 inches. This breaks all records for the same period of the past four years, as 1918 had rainfall amounting to 2.30 in. to the end of April; 1917 had 1.07 in. in the same period; 1916 had 3.57 in., and 1915 had 8.67

May, too, with only two days gone, has had rain amounting to 1.73 inch. as a heavy rain fell over the county, last night. Some hail accompanied the downpour. A rather heavy hail is reported to have fallen near halfway. Other points too, report hail.

The maximum temperature for April was 70.5 degrees; the minimum 44 degrees, and the average for the month, 57.2 degrees. The warmest day of the month was April 19, when the hermometer registreed 90; the lowest registration for the month was on April 9, 27 degrees. There were nineteen clear days, six partly cloudy, and five cloudy.-Plainview Herald.

A few days ago a woman complained that a dealer had unlawfully colleeted a tax of 13c on a fan pirced at |wear \$2 each. \$2.50. Her complaint was based upon the reading of a newspaper article hose, \$1 a pair. saying that the "luxury" tax section would become effective May 1, and that under it the price of a fan in excess of \$1 would be taxed 10 per cent. She figured that she would be due to pay a tax of 15c on a \$2.50 fan purchased after April 30, but was due to pay no tax whatsoever upon such a purchase in April.

She was wrong. The ribs of the fan in question were of ivory, and the fan, therefore, was subject to pay a tax of 5 per cent of the entire purchase price, being classified as "jewelry." The jewelry section became effective April 1.

But, especially because of the warn ings by Commissioner Roper, many cent of the full price. persons manifest a desire to be apprised of the advances in the war taxes.
