Of the 1,053 convicts received in 1919 a total of 257 were farmers, 102 cooks and waiters, 57 chauffeurs, 44 machinists and engineers and 45

ranged from one year to life impris-onment, about 250 were short-termers of two years.

Convictions of persons between 16 and 20 years of age showed unusual increase over 1918, the figures being 254 and 218, respectively, further ac-centuated by the fact that 1,284 convicts were received in 1918, as against 1,053 in 1919. The same ratio is shown for men between 60 and 70 years of age, with 22 and 13, respectively. All other ages showed marked decreases.

In 1919 a total of 455 whites and 475 negroes were received, against 482 whites and 669 negroes in 1918. The negroes showed a material decrease. Of the 1919 convicts received 219 were totally illiterate, against 376 in 1918. Some 834 had from common to good education.

The religious belief of the new convicts showed as follows: No church 598, Baptists 184, Catholic 137, Methodist 74, Christian 28, Presbyterian 19, Lutheran 4, Jews 2 and Congregational 1.

No epidemic occurred, says the report, hence the death rate was low, having been but forty-three. Of these twelve were due to tuberculosis, which was the leading cause. One was killed by lightning, one suicided and three drowned, two were killed by fellow convicts and nine by guards in attempting to escape.







Of the 4,083,041 male children reported by the census of 1900, be tween the ages of ten and fourteen, 875,640 were wage earners; and of the 3,997,193 female children of the same ages as stated above, 321,982 were workers. In all, 1,197,324 of the nation's children, between the ages of ten and fourteen, were earn-ing their bread and helping to support the home. There are two explanations, chief

ly, for child labor: one is poverty, the other is greed. To a large extent present conditions make it necessary for each member of the family to be a producer, if possible. Industrial-ism is merciless in it's grind, exacting in it's demands, and inhuman in it's greed. Children are employed because their labor can be had for a pittance. This maiming of children and blighting of the nation's childhood constitutes one of the darkest blots upon the industrial life of our nation. Recent legislation has made some progress in safeguarding our children from industrial crime.

The effect of child labor has been physiological and psychological in its relation to the home. If the home is to survive and perpetuate itself, each generation must produce another generation strong in mind and body. Child labor so dwarfs and injures physical and mental powers that when maturity is reached such one can hardly become the parent of a strong, virile, and capable offspring. When Charles Dickens came to Amerand ica he went into a manufacturing center to study it's industrial life. He remarked that the employees looked like "human beings," not like "beasts of burden." A writer, commenting on this, says that if he were to come today to the same center, he would see "the product" of the evolution of two generations. He would see no smiling children, moving about with songs on their lips, but children coming perilously near having the mien of "beasts of burden," so greatly have conditions succumbed to a system brutalized by greed and the exigencies of modern industry.

In the second place, when the child becomes a laborer he loses the in-fluence and companionship of home life. The day is spent in the work-shop. At night he wearily drags himself home to supper and to bed, to be off again early in the morning. Home means only a place to eat and sleep. Then, self support gives him the spirit of independene long before he is ready for it. He soon begins to chafe under the restraints of home, and to rebel against parental women in the nation were engaged authority. 

less than seven million of these ell has an enrollment of 17,600 wage earners, of whom 6,000 are women. New York City has 400,000 women workers; Iowa has 100,000, Michigan 125,000, and New Jersey has 150,000 sixteen years of age and over. A recent report gives one Texas city 25,000 and another 30,000 young omen wage-earners.

In many cases these have become wage-earners because of necessity. Thousands of them have no home of heir own, hence, are thrown upon their own resources and the only thing to do is work. Again: their presence in industrial life is due in part to the present development and rganization of civilization. The wife longer spins and weaves the family's supply of clothing. These are made by the factory and purchased from the merchant. The making of outter and cheese has been transferred to the creamery; the cannery cans the fruit, and the baker delivers the bread and cakes to our door. We have transferred the activities of the home to factory and store and thither go the daughters, wives and mothers to supply the demand for the labor once done in the home. Quite naturally the daughter seeks some means of expressing the inher-

urns to some gainful occupation. This breaks up the solidarity of pirit of sympathy and co-operation the home. Unity of effort and the are fearfully weakened, and in many stances lost sight of altogether.

Daily absence from the home si-lently but surely weakens the deep-er affection for it, and interest turns sewhere. It is a significant fact, nd universally true, that great numers of our working girls who marry ontinue their work in preference to he quiet and retirement of the home. In such cases there is danger that he wife may forget that marriage s the most precious of Jeuman rela-tions; that the home has the first laim upon her; that motherhood is oman's queenliest crown.

claim upon her: that motherhood is woman's queenliest crown. This by no means intimates that woman's activities should be restrict-ed to the home. Her influence has been wielded mightily in the social and moral spheres for the uplift of fact that society pays a terrible price for the economic activities of woman-when such activities lead to the weakening of the home. With the toiling wife and mother, it's influence on the home goes deep-er still, and strikes a still more vi-tal point. When she is absent from the home, family life is broken up, home loses it's charm and almost be-comes a meaningless word. Nature has not endowed the av-reage woman with physical strength er finds herself wearied from the or-dinary round of family cares during the day; often her face betrays a care-worn expression as the evening shadows fall and the day's work is done. If a wage-earner, the home often goes childless, but in case chil-dren do come, they come with lower-et vitality, the price of the heavy burdens borne by the mother. In either case, society suffers and the future of the home is jeopardized. W. A. BOWEIN.
