#### ROBY TO SWEETWATER

W. K. Palmer, president of the Engineers Service Corporation of Kan-S. M. Sears, the Santa Fe land sas City, Mo., was in Sweetwater man, left Monday for Seagraves, Saturday making a preliminary survey of the feasibility of the proposed extension of the Roby and Northern railway from Roby to this city. Lawrence Eastland, general manager of the Roby & Northern, was with Mr. Palmer on the trip.

In company with George H. Sheppard, secretary of the Board of City Development, the visitors made a trip of inspection over the country between Sweetwater and Roby, taking notes of grades and other natural conditions of the country, to be used as data in recommending a survey for the right of way for the proposed extension. The party also made an inspection tour of the country south of Sweetwater to ascertain the approximate cost of an extension further south at some time in the fu-ture, should the road be extended here from Roby.

The need for this extension has been recognized for some time by citizens of both Sweetwater and Roby, and at a meeting held several months ago by citizens of both places it was shown that the two towns would support the project. Such connection would give Roby and intermediate points much better freight and passenger service to the east, west and south and would open a trade territory for Sweetwater. Mr. Palmer returned to Kansas City Saturday night. He stated his intention to return to Sweetwater at some time within the near future, at which time he expected to see definite action develop on the proposed extension.—Sweetwater Reporter.

#### 3,000 IMMIGRANTS ARE SEEKING ENTRANCE

New York, Dec. 28 .- More than 3,000 immigrants were clamoring at the gates of New York tonight for admission into the United States. Ellis Island-is congested and many hundreds of the incoming passengers are being detained on board steamships for examination.

Immigration-inspectors and special boards of inquiry are working day and night to relieve the unprecedented conditions. In the meantime hun-

Police and coast guards are duty at the piers and the Ellis Island ferry entrance to hold in check the crowds which gather at the gates Several attempts have been made by friends and relatives of the detained passengers to storm the piers in an effort to reach the ships. They cannot understand the delay and fear their friends are to be de-

Immigration officials claim that their work is delayed to a large ex-tent on Ellis Island because of the congestion there due to the detention of a large number of radicals and undesirables being held for deportation. The greater number of the immi-grants being detained are Italians, it was stated. Several hundred Greek

passengers are also held. Although the steamship Patria has been in port five days, 473 passengers from the 1,880 that came from Italy are still being detained. On the Giuseppi Verdi, another Italian liner, approximately 700 steerage passengers have been held for further examination.

Less than 300 of the 1,620 steer age passengers on board the liner Europa, which arrived Dec. 18, have had a first examination. Four hundred and thirty of the 2,050 steet passengers on the Royal Italian Mail liner Taormina and fifty of the steerage complement of the Maure-



PROHIBITION TEST IS SET FOR JANUARY 5TH

Washington, Dec. 22.-The Suoreme Court today recessed until lanuary 5, without handing down an opinion on the constitutionality of sections of the Volstead prohibition enforcement act affecting the alco-

holic content of beer. The court ordered the Government to show cause on Jan. 5 why original roceedings should not be instituted by the States of Rhode Island and New Jersey retail liquor dealers to have determined the constitutionality of the national prohibition amend-

Applications for permission to contest the amendment's validity and seek injunction against its enforcement in those States were presented last week. In both instances, the amendment was alleged to conflict with the State police powers and with

the Federal Constitution. In ordering the Government show cause, the court, according to Government attorneys, followed an unusual procedure, as ordinarliy in such instances, permission to bring such proceedings is given and a date fixed when they are returnable. The court, however, was generally believed to have been prompted by the fact that as the amendment becomes effective on Jan. 16 next, the procedure followed would expedite mat-

past few months. 'The National Retail Shoe Dealers' Association has appointed an executive committee to confer for the purpose of re-establishing a similar

rule within their organization. 'The National Retail Dry Goods Association, representing some 20,000 stores in the United States, is cooperating with the department justice in establishing prominently economic departments during January and February.

Committee Names. "Several of the larger manufacturers' associations, as well as wholesale and retail merchants' associations, have appointed committees to confer with agents of the department of justice and are putting their entire machinery at the disposal of the department to carry out programs to the membership. Such efforts will be extended to other organizations to co-operate toward reduced profits.

Beyond this the department ustice has established a thoroughgoing organization, consisting of housands of men and women, to bring about regulations in the cost of living through education and through moral suasion.

The women of the country, whose hands rests the power largely to control the cost of living through purchase, have been organized to carry certain educational facts t the consuming and buying public, as we'll as to determine fair prices in local communities and to hunt out the profiteers and report violations of the Lever act.

"Primarily, the notable factors involved in the cost of living are the needed increase in production, the elimination of extravagant buying and the determined hunting down of profiteers of all classes. I believe that the time has now come when the organization of the country has been completed to the point where real results can be shown: The cost of living, already under control, can be reduced if everyone who produces will produce his utmost, if those who buy and consume will save and eliminate extravagance, and if all honest people will join with the department of justice in stamping out profiteering and hoarding."

DWELLINGS TO GET

Austin, Texas, Dec. 27 .- The Texas State Fire Insurance Commission has made an order, effective Jan. 1. 1920, wherein it applies the 100 per cent coinsurance clause on risks consisting of grain products of all kinds, excepting hav, and slight reduction on the dwelling and dwelling content rate in Texas by providing that one-third the key rate, instead of one-half thereof, shall be used in computing such ratings in cities, towns and villages, This last will effect every dwelling and small apartment house in Texas where there is a key rate applicable. It will not apply to the rural risks

A committee of bankers and grain men appeared before the State Fire Insurance Commission when it considered the 100 per cent coinsurance clause and advocated its adoption so that full values and full protection would be assured on grain and grain products coverage. The Texas law forbids the 100 per cent coinsurance clause, except on cotton, woo', grain and mohair. The Attorney General held that the definition "grain" would extend to grain by-products. The nsurance men favored the 100 cent clause except on risks in towns having a key rate of more than 41c. They objected there because of supposed inadequate fire protection. However, the commission's order is general in its scope, reading as fol-


