"I am deeply interested and every lover of the country must be in the vote to be taken by the people of Texas on the twenty-fourth on the constitutional amendment giving the women of Texas the right to vote, and take the liberty of expressing my confident hope that this exceedingly important amendment will be adopted."

PENALTY IS HEAVY FOR FALSE WEIGHT

Heavy penalties are fixed for violating the law enacted by the recent legislature fixing standards for weights and measures. A person taking or giving less than the number of pounds specified by law for any unit, with intent to gain advantage shall be liable to the party injured for double the amount of property wrongfully taken, and in addition shall be guilty of a misdemeanor with a fine of not to exceed \$200.

The law also says these weights shall be net and shall not include the weight of the container. All contracts involving weights and measures hereafter made shall be according to the legal standards, unless there is an expressed provision to the contrary. This act which carries the emergency clause and is now in effect, applies only to stocks of goods purchased after the act became effective, and it applies to parties outside of the state, as well as to those within the state.

All measures for measuring dry commodities shall not be heaped but shall be leveled full. The standard of weights used by the United States is declared the legal standard for Texas, and in addition, standards for various commodities are fixed. The governor has the power to fix a standard for any commodity which has been overlooked in the written law. The following standards for various commodities are fixed:

Wheat flour per barrel, 200 lbs.; corn meal per bushel, 50 pounds; alfalfa seed per bushel, 60 pounds; apples, green, per bushel 50 pounds, dried 28 lbs.; barley per bushel 48 pounds; beans, green or string per bushel 24 pounds; white beans per bushel 60 pounds; castor beans per bushel 46 pounds; beets per bushel 60 pounds; blue grass seed per bushel, 14 pounds; bran per bushel 20 pounds; buckwheat per bushel 52 pounds; carrots per bushel 50 pounds; clover seed per bushel 60 pounds, coal per bushel 80 pounds, coke 40 pounds per bushel; broom corn seed per bushel 48 pounds; corn meal, unbolted, per bushel 48 pounds, corn in the ear per bushel 70 pounds after Dec. 1, new crop before Dec. 1, 75 pounds; kaffir corn 56 pounds per bushel, cottonseed per bushel 32 pounds, shelled corn per bushel 56 pounds, unslacked lime per barrel 180 pounds net, hydrated lime per sack 100, oats bushel 32 lbs., onions per bushel 57 pounds, peaches per bushel 50 pounds, dried peaches per bushel, 28 lbs.; peanuts green per bushel 22 pounds, Georgia or Virginia 24 pounds per bushel, roasted, 26 lbs.; peppers per bushel 58 lbs.; popcorn in ear per bushel 70 lbs.; shelled popcorn per bushel 56 pounds; Irish potatoes 60 pounds per bushel; sweet potatoes 50 pounds, rye per bushel 56 lbs.; rye meal 50 pounds; coarse salt 55 pounds per bushel; fine salt, 50 pounds, tomatoes 56 pounds per bushel, walnuts 50 pounds per bushel; wheat per bushel 60 pounds.

The weights prescribed for flour will not become effective until October 1st of this year, but weights prescribed for corn meal and food stuffs are now effective.

GAS ENCOUNTERED IN OIL WELL AT TAHOKA

Lynn County News.
There was quite a little excitement in Tahoka last Monday when the drillers gave out the information that gas had been encountered in Cowan well No. One, three miles south of town. Many rumors have gone out about finding gas and oil and other things in this well, but this is the first information coming from the proper authorities, and the News is glad to print such items when we can do so on reliable information.

There is much speculation as to when the big oil will be encountered, but from the best information that can be had, everything indicates that we ought to have paying oil in Lynn County at a depth of 2,000 feet or less. People who are in position to know, and have been in oil fields with similar formation as this one, state that oil is generally found around a depth of 2,000 feet or less. A big gusher was found in the Amarillo field at a depth of about 1950 feet; their altitude is about six or seven hundred feet higher than in Lynn County. If that had anything to do with the depth of oil, Lynn County might expect a gusher any day.

Hundreds of people have been watching developments in Lynn county for a number of months with longing expectations, wondering whether or not they should invest. We feel sure they will wake up some morning telling their friends of what they might have made had they only taken advantage of the opportunities offered.

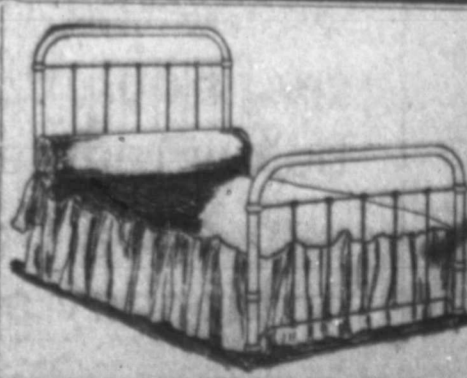

KANSAS CITY MARKET REPORT FOR MONDAY

Kansas City Stock Yards, May 12.
Material price changes occurred in all divisions of the live stock market today. Cattle were weak to 15 cents lower, except stockers and feeders. Hogs rose 15 to 50 cents, and sheep were down 40 to 75 cents. Demand for hogs was urgent and the outlet for both cattle and sheep was small.

Today's Receipts:
Close to 15000 cattle arrived today, and liberal supplies were reported elsewhere. Here offerings from the west predominated. Montana, Idaho, Oregon, Utah, California, Arizona, Texas and Colorado contributed a liberal number of steers, and there was a corresponding small supply from the corn belt. Hog receipts were 18,000, or 2000 more than a week ago, and 6000 larger than a year ago. Sheep 14,000, were 5000 larger than a week ago, and 4000 larger than a year ago.

Beef Steers
The inability of Pacific Coast market to care for cattle fed within their own territory has turned a large number of steers to this market. California sent thirty loads of steers and Oregon fifteen cars of steers today. The Salt River Valley in Arizona had a train load of fed steers.

The principal weakness in the market was in Western Fed Cattle and they were off 10 to 15 cents. Trading opened slowly but later was fairly active. Western steers sold mostly at \$13.25 to \$16.35 and native steers up to \$16.50. Cows and heifers were steady to 10 cents lower and calves steady. Cows sold at \$5.50 to \$14.00 and heifers \$9.50 to \$15.25.

Stockers and Feeders.
Stockers and feeders were in moderate supply, and prices were steady. A good many Western steers were bought as feeders at \$12.50 to \$14.00. Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas stockers sold at \$10.50 to \$15.00. Stock cows and heifers were scarce and steady.

Hogs
Though receipts of hogs were liberal, demand was urgent and prices rose 15 to 30 cents, mostly 25 cents, to within 20 to 25 cents of the high point reached last week. The top price was \$20.75, and the bulk of the hogs sold at \$20.25 to \$20.60. Pigs were 25 cents higher at \$18.00 to \$19.75. Heavy hogs of choice quality remained at a premium. Both shipping and packing demand is large.

Sheep and Lambs.
Dressed lamb and mutton prices were quoted \$2.00 to \$4.00 at Eastern markets last week, and that decline was reflected in the sheep market today with a drop of 50 to 75 cents. To aid the bearishness in the market offerings were wet. Woolled fed lambs sold at \$17.75 to \$18.50, springs \$17.75 to \$18.35, clipped lambs \$14.50 to \$15.00, and Texas sheep \$11.50 to \$13.00. Goats are quoted at \$7.25 to \$8.50.

4. Because by her work on the farm she helps to pay road taxes and she should be allowed to vote on where the roads are built.

5. Because experience in the granges has shown that women vote for farm interests.

6. Because the votes of the farm women would double the rural vote.

Farmers have less political influence than they had before the Civil War.

Farmers need to get back their political power to protect their interests.

Farm interests concern the farmer's wife just as much as the farmer.

Farmers and their wives voting together would conserve farm interests.

Farmers, your best interests would be served by votes for your wives. —Texas Equal Suffrage Association

Woman Suffrage.

Gordon, Texas, April 29.—In discussing universal suffrage George L. Beatty of Lubbock, Texas, quotes some interesting scripture. For instance, "But I permit not a woman to teach, nor to have dominion over a man, but to be in quietness." "And if they would learn anything let them ask their own husbands at home, for it is shameful for woman to speak in church." It seems that this prohibition of speech was strictly in regard to church matters. What kind of a church would we have in this day and time if it were a shame for a woman to speak or to participate in an experience or a thanksgiving service? Surely women should not be required to make signs or talk on her hands.

"The great controlling power for good is true womanhood." Mr. Beatty wisely says, and if woman suffrage will increase this power he is for it, otherwise. How are we to know unless we try the thing out, and how are we to inform our own wives who are to remain in silence and beg us for a little learning? "Is it not safest to remain in obedience to God's commandments?" Not in every instance. We employed six lady teachers in our public school here this winter and did well. No men teachers were to be found.

Lubbock, Texas, May 3.—I note W. Y. Finnell of Gordon, Texas, comments on my article published in The News of April 29 as to woman suffrage from a Bible standpoint.

In my humble judgment First Timothy, 2, xii, does not refer to school teaching.

I quote the whole verse: "But I suffer not a woman to teach, nor to usurp authority over the man, but to

be in silence." I said in the article, "Mothers mold the minds of all," how could the young mind be molded (taught) without teaching? A woman school teacher in no way, direct or indirect, usurps authority over man.

For ten years I was county judge of McCulloch county, Texas, and as county superintendent of schools I learned from experience that women school teachers, as a rule, in teaching and training children, were more successful than men school teachers.

I also said, "Is it not safest to remain in obedience to God's commandments?" To this question, Mr. Finnell's answer is "Not in every instance." To this my answer is "Times change and men often change with them, but God's laws never."

Nor can there be an excuse for disobedience, no matter how plausible. In my judgment, the employment of the women school teachers, that Mr. Finnell referred to, in no manner countered God's commandments.

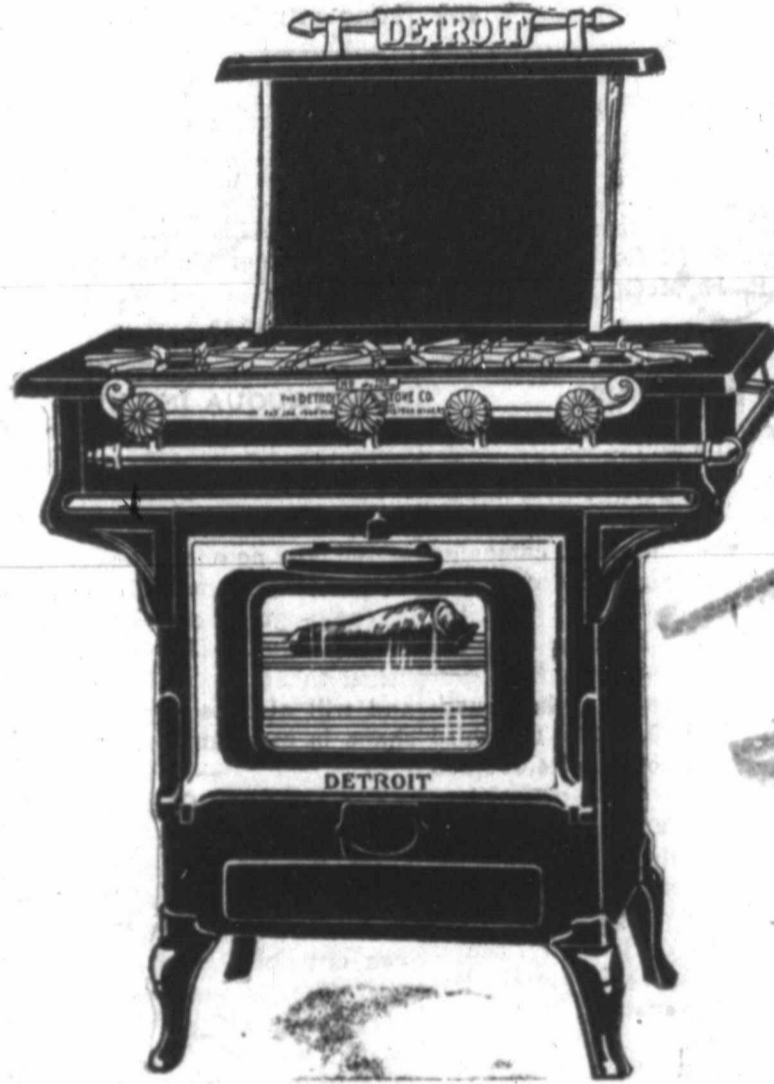

Washington, May 11.—Fifteen million Americans bought Victory Liberty loan notes in the campaign which closed last night, according to estimates received today by the Treasury from Federal Reserve Banks. This compares with about 21,000,000 purchasers in the fourth Liberty loan, 17,000,000 in the third, 9,400,000 in the second and 4,000,000 in the first.

The Treasury announced today that the official total probably would not be known before May 26. Banks will have until May 20 to report their subscriptions to Federal Reserve Banks and the Federal Reserve Bank will report to the Treasury by May 24.
