#### AGRICULTURAL FUNDS TO BE USED IN TEXAS

Washington, Feb. 14 .-- Texas agriculture will receive a large share of attention as a result of the agricultural appropriation bill carrying \$30,000,000 passed by the House to-day. Fifty thousand dollars was added to the appropriation of \$2,500, 000 for the foot and mouth disease, for use in combatting the screw-worm and blowfly in live stock and poultry, as the result of an amend-Representative ment offered by Hudspeth.

The pecan and nut industry se-cures \$45,000 and \$456,000 is set aside for the fight upon predatory animals. The Bureau of Animal Husbandry is given \$681,000 for its campaign against the cattle tick, and more than \$500,000 for work against the scables in sheep and cattle. hog cholera item was reduced to \$41,-

While the department estimated \$700,000 for the Bureau of Crop Estimates, the House accepted the com-mittee's allowance of \$332,000. The House adopted the committee's recommendation of \$577,000 for the fight against the introduction of the ink boolworm.

ER'S CONTRACTS. From time immemorial, teachers' complaints at low wages have received the reply that the law of supply and demand must govern the rate of their compensation. During the last two years, the law of supply and demand has begun to operate in favor of the teacher, for almost the first, time within the memory of man. Naturally, therefore, teachers who have commenced to view their profession more hopefully, deeply resent attempts to manipulate matters so that the law of supply and demand shall not result to the advantage of the teacher. Efforts to hold teachers by unfair means, are, to say the least, short-sighted. A teacher who is dissatisfied and unhappy cannot be a d teacher for our Texas children. The best basis of good work is the assurance of justice and fair dea-As a rule, teachers do not know, until after the close of the session, what positions for the next year will be open. The teachers' opportunity to secure a better place is usually of very brief duration. Some school boards, before the close of the session require teachers to accept or decline a place for the next session. This forces many who do not know what chances may be theirs, to take again an unsatisfactory position, this custom sometimes resulting in a sort of peonage of teachers. The teacher has nothing to sell but her services. In justice to her, there ought to be some time when she can offer these in an open market. If the teacher endeavors, without success, to secure a better position, she is more like-333 ly to become satisfied with her former place. If she suceeds, her formit might fairly accord to the teacher one month of indecision, if she desires this Accordingly, I suggest that, as a measure towards greater justice to teachers, school boards grant to all teachers who may wish it, the month of June, in which to decide whether to renew their former contracts. In my opinion, this plan of an open sesion | for the teacher's contract, would in the end, save time for the school board and the superintendent. I have had, this year, many appeals to cancel teachers' certificates, as a penalty of breach of contract. To most of these cases, there was nore than one side. The contract protects the teacher. Most teachers would not have the contract-plan abolished. For its resulting injustices, there is only one remedy-a kind and sympathetic school board. I think that a teacher should hold her plighted word above the most tempting offer of a better place, unless she is released by the school board. Teachers who have taught only a few months in a position should not ask for a release. But those who have, for several years, given faithful-service, are entitled to consideration when opportunity knocks at the door. Without imbition, progress in work in any line, will not be rapid. The teacher should be shown that the way is open to ambition and that true worth will eceive recognition. While the law binds the teacher, under certain conditions, it does not equally bind the board. If a board fact equally bind the board. If a board ting should contract with a teacher to teach a certain length of term, the teacher cannot hold them to the con-tract, if the funds should be insufficient to support the school for this length of time. The teacher finds her-self without employment, with no re-course for the broken contract. Some school boards have the erroneous imschool boards have the erroneous impression that the law requires them to hold a teacher to her contract, whatever the conditions. The law allows them to release her. It is for the boards to determine, whether justice to teacher and school permits the release. It is probable that we shall always have with us the irresponsible teacher who looks lightly upon a





We believe this is one of the best steps taken for the benefit of the farmers of the South Plains section. By starting the school in December the children will have ample time to help their parents gather their crops and in saving of hundreds of dollars annually. Unlike many sections of the North and East, the South Plains country is blessed with cool summer months, therefore the one big objection which has always stood in theway of postponement of the opening date of schools is done away with. Cool pleasant months of the summer of this section of the country makes it ideal for the children to study. September, October and November will be the dates for the holidays for the children, which we think are the most ideal. Parents will have more time to spend with them during these months than those of mid-summer. Another thing about the South Plains which is also another strong argument in favor of opening schools in December and that is, we have found during the short and wonderful history of this section of the country that the farmers could very easily cultivate more land than they could successfully harvest the crops grown thereon. Therefore the children, unlike districts in other sections, will not be needed in planting of the crops as badly as when harvesting time comes.

Judge Moore states that the school board of this county, in company with bimself, Miss Millie M. Halsey and Carrol Thompson, County Demon-stration Agent, will visit every school in the county. They hope to have in attendance at the schools all the trustees of the various schools and the matter will be talked, discussed and presented to the people.





For the year 1919 the taxed values of property for Lubbock county renained the same as the previous year but the tax rate was raised 35 cents per hundred dollar property valuaton, thus for the year 1919 the tax rolls call for tax payments of the amount of \$194,000.00, of this amount \$165,000 00 has been paid up to date with several weeks yet remaining to pay with penalty and the balance of the year for redemption, which will probably bring the entire mount called for in.

In the above amount of taxes colected for the year 1919 is not in-luded \$5,000 automobile tax which held as a separate item; also the three independent school Districts in-cluding Lubbock, Salton and the town of Abernathy which has the maxium school tax of 50 cents per hundred dollar property valuation. Of the entire collectable taxes for the State and county, \$115,000.00 was ollected in the month of January, 1920, or nearly twice that ever paid a single month in the history of he' county.

The property valuation of the city of Lubbock is \$3,136,640.00 for the year 1919. Taxes on this property for the year 1919 remained the same as for the year 1918 or \$1.20 per one hundred dollar property valuation. Thus, according to the rolls, there should be paid for 1919 into the City Treasury \$37,639.68, of this amount \$34,010.59 has been collected (this amount does not include polls assessed nor collected). For the year 1918 the tax rolls called for \$36,-014.16, of this amount there was collected \$26,824.69.

SERIOUS DISCUSSION OF A DANGEROUS SITUATION.

Baltimore, Md., Jan. 20, 1920. Hon. Fred, W. Davis, Commissioner of Agriculture, Austin, Texas.

Dear Sir: One of the most vital questions ffecting the welfare of humanity is the price of foodstuffs. Until foodstuffs decline and thus bring a reduced cost of living, I cannot see that there can be any material decline in labor's wages or in the cost of other operations.

The decrease of about 25 per cent in the acreage of winter wheat and rye and the word which comes to us from many parts of the South as to the great decrease in acreage because of the scarcity of labor are typical signs, inidcating, I fear, a very great decreased production in foodstuffs of all kinds.

For years the Manufacturers Rec-ord has warned the country that there would inevitably be a rise in the cost of foodstuffs. We took this position long before the war. In former years the farm interests of the country never received a fair share of the enormous profits of the country, and farm labor was never adequately paid. Under present conditions the scarcity of labor is so great and prices so high that I cannot see any possible increase but rather a decrease in the acreage of most crops. This will mean continued high prices for grain and cotton and provisions.

It seems to me that this situation should receive a thorough study on the part of the business interests of the country and of the Federal Government. I do not look for any change for the better until the building of good righways has made farm life more attractive, has stopped the tendency of country population to concentrate in the cities, and has made motor truck and automobile transportation feasible everywhere and thus lessened the cost of handling LAST SUNDAY, HELD SERVICES. goods of all kinds between the farm and the city.

The high cost of living, which is commanding the attention of so many people, is due primarily to two causes which were an outgrowth of this false teaching, and business failure of producers. One reason is an unnecessary and unreasonable number of people engaged in handling our produce, caused by the movement from the country to town. The other reason is the cupidity of man, which has caused some of the shrewdest and best trained minds to exact profits far beyond their possible needs or the bounds of common justice. In my opinion, the conscienceless profiteers are more to blame for our present unrest than any other one factor, Their acts of greed breed Bolshevists faster than our officials can run them down. They are doubly dangerous because they are possessed of extraor-linary intellects.

### TEMS OF INTEREST TO OUR FARMER READERS.

The Old Way vs. The New. Roy Smith of Krum, Route 2 has young Poland China pig which is furnishing a great deal of amuse-ment in the Smith family, according to a report made to the Extension Service A. and M. College by County Agent Jack Shelton, of Denton. Early in the spring Roy's father, U. B. Smith, announced to his family that he intended to reverse the usual form of club stories. He said that he had observed that "sons" always beat the "dads" in stories of club pigs, calves, etc., and that he thought it quite time for Dad to teach Son a thing or two about raising pigs. So Dad and Son started a pig-feeding contest. They commenced with pigs of the same age, but of different breeds. Each selected the breed he believed would make the best meat hog, and each fed the ration he thought best. The last reports show that Son's pig is simply walking off and leaving Dad's like it was tied to post. It weighs exactly twice as

Well, Dad ought to feel proud of the results for he is far ahead of the boy and has the best of the deal. The Dad has a sorry pig, but a fine boy, while the boy only has a fine pig. The boy has a lifetime to make a profit out of his method of feeding, while dad has only a few years to lose money by his method of feeding at best It must be a mighty com-fortable feeling to know that you have a boy that can play the game and win. It is better togrear a fine boy than to raise a fine pig. We believe dad is the winner.

Killing Lice On Chickens.

In the winter time we advise ap-plying sodium fluoride by the so-cal-'pinch" method, to kill lice on chickens, advises W. F. Kazmeier, Poultry Husbandman of Extension Service A. & M. College of Texas. A "pinch" is all the powder you can hold between two fingers, and should be placed on ten different parts of the chicken, close to the skin as follows: One pinch below the vent, one under each wing, one on each thigh, one on the tail, two on the back, one on the breast and one on the neck

In warm weather a dip may be made by mixing one ounce of sod-ium flouride to one gallon of water.

Beating Dad. County Agent J. B. Dorman of Newton county, reporting to the Extension Service, relates an incident of a club boy's triumph over his father in the production of peanuts. While visiting at N. F. Hampton's place, the father admitted that his son Herbert had beaten him raising peanuts. Mr. Hampton painted peanuts adjoining his boy's acre and had the land prepared and cultivated according to the usual plan. However, Herbert handled his acre under the the tension Service A. and M. An embargo on all cotton in to Lubbock over the Santa Fe railroad has been in effect about three weeks; buyers state that it is impossible to get the local station to accept cotton for shipment, thus the buyers are unwilling to buy the cotton and tie up their funds under the present outlook. With the railroads of the country facing one of the greatest strikes ever known and the already congested conditions buyers have a very unfavorable impression of the early outcome of the deplorable condition.

PRESENT COTTON SITUATION

DECLARED' "DEPLORABLE."

One company which has a repre-sentative in Lubbock, state that they have more than \$3,000,000.00 worth of cotton tied up in transit. Cotton was selling three weeks ago, or just before the embargo for 38 cents per pound, that is middling cotton. Today the same class of cotton has been offered for sale in Lubbock for 30 cents, we are informed by one buyer who was thus offered The buyer states that he could not afford to buy even at these figures, giving more reasons, that the large cotton firms were waiting on the settlement of the Peace Treaty in hopes of securing better and more markets and would not buy until this was settled.

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

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
