





The Agricultural and Mechanical College was invited to organize a statewide campaign during the month of January, 1920 to put the program into effect. An invitation was also extended for the co-operation of all public and private agencies interested in the agricultural welfare of the state, and of all local and State or-

ganizations of farmers. Farming Program for 1920 1. There is need for the utmost economy consistent with proper living, and efficient operation of the farm. Ventures which are speculative in character or not essential to

comfort or profit should be avoided

at this time. 2. The indications are that the shortage of farm labor in 1920 will be as great or even greater than it was in 1919. Hence great caution should be exercised in determining the acreage of each crop to be planted. 

Carrying a Ton a Mile for less than a Cent

Freight rates have played a very small part in the rising cost of living.

Other causes - the waste of war, under-production, credit inflation - have added dollars to the cost of the necessities of life, while freight charges have added only cents.

The average charge for hauling a ton of freight a mile is less than a cent.

A suit of clothing that sold for \$30 before the war was carried 2,265 miles by rail from Chicago to Los Angeles for 16% cents.

Now the freight charge is 22 cents and the suit sells for \$50.

The cost of the suit has increased 20 dollars. The freight on it has increased only 5; cents.

Other transportation charges enter into the cost of the finished article-carrying the wool to the mills and the cloth to the tailors but these other charges amount to but a few cents

The \$10 pair of shoes that used to sell for \$5 goes from the New England factory to the Florida dealer for a freight charge of 5% cents—only one cent more than the pre-war rate.

Beef pays only two-thirds of a cent a pound freight from Chicago to New York.

American freight rates are the lowest in the world.





NO SPECIAL SESSION ON PAY OF TEACHERS

Austin, Texas.-Governor Hobby has come out unequivocally and said there will be no special session of the Legislature to consider the school teacher problem. He said the Legislature is not now in a position to remedy the situation, but that if conditions changed he reserved the right to conevene the lawmakers. This was written in response to an inquiry from Kent Watson of Fort Worth, who said he was writing in behalf of members of the American Legion, his letter reading as follows:

"In behalf of the members of the American Legion, I want to inquire from you as to whether you contemplate calling a special session of the Legislature at any time within the next few months.

"We are very onxious to see the school teachers' proposition remedied and have also another important matter to come up for consideration.

"Information regarding your intentions of calling a special session will be treated as strictly confidential and I will very much appreciate an early

"With my kindest good wishes for the continued good health and sur-cess of you and yours, I remain,

The Governor replied as follows: "Replying to your recent letter I beg to advise that I see no prospect of a special session of the Legislature. I do not know of the existence of an extraordinary condition such as is contemplated in the Constitution for the calling of a special session, which, in my judgment, there is no reason to believe the Legislature can remedy.

Up to People of Texas The school teacher problem is up to the people of Texas in the form of a constitutional amendment to remove the limit of taxation for school purposes in local school districts. If this amendment is carried it will be within the power of each and every school district of Texas to deal with the low salary teacher problem and alleviate that menace to our schools during the next term. The amendment is to be voted on in November and, in my judgment, it is fortunate that the amendment is to be acted upon during this crisis in the educational affairs of Texas. The issue is squarely before those most vitally concerned, the people of Texas, who are in a position to act more effectively than the Legislature. 



376 MORE CARS IN LUBBOCK COUNTY THIS YEAR

According to the figures of the Tax Collector of this county, there are 376 more cars registered this year than last year, or 1,015 cars. It is thought by Mr. Holcomb, the collector, that there is probably at least one hundred unregistered cars in the county, but of course those figures are not vouched for their correctness. 1919 there was 639 automobiles registered here. The tax on these cars range from the lowest being on the Oakland of \$7.50, to as high as the Cadillac, or \$11.85, all according to the horse power of the individual car. The tax on Ford cars is slightly higher than that imposed on the Oakland or \$7.70.

Thus from the above figures, we find that not less than \$7,000.00 has been collected from the auto tax which will be divided or has been divided with the State and the county

FARMERS WARNED TO LIMIT COTTON CROP

Washington, Feb. 16.—An increased acreage in cotton this year is out of the question, according to Dr. Bradford Knapp, who recently resigned as chief of the office of extension work in the South with the Department of Agriculture, University of Arkansas.

"The experiences of 1919 ought to teach Southern cotton farmers that they can not handle, with their present supply of labor, an increased ac-reage in cotton; the labor is not there," writes Dr. Knapp in one of his last works before leaving the Department of Agriculture, entitled "Safe Farming in the Southern States in 1920.

"By 'safe farming,' " Knapp, "is meant a system which maintains soil fertility, produces the food and feed for the people and live stock in sufficient quantities to insure a comfortable surplus, and produces cotton as a strictly cash crop.'
No Time for "Cotton Killing"

"Is 'safe farming," as thus defin-ed, needed in the South in 1920?" asks the Department of Agriculture. "There are probably those who think not. Cotton is so high-so much higher than it ever was before. The supply is apparently so short—the cotton mills of the world so greatly in need of cotton. Is it not a timethe one time in a lifetime-when the farmer can turn his whole energy to cotton and 'make a killing?'

Without specifically asking question, Dr. Knapp answers. word to the farmers of the South is that the plan followed the last few years is still good. The only safe plan for farmers and bankers, is to insist

upon a safe farming program.
"Cotton," Mr. Knapp says, "is not actually very high. It is high as compared with prices in former years, not as compared with current prices of other commodities. Before the far-mer decides that the high price of cotton will warrant his planting the entire acreage to that crop to the neglect of all else, he says he had better make a pretty thorough examination of the retail prices of the neces home gardens. Maintain production own farm."

The purpose now is mainly not to reduce the acreage in food and feed crops. If we provide for the necessaries of life and a well balanced husbandry, the production of cotton can be sustained in a good season and the prosperity of the South assured."

uncalled for distinction between cotton prices in the different sections of the State the past season and that the distinction was made in disfavor of the farmers of the Southplains, is becoming more and more discerni-ble to our people. "That the South Plains Cotton Association should meet in the near future and start active agitation against this distinction," is a matter now in contemplation by members of the organization. One farmer is of the opinion that if figures were available to affirm the fact, there would be a startling amount lost through this source of price distinction of the same grades of cotton over the State to the South Plains farmers, giving one reason which might solve the problem, that being, farmers here have been in the cotton raising and marketing busi-ness only a short period, thereby selling this crop with less care than the average east Texas farmer. He also thinks, that in the eastern counties here is more competition among the buyers thus raising the price. It is the judgment of this Lubbock county farmer that there was at least two cents difference through the buying period of East Texas cotton of the same staple and class with that of the Southplains cotton.

The following letter was received here this week, showing some figures that the cotton merchants in East Texas think should be known; especially the fact that the spinners are declaring exorbitant dividends:

HOW I RAISED MY CHICKENS.

Goldie Potts, Age 14 Canyon Club.

Since I can remember I always had a liking for poultry. Although it takes any one quite a while to make a success at anything. I first fixed a good warm nest, as early as any hen would set and I set my first hen Mar. the eleventh. Next one, the twentyfourth of March and set one twentysecond of May. I set all hens on

15 eggs each." The first hen hatched ten chickens and I raised them all. The second-one hatched thirteen. They all liv-ed. The third hen hatched thirteen,

but I only raised eight.

When they were first hatched, I did not feed them for forty-eight hours. Then I fed them corn bread and hard boiled eggs. As they grew older, I fed them more. After six weeks I went to feeding them grain and gave them free range all the

Out of the thirty-six hatched, I raised thirty-one and sold four at \$2.85 and I have twenty-seven left, which I value the cockerels at \$3.00 each, and hens at \$2.00 each, I now have 14 cockerels, valued at \$42; 18 pullets, valued at \$26; and sold 4 pullets at \$2.85, making an estimate of feed at \$6.00, and estimate of work at \$4.85. After figuring up my expenses, I find that I have \$60.00.

which I am very proud of.

I am sure club work has helped me very much for I have learned several things about how to feed and care for little chickens. Things I did not know, I would try and find out by reading the Poultry Page in farm papers and the bulletins sent out by the Department.


