



hard and dangerous times. The night that we received news of the armistice, it was wonderful to behold, the American army, each man with his \*\*\*\*\*\*\* and so with the Ger-

In speaking of the days following which were spent in marching to the Rhine, a distance of 180 miles, Captain Stone says: So anxious were my men to move forward, that when many had worn their shoes until- it was hardly proper to call them that, with swollen feet, and their other wearing apparel in like shape, every man except one that was wounded marched the entire distance to the Rhine. Some of these were given permission to be carried back, but rather than return they would ask his permission to march in the softer part of the roads."

Captain Stone was raised in Wise, County and his parents reside in that county now. He will stay only a few days in Terry county with his brother, and then visit again with home-






