Texas is the only state which, in 1919, produced more than one bil-lion dollars' worth of agricultural products, a summary of crop reports from the United States department of agriculture discloses upon research made by the Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Texas raises one-fifth of the na-on's cotton. One-tenth of the tion's cotton. country's sweet potatoes are grown in this state. To Lone Star farmers goes the credit for growing more than one-fifth of our broom corn. Nearly one-half of America's entire crop of grain sorghums is produced by Texns dry land farming experts while more than one-seventh of the ice crop of 1919 was grown on Texs gulf coast farms.

King cotton still rules in Texas although diversifying aspirants in the shape of corn, oats, wheat, Kafir corn, mile maize, broom straw, peanuts and sweet potatoes are wresting

his power from him. If the Texas estimated crop of 1,700,000 bales of cotton was distributed to the folks at home, each one of her 5,000,000 citizens would receive a hale bale of cotton valued at \$85.

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





Nor was that the intent of its origin; the intent was, is to make it a medium of exchange and a measure of value for general business and for these reasons it should be unhamperpolicy. Say I have possession of a silver dollar. Have I the full ownership? The Supreme Court of the United States says no. In case Ling So Fan vs. the United States, the issue was as to ownership of money, and rights of party in possession.
The court held, "Conceeding the title of the owner of such coins, yet there attached to such ownership those limitations which public policy may require by reason of their quality as a legal tender and a medium of

exchange.' Money has the attributes of wealth because it will liquidate indebtedness and is a measure of value in the purchasing of property and for interest when loaned. It has no other value. If gold and silver should by law be demonetized, they would no longer be a measure of value or a legal ten-

***** erned by supply and demand. Money has only that given by law, proposed as a government policy to harmonize and legalize the business methods of government and people.

Money is well entrenched by law and No. 1. In my article last week's backed by the taxable wealth of the issue, I did not mean that money was not legally taxable. The courts have held that it is. My contention is that money strictly is not property. Money is man's greatest invention, and as a good business policy, it should not be hampered by taxation, which tends to weaken its purposes. My objection to taxing money is not to protect a money holder, but that it is not a good business policy and a fair deal for all. Say a man in Texas loans money at 8 per cent after paying the tax on the note, his net interest is around 5 per cent. While a man in New York loans money in Texas at 8 per cent note payable in New York. as the note can't be taxable in Texas, his interest is 8 per cent net. Is this just and right?

If there was no tax on money Texas, the Texas man could then loan at 6 per cent and get more interest than he can now get at 8 per cent and the borrower would pay per cent less for the use of oney, both parties benefitted, and the Texas lender would then have an even break with the New York lender in the Texas money market. 



During the past several years the Experimental Farm in co-operation with the Forestry Department of the A. & M. College, has been trying out a number of various species of forest, shade and ornamental trees to determine their adaptability to the South Plains area. A considerable number of trees have been increased from the seed and the station now plans to distribute some of the better varieties throughout this section to public schools, churches and city and county parks and similar public institutions for the beautifying of their grounds and for utilization in windbreaks and shelter belt plantings. Supt. R. E. Karper of the Experiment Station, accompanied the county school board the past week in their visit to the rural schools and encouraged the trustees, teachers and patrons to take advantage of this opportunity to start a lasting monument to their community on their school grounds by making permanent plans and plantings of trees. The station has about 30 different species of trees, a number of which are adapted well and will soon make an excellent showing if properly taken care of. These trees are to be given free for the purposes mentioned and it is hoped that each and every community will immediately take steps to avail themselves of this opportunity to obtain trees for their school grounds. Parties calling for these trees are requested to take a supply of packing material or burlap to prevent the roots from drying out in transit. The time is at hand for tree planting and we have in the ground one of the best seasons that has prevailed for several years. This is an ideal year to make a start with trees and by giving them proper care and cultivation the majority of them will

One of the most promising new trees being 'tried out is the Chinese which is a direct importation from China and has exceeded in rate of growth, any other tree tested the past year, and it is hoped that it will be possible to obtain seed of this variety so that it may be propagated in numbers for distribution in this section. Several thousand evergreens of the Chinese Arborvitae and Red Cedar varieties will be of sufficient size for distribution another season. All persons interested in planting trees this spring, are invited to call at this station farm for their needs.







Because of these conditions and further fact that it is a strain on European customers to buy heary stocks of cotton which is costing them from 65 to 75 cents per pound for upland, as compared to 12 to 14 cents before the war when money was easy and plentiful, and observ ing that spinners all over the world attempt to stay out of the market as soon as they can get a few weeks supply, in an effort to lower the price, Mr. Yeary is convinced that the proper thing to do is:

"The farmers to cease have their cotton graded, stapled and listed, and refuse any offer below the farmers' price, which is 45 cents basis middling, 7-8 inch staple. The field force of the department has been hurriedly campaigning the state for three weeks, urging this action, which is being readily agreed to everywhere, as results many offerings have been withdrawn from the market. The effect of which has caused sharp advance in New York and New Orleans, and if continued by the farmers will be felt at every local market as soon as present hold-ings of buyers can be shipped out and the compresses relieved.

Mr. Yeary says "some farmers and bankers have double 'wants'. They 'want' to sell at once and 'want' the top price. They can get either of their 'wants' but not both. They can sell 'at once', or rather give it away; or they can ignore any price below their own and get it in few weeks or months. If they will systematically cease selling, 50 cents may look cheap for good cotton in a short time". This is why his advice is to "close up like a clam and let selling cease"

As to bollies and very low grades, they have no class or grade and can only by sold on type. They should be bulked, samples drawn and sent to the ports for bids. This is all any buyer can do, and the President of the local Farmers' Institute can do it as well as the buyer. Quit selling cotton now until you can get

Williamson, Gov-ernment Cotton Classer here, classed this bale as middling with good one and five-sixteenths inch staple, and states it should be worth 80 cents per pound on the New Orleans mar-ket. This experiment has been watched with a great deal of interest by many farmers and it will be tried out from this seed by some another year under different conditions. The station has grown this variety under dry land conditions for several years with varying results. In 1914, a good crop year, it produced 1,460 pounds of seed cotton to the acre, but in unfavorable years it does not do well under dry land conditions. This variety is not recommended generally for dry land but where it can be grown on winter irrigated land or under irrigation it is recommended and even a few acres would yield a handsome profit to the grower.

Stop the Loss of Hogs

I believe that two-thirds of the deaths of hogs in this section of the state is from what is called "Cholera" is swine Plague. Several incidents of the past where hogs were immunized for Cholera and later died, with the owner supposing that the vaccine used was a failure, has impressed me of this fact.

Swine Plague

is prone to appear in animals suffering from Cholera; in animals subject to hardships of shipping; in pigs at weaning time; in herds suddenly placed on green corn feed and young animals subjected to exposure.

Symptoms

The animals effected by swine plague are more restless than those effected with cholera and do not have the same tendency to bury their heads in litter.

The ordinary symptoms of swine plague is evidenced by the usual symptoms of pneumonia.

Treatment

Be sure to have the disease diagnosed properly after which inject one or more doses of swine plague bacterin. With this treatment and proper care should result in the recovery of the larger percentage animals, however proper diagnosis is first essential in treatment of all diseases.

SOLVE COTTON MARKETING

Now that the railroads of the untry are in a position to accept shipments of cotton and the compress plants are up with their work and anxious for more we find that there is no movement of the apparent surplus crop of this section. Buyers on the local market say that they are unable to sell for the reason that most all the mills are buying for immediate use and not storing as was formerly practiced. The mills find it very expensive to han-dle much cotton in storage now when it is valued at \$200 per bale unlike when a saving was made by storage of cotton sold on the market at \$50 per bale. "There will never be the storage of large quantities of cotton again" says W. T. Williamson, Government Cotton Classer, "and this will have a tendency to uphold the prices to their present scale". Mr. Williamson believes that the farmers with the aid of the Federal Reserve Banks will be in a better position to hold their cotton and sell only a percentage of one year's crop monthly instead of selling the whole crop as soon as gathered, than the mills who find it too expensive under present conditions. He says that the Government is actively working upon a proposition to have a Farmers' Cooperative selling organization especially wherever there is a Government Cotton Classer and to arrange for these farmers to own their own warehouse, say one in each county served by the Classer. When the warehouses are complete and farmers are unwilling to sacrifice their cotton on local market conditions, it can be stored in the warehouse and classed by the Government Classer upon which the Federal Reserve Banks will loan money at a low rate of interest. With this aid it is the purpose of the Government to help the farmers scatter their selling seasons throughout the year, thus not overloading the mills which means with several years of good crops the prices will fall again to their low scale. In effect the plan seems to have for its purpose the idea of showing the farmers that cotton held and sold through different periods of the year will be as paying as the selling of the crop early and buying stock are other essentials of the farm.

men who thoroughly understand the stockraising business from A to Z, having now in operation a ranch comprising nearly twenty-five thousand acres, devoted to the raising of high grades and pure breeds of Percheron- horses and Hereford cattle. They raise about two hundred and seventy-five colts each year and about 175 head of fine mules. The success of the sale of these stock here last Saturday explains part of their success as breeders of high grade stock.

In just a little over one hour \$5575 worth of King Brothers mares and horses were sold in Lubbock. There were twenty head and averaged nearly \$280 per animal, while there were a few cases of one animal bring more than \$300 and none of them sold for less than \$260. Several cars of this stock has been sold in the Plainview country, this being the first bunch ever brought to Lubbock. A sale was also made of one

car at Crosbyton Tuesday. King Brothers believe that good grades of Percheron mares are needed here on the Lubbock county farms more than tractors. Farmers can use this stock for work purposes and raise colts in addition valueable enough to pay for the care and feeding of the mother animal.



REPORT OF STATE TUBERCULOSIS SANITORIUM

Sanitorium, Texas, March 12th-The State Tuberculosis Sanitorium. located near Carlsbud, Texas, conducts a follow-up of ex-patients which clearly demonstrates the value of the institution to the state. Up to September 1st, 1919, 922 expatients were on the follow-up rolls. Of these one hundred and fourteen were earning up to \$600.00 per year, twenty-six were earning up to \$1,000.00 per year, forty-nine up t \$2,000.00 per year, five were earning up to \$3,000.00 per year, two \$4,000.00, and three were earning more than \$4,000.00 per gangum The highest salary reported to the institution was \$5,200.00. One hundred and sixty-six ex-patient had died, eighty-six were at worl but failed to report salary, eigh were students. Two hundred and twenty-four were continuing to take treatment for tuberculosis, and the Sanitorium failed to make contact with two hundred and thirty-

Every imaginable occupation was being followed by these men and women whose lives had been regenerated. Thirty-nine were farming, twenty-four were salesmen, and there were seventy-six housewives doing four hours or more work per day. Other occupations included merchants, office workers, ministers, lawyers, teachers, physicians, dentists, newspaper workers, carpenters, advertising, and insurance agents. It is estimated that those ex-patients actually reported as working on salary were earning in excess of \$250,-000,.00 per year, a sum far greater than the annual up-keep of the san-




