GOVERNOR PROCLAIMS NOVEMBER 11 HOLIDAY

Austin, Texas, Oct. 18.—Governor Hobby today issued the following

"It needs no reminder from the executive office to turn the hearts and minds of the people of this State to Tuesday, Nov. 11, 1919, the first anniversary of the day upon which became effective the armistice agreed upon by the contenders in the great world war...

"About every hearthstone in this State gathered those whose daily prayers were for the success of the arms of all nations which America was associated, and for safe return of our citizen soldiery who had journeyed overseas to break the power, destroy the will and humble the pride of that military machine that sought to put every nation in subjection. For more than three years we had witnessed an unequal contest. Combined armies of allied nations were giving way to the advance of the invader, and the fortunes of war did not turn until the flower of American manhood, supported by the spirit of American womanhood, had joined the conflict, From the hour of the first American drive, the tide of battle turned and one victory followed another in such succession that the enemy welcomed the opportunity to sign the agreement that would be followed by the order to 'cease fir-

FOR TEXAS SOLDIERS

A campaign to raise \$500,000 for the purpose of erecting and equipping a tubercular sanitarium, probably on State lands at Carlsbad, for the tuberculosis was decided upon at a meeting of the recently chartered Benevolent War Risk Society of Texas, held in the hall of the House of Representatives today. The Texas war memorial is the name suggested for the sanitarium.

State Health Officer C. W. Goddard is to have direct charge of the campaign. The Governor is called upon to request the Liberty loan organization of Texas to raise the required amount and to ask all civic. patriotic and religious organizations to co-operate. It was stressed that the primary burden of raising the funds will rest upon the Liberty loan

The board of directors of the soriety was requested to work out the details of the classes of membership. It was suggested that the scale of memberships range as follows: Subscribing membership, \$1 to \$10; contributing, \$10 to \$100; lift, \$100 to \$1,000; memorial, \$1,000 and up.

The Governor will be requested to name an executive committee to act with Dr. Goddard in waging the campaign. Subscriptions are now acceptable, all membership fees payable to Governor Hobby. No date was fixed for opening the campaign, but it is expected to begin at the earliest pos-

A negro State or Territory in the Rio Grande Valley, partly in Mexico and partly in Texas, governed by nebut under protection of the United States, with this Government given the veto power as to their laws, s the dream of a delegation of fifty negroes coming to Washington from the States of Alabama, Georgia, Kansas, Missouri, Mississippi, Okla-homa and Tennessee. Dr. M. M. Madden, a negro evangelist and at-torney of Oklahoma City, and Bishop J. C. Campbell, also a negro of the Free Will Methodist Church of St Louis, spokesman and chairman of the delegation, respectively, were at the Capitol today communicating the plan for a negro State or Territory to the members of the House and Senate. If the President's health permits, they hope to secure an in-

Dr. Madden, originator of scheme, while a resident of what is now Oklahoma for the last twenty years, is supreme president of the National Court of Protection of Terre Haute, Ind. He says that the plan is nothing along the line of the Gold Coast colonization scheme of Chief Sam, who ten years ago endeavored to lead a beck-to-Africa movement among the negroes of Oklahoma. The Madden plan is essentially the same as that proposed at one time for the American Indian whereby all the Indians of the United States were to be placed in what is now the State of

It is to be proposed that the Gov-ernment purchase 500 square miles of land along the Rio Grande in Texas and a like area from the Mexican Government immediately opposite the Texas acreage, into which all of the negroes of the United States would be moved. 



Austin, Oct. 7 .- Attention of hunters is called to important and maand upland plover, and fixes a daily bag limit of 25 on doves. The State law allows a maximum of but 15

The new bag limits and open seasons follow: Deer, three bucks, from Novem-

per 1 to December 31.

Turkey, three gobblers, March 1 to

Doves 15 per day, September 1 to

December 15. Quail or Mexican pheasants, 15 per day, December 1 to January 31.

Ducks, 25 per day, October 16 to

Geese, brant and sandhill crane, 3 per day, October 16 to January 31. A maximum of 25 is fixed as a day's bag limit, which would include any combination of birds listed above. Farmers may kill birds destroying growing crops by obtaining a proper permit without regard to limit or season.

Shooting migratory fowl from mo tor or sail boats is prohibited by federal law. All such boats carrying passengers must obtain a license from the game, fish and oyster de-

The State law prohibits the hiring or employing of another person to hunt and makes it a misdemeaor to accept such employment. This prevents even the giving of a box of shells to a person to hunt for an-

Game now may be shipped without the hunter accompanying the shipment by protecting the bag with an affidavit. These affidavits may be taken by express agents, train auditors, conductors and boat captains.

The new hunters license costs \$2 each and is required when hunting beyond the confines of a person's own resident county, even on land owned by the hunter.

The only closed season on squirrels is in Angelina, Cherokee, Hardin, Liberty, Nacogdoches, Dallas, Rockwall, Tyler, Jefferson, Orange, Jasper and Newton counties. This season extending from January 1 to Ser tember 1 with a bag limit of five daily. There is no bag limit or closed season on Javelinas and Peccaries.

HEALTH CRUSADE TO BEGIN NOVEMBER FIRST

Austin, Texas .- The second tournament of the Modern Health Cru-sade in Texas will be held between November 1 and February 28, according to an announcement by the State Crusade Director, Miss Louise Hunter, Director of Children's Work, of the Texas Public Health Associa-

The tourney of the present school year will be for ten weeks, and it is expected that 500,000 children of the Lone Star State will take up the fight for cleanliness and good health. Last year over 310,000 school children between the ages of 6 and 16, in 135 counties; of Texas, became pages, squires and knights and knight bannerets on the field of Health

The Second Health Crusade has been indorsed by Miss Annie Webb Blanton, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, in a letter to all superintendents, school officers and teachers of Texas.

Miss Blanton declared that reports from all over the state showed that the Crusade aided the children to form the proper health habits, teaching them persistence, self-denial, and self-control. She hopes to see the Crusade carried into every school in the State, thus to carry on the important work of "Child conserva-

The Junior Red Cross will this year, as last, sponsor the Modern Health Crusade, which will be directed by Miss Hunter from the State office of the Texas Public Health Association. This Association will have charge of the sale of 20,000,000 Red Cross Christmas seals from December 1 to 10, and is thus enabled to carry the message of good health to the

As the children faithfully perform their health "chores" during the ten weeks of the tournament they are promoted in the ranks of chivalry. After two weeks of work they may become pages; in three weeks more, squires; and when the ten weeks are up, knights. They will be presented the badges of their rank. The cause of cleanliness and good health is combined with the glamor of romance.

The health chores that each performs are kept on record. They are; "(1) I washed my hands before each meal today. (2) I washed not only my face by my ears and neck and I cleaned my fingernails today. (3) I kept fingers, pencils and every thing likely to be unclean or injurious out of my mouth and nose to-day. (4) I brushed my teeth thor-oughly after breakfast and after the evening meal today. (5) I took ten or more slow, deep breaths of fresh air today. I was careful to protect others if I spit, coughed or sneezed. (6) I played out-doors or with windows open more than thirty minutes today. (7) I was in bed ten hours or more last night and kept windows (8) I drank four glasses of. water, including a drink before each meal, and drank no coffee, tea, or other injurious drinks today. (9) tried to eat only wholesome food and to eat slowly. I went to toilet at my regular time. (10) I tried hard to-day to sit up and stand straight; to keep neat, cheerful and clean-minded; and to be helpful to others. (11) I took a full bath on each of the days of the week that are checked (x) on my record."





MANY LABORERS COMING TO LUBBOCK RECENTLY
