The Chamber of Commerce had with them last week a landscape artist who was taken over the eighty acre park grounds east of the city. It is the opinion of this artist that this eighty acres tract will be one of the scenic places of the Plains. He suggested various driveways winding and crossing the creek. Also the damming of the creek to form a nice lake for fishing, bathing, etc. In a short time he will submit plans for the park and will aid in selecting the building sites for the Fair buildings and for the planting of trees. The Experimental farm, operated by Mr. Karper will furnish free the trees that will be set out this fall in the park grounds. Everything is very promising for the beautifying of this valuable asset to the city. LOCAL PRODUCE HOUSE BOUGHT 23,760 EGGS SAT.

Readers of the Avalanche probably noticed the ad carried in this paper last week of the Plains Poultry and Hide Company of this city, in which this company asked for 1,000,000 hen eggs. 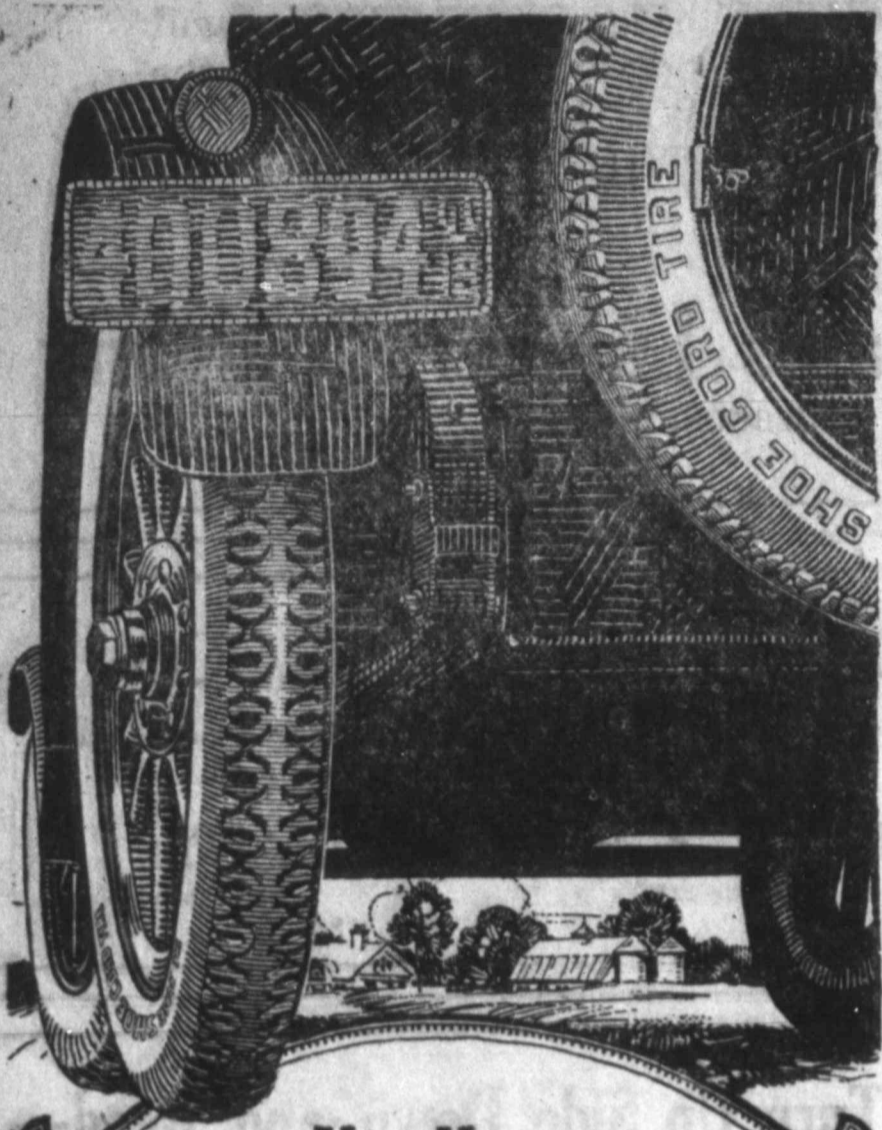

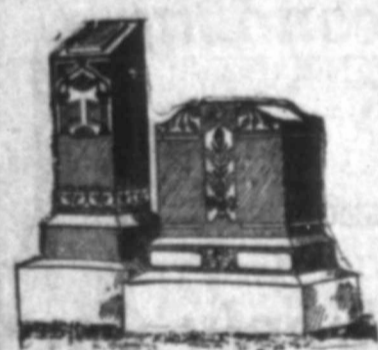

HOME AMID A CHANGING ORDER

Article Three

The home was once the center of the social life of the community, and, as such, mightily influenced and controlled that life. It set social standards for both old and young. But that day is gone, and with each passing sunset the shadows grow still deeper about it. Changes have been so rapid, so numerous, and so varied that the home has become a negligible factor in social life. Its influence is hardly felt or recognized today, socially speaking.

What has brought this about? We mention only a few of the social factors that are playing upon the home today.

The multiplication and development, in recent years, of pleasure and health resorts has had a marked influence on the social life of the home. Once one's vacation, or idle time, was spent in the home, either one's own or that of a friend. It was then that the social life received special emphasis. It was to the home that neighbors and friends came for the day or evening. But it is otherwise today. Throughout the land pleasure resorts of various kinds have developed. All have their special advantages and inducements. Some emphasize health features, some natural scenery, others social and intellectual advantages, others religious, and still others pure sport, such as hunting, fishing, and bathing.

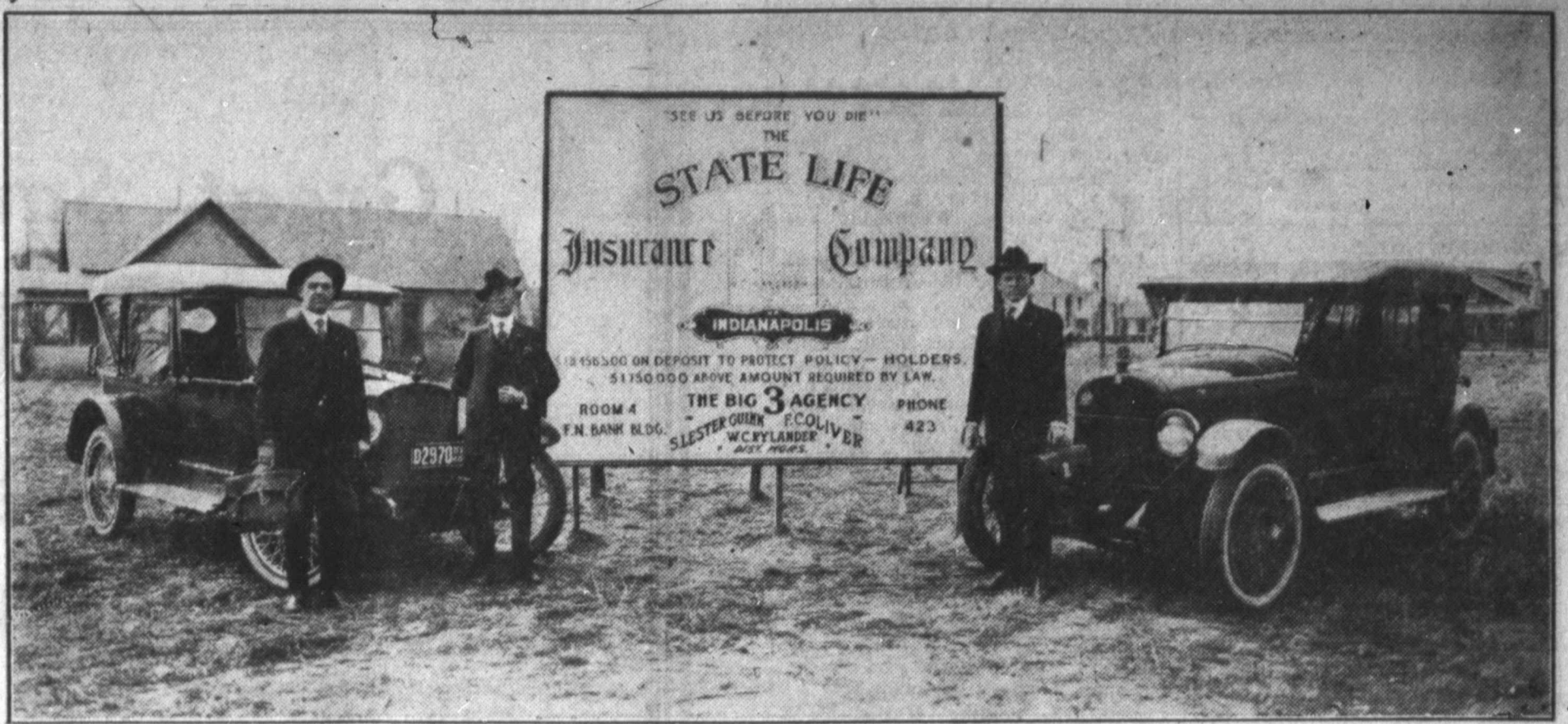
Many of these places are good and wholesome. They furnish recreation and rest for tired minds and wearied bodies. But the point is, that these unconsciously detract from the home as a social center. During the days of rest and recreation, when attention can be given to social functions, the home is usually closed and family goes elsewhere for recreation. And this writer pleads guilty.

A second factor is found in the development and multiplication of transportation facilities. The home has found itself more and more deserted as methods and conveniences of travel have developed. In the days of the ox-wagon, or later, when we improved the wagon, and hitched the horse to it, or still later when the buggy came into use, it was not practicable to go thirty or forty miles for only a day's or an evening's outing. But today who thinks of distance? Railroads have penetrated every section of the country; trains pass to and fro even regardless of schedule time. Later, the auto came to hurry the situation. The American is a born "goer". It doesn't make any particular difference where he is going. The big thing is to simply be going. At certain seasons of the year number of our people close their homes, load their cars, and go away for the season. Again the writer pleads guilty.

The commercialization and increase of the public places of amusement may be considered a third factor which is tremendously influencing the home. About the only social life we once knew, aside from the home, was found at the church, and perhaps the old-fashioned spelling bee at the community school house. But the latter has disappeared, much to the detriment to our spelling ability. Public amusement should always be supplemented with wholesome amusement in the home. But perhaps some of our parents would be at as great a loss to know just what or how to do in entertaining their children's friends, as the Kaiser would be at an old-fashioned camp meeting.

The truth is, the home itself has become commercialized and materialistic in spirit. We have driven our children from the sacredness and shelter of the home to the street and elsewhere to find recreation and satisfaction for their social nature. A readjustment of our home life, so as to include the boy and the girl, would be a fine and satisfactory solution to many of our social and moral problems.

Our children and young people no longer seriously regard the home as

a social center. If anyone doubts the loss of the social influence of the home let such one plan some worthy helpful entertainment and invite our young people. Out of the large number only a few will come. They have been alienated. They have become so accustomed to the freedom and laxness of the crowd in the public places that the home entertainment is no longer attractive to them. It seems to the writer that right at this point is food for thought.

Before passing from this point we wish to say that, as far as our observation has gone, our local young people are rather an exception to the foregoing statement. To a large

extent they seem to appreciate home entertainment, and to enter heartily into its joys. For this they are to be commended.

A fourth factor is found in the increase of our various societies and fraternal orders, with their recurring social functions. Perhaps these do not constitute such a vital factor as some others so we merely mention them in passing.

The next two articles will deal with the birth-rate and divorce problems in their influence upon the home.

CATTLE STRONG, SHEEP HIGHER, HOGS LOWER

Though cattle receipts were larger than expected, trade was active at strong prices, exceptions higher. Pulp fed steers sold up to 13.10, and native steers up to 13.50. Hogs were steady to 25 cents lower, to 15.95. Sheep and lambs were 40 to 60 cents higher, top lambs 19.35, ewes 14.25.

Today's Receipts
Receipts today were 13,000 cattle, 17,000 hogs, and 3000 sheep, compared with 14,000 cattle, 17,000 hogs and 12,000 sheep, a week ago, and 14,700 cattle, 14,550 hogs, and 9,200 sheep a year ago.

Beef Cattle
Choice handy weight beef steers, mixed yearlings, and tidy weight heifers sold readily today at strong prices. Other cattle were steady and extreme heavy steers sold slowly. Receipts were fairly liberal, but demand showed larger scope than last week and offerings were well cared for. Most of the pulp fed steers sold at \$11.50 to \$13.00 and native steers at \$11.00 to \$13.50. Some mixed yearlings brought \$13.25 and straight heifers \$13.00. Fat cows sold at \$8 to \$11.50, and "canners" and cutters \$4.25 to \$6.50. Plain to fair heifers brought \$8.00 to \$9.50. Veal calves brought \$8.50 to \$15.50.

Stockers and Feeders
Steady prices prevailed for stockers and feeders. Plain stockers and common feeders sold slowly, and the better grades moved more readily than the middle of last week. Good to choice feeders brought \$11.50 to \$12.25, and stockers \$9.50 to \$10.50. A few selected bunches sold above these quotations. Stock cows and heifers sold readily at \$6.50 to \$9.

Hogs
Having reached the high point of the year late last week, when the 16 cent quotation was recorded, the hog market turned down today. A few choice light weight grades were nearly steady selling up to \$15.95, but the bulk of the offerings at \$14.75 to \$15.75 were 15 to 20 cents lower. Packers top was \$15.85. Demand was active at the decline. Only a few heavy hogs were held over. Pigs and stock hogs sold readily.

Sheep and Lambs
Trade in the sheep division was active with prices 40 to 60 cents higher. Fed lambs sold mostly at \$19.00 to \$19.35, and ewes up to \$14.25. No feeding lambs or breeding ewes were offered. There is considerable inquiry for breeding ewes. The next two weeks will about clear feed lots for this season.

Horses and Mules
Trade in horses and mules opened this week slowly, but with a number of buyers here more activity is expected later. Prices are quoted steady with last week.

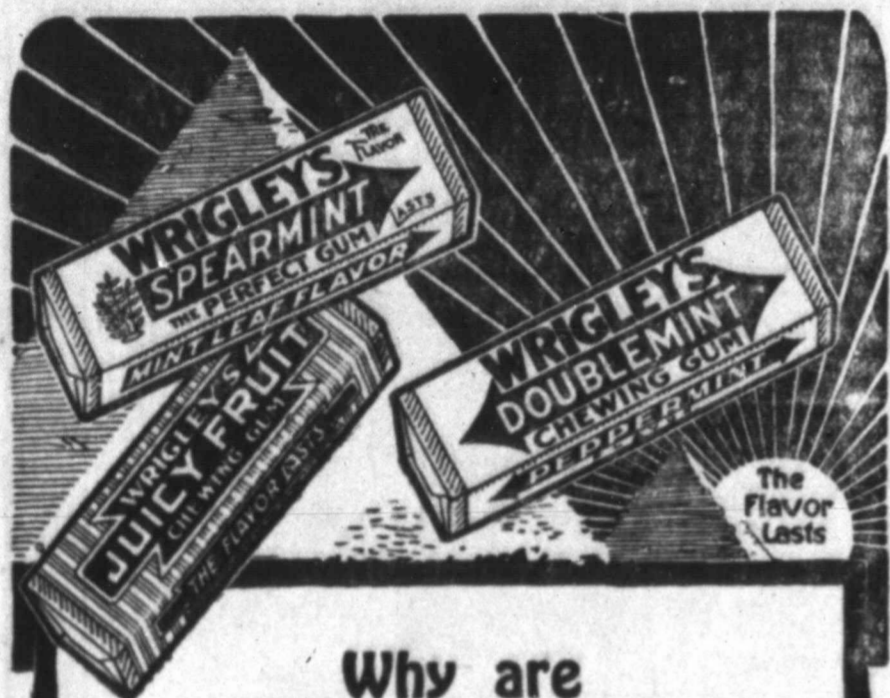

WEST TEXAS FREE FROM PINK BOLL WORMS

If the Federal Government's threat to quarantine effected portions of the state unless drastic steps are immediately taken to stop the pink Boll worm, West Texas will in all probability be left in the unrestricted zone. It is the opinion of informed men that there will be no need of quarantine of this portion of the state as the Boll worm has never made appearance.

However, if the Federal Government attempts quarantine of all the state we are advised that bankers, farmers organizations and commercial organizations will fight with all their force to keep the South plains unrestricted, as this crop is one of the biggest factors from which the whole country makes its living. Without cotton for a money crop, many farmers of the South plains would have been in a bad shape financially, as it is known that grains raised here the past season brought very little revenue.

BAPTISTS PLAN TO REACH 15,000
COUNTRY SUNDAY SCHOOLS
THIS SUMMER.

PROVIDE BETTER TEACHERS

75 Million Campaign, with Assistance
of Sunday School Board, Makes
Extension Program
Possible.

Ness, corresponding secretary of the Baptist Sunday School Board at Nashville.

The work is made possible by the larger funds available from the 75 Million Campaign and will be carried on by the forces of the eighteen states of the Southern Baptist Convention in co-operation with the Sunday School Board. Additional workers will be put on in every state and a large number of Sunday School institutes will be held in the hope of reaching a great majority of the rural Sunday Schools in every state. Normal Sunday School institutes will be held in fifty counties of Tennessee, for instance, and over 500 rural centers will be reached with the better system of Sunday School teaching and methods of administration. Similar methods will be followed in all the states.

Every State Enlarges Work.
Over \$200,000 a year will be expended on Sunday School field work in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention, it is announced, and every state organization will greatly enlarge its Sunday School force, giving special attention to the development of the rural schools.

In order that an adequate number of instructors may be available for carrying on this larger program, a thirty day normal school will be held in Nashville, beginning May 31, in the instruction in which a large regular faculty of Sunday School experts and many special lecturers will be employed.

The Sunday School Board at Nashville has just established a department of Sunday School administration which will deal with all questions of Sunday School organization and equipment. This department will be in charge of Arthur Flake, who has been a member of the field force of the Sunday School Board for quite a while and who was formerly superintendent of the Sunday School of the First Baptist Church of Fort Worth, Tex., said to be the largest Sunday School in the South.

Build Better Church Houses.
Another department of the Sunday School Board is giving attention to the development of better church houses. Architects' plans are being called for and instructed which these

A COMPOSITION ON MY CLUB WORK

By Elsie Wilke, 2nd Year Lubbock, Texas

The reason I joined the canning club was because I wanted to know more about canning and certainly learned it, for now I can can beets, carrots, beans, and lot of other vegetables that before I joined the club I didn't know how to can. And I also learned how to make pretty packs of fruits and vegetables.

My garden this year was located quite a distance from the tank so I couldn't irrigate the land but my plants didn't need any irrigation this year. The soil of my garden was a very light soil, my garden was a hundred and twenty feet long and thirty-six feet wide. I selected this piece of land for I knew that the crop grown on it last year didn't have any diseases of any kind that would attack tomato plants.

The best way to prepare the land is to plow it in the fall and fertilize it, but I didn't get my garden plowed until the 24th of January and the fertilizer wasn't applied until the 12th of April. April the 21, the land was plowed again. The ferti-

lizer used was barnyard manure. I planted my tomato seed in an open bed so when the plants were large enough to transplant I didn't have any trouble in getting them started in the garden. I transplanted three hundred and seventy-one plants and they all grew but about the time they began to bloom the potato beetle attacked them and killed about ten plants. The time the plants were beginning to put on fruit the plants began to die and about seventy-five plants died.

I pruned two hundred and twenty-five plants and I just pruned them once and didn't stake any of my plants. I hoed my tomato plants twice and had them plowed three times.

I gathered my tomatoes in baskets and carried them to the house. I put all of one size in one box and those of another size in another box. I didn't pack any tomatoes and marketed only fifty-five pounds. I put them in buckets, all of one size and color always together. Tomatoes was the only vegetable grown on my one-tenth acre this year.

After I had the tomatoes gathered and graded I poured boiling water over them for just a minute and then I peel them, put them in a pot and boil them about three minutes. Then I pack them in jars and seal

the jars. At the Short Course I learned how to can all vegetables by beaching cold dipping and cooking in can. I did my okra that way and helped put up some beans also by beaching cold dipping and cooking them in the jars. When I was going to make preserves I peeled the fruit the day before and put sugar on them and let it set until the next morning, then I put the fruit which had been standing in sugar over night to boil and boil it until the syrup was clear.

The boys and girls club work represents "four square" training of the members of the four square need of citizenship and home life.

The four H's represent the equal training of the heart, head, hand and health of every child.
Train head to A.—Think; B.—Plan; C.—Reason.
Train heart to A.—Be Kind; B.—Be True; C.—Be Sympathetic.
Train hand to A.—Be Useful; B.—Be Helpful; C.—Be Skillful.
Train health to A.—Resist Diseases; B.—Enjoy Life; C.—Make for Efficiency.

At the Short Course the girls had a very nice time after our work was done. We played games and learned to sing some of our club songs. This is one of the songs we learned: Tomato Club Song:

"Tomato seed and loamy plain, Make you wealthy if we get rain; Plant away, plant away, plant away

Tomato girls, catch the worm And watch the weather, work one and all together— Plant away, plant away, plant away, Tomato girls.

Chorus
"For canning clubs of Dixie, Hooray! Hooray!
In Dixie land we'll take our stand To live and die in Dixie— Away, away, away down South in Dixie!"

Now pluck your fruit and quit your planning, Apron don and start to canning, Can away, can away, can away Tomato girl; Then stack them on the shelf, Oh Honey! Each can means some ready money— Can away, can away, can away, Tomato girl."

"Come customers step up and try 'em— Taste them once and you've got to buy them— Sell away, sell away, sell away Tomato girl. The canning girl, you'll not forget her; Makes the best a little better— Sell away, sell away, sell away Tomato girl.

"What we sing you'll remember, In our soup this cold December— Sing away, sing away, sing away Tomato girl. Makes you feel so gay and wavey, Canned tomatoes in your gravy— Sing away, sing away, sing away Tomato girl."

I learned to serve vegetables in many different ways and how to make them attractive in appearance and taste. Some of the recipes I have used in canning and cooking concentrated vegetable soup. Any desired mixture of vegetables may be packed for home use. A good combination consists of one quart of concentrated tomato pulp, one pint of young tender corn or tiny lima beans, one pint okra, four tablespoons of salt and sugar seasoning, one small onion chopped and one-half cup of chopped sweet pepper. Cook the tomatoes, pepper and onions put through a sieve to remove seeds and cook down to about the consistency of ketchup, measure, add corn or beans and okra which have been prepared as for canning, add seasoning and cook all together for 10 minutes. Pack and process pints for two hours continuously at boiling or for thirty minutes under ten pound steam pressure.

Peanut Butter Loaf
1-2 cup rice cooked in 2 cups of boiling water; one teaspoon full salt cove and when tender add one cup of peanut butter; 1 egg, 1-2 cup of milk, put into a mound on a buttered baking dish, sprinkle with 1-2 cup of buttered bread crumbs, bake 30 minutes. Serve tomato sauce.
I gathered 1064 pound of tomatoes off of my one-tenth acre garden and used 1014 pounds for home use. Sold 55 pounds. But all of my tomatoes are not gathered.
It cost me \$8.03 to prepare and

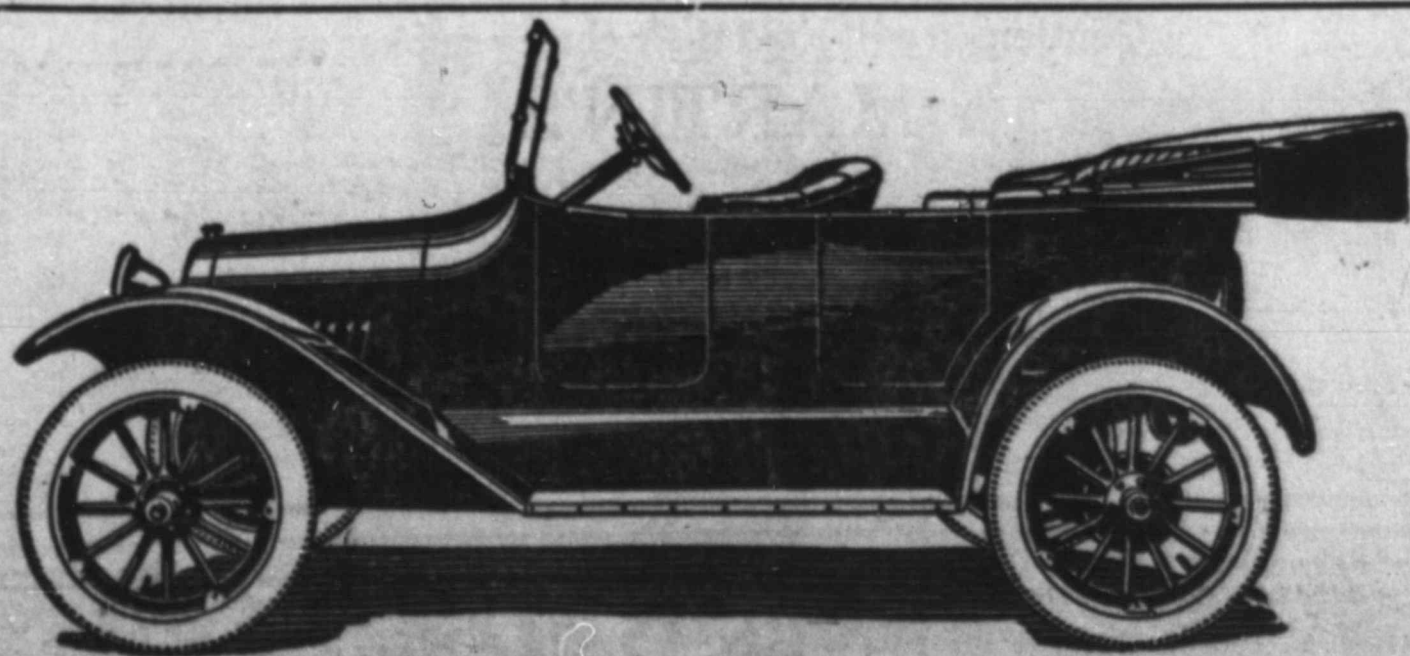

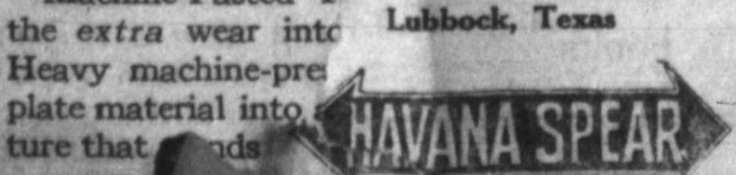

A STORY OF THE THREE MOUSE TRAPS

This story is so good that we are not going to preach a sermon over it. However, the next time that anyone tries to "string you along" with that old chestnut about his line selling cheaper because his firm does not spend a lot of money in advertising, just remember the story of the three mouse traps.

In a certain town three firms were manufacturing mouse traps. Their manufacturing costs were just about the same and they each did about an equal amount of business.

The traps cost 15 cents to make; sold to the dealer at 20 cents, and were sold to the customer at 30 cents. Each manufacturer made 5 cents per trap or 25 per cent. margin on his selling price. Each dealer made 10 cents, or 33 1-3 per cent. margin. Each dealer carried all three traps, for there was about an equal demand for each.

One day one manufacturer made up his mind to spend one cent per trap in advertising. This reduced his profit to 4 cents per trap. He did not advance his prices, and neither did the dealers.

He started his advertising and kept it up for two years. During this time the other two manufacturers kept on taking their 5 cents profit per trap and quietly laughed at the "poor advertiser."

During the second year, however, a popular demand "seemed" to arise for this advertised trap. The manufacturer actually found demand getting ahead of production. In seeking to keep up with it he installed new machinery and found out that under improved methods and with

quantity production he could turn out just a good as trap at the cost of 9 cents as formerly cost him 15 cents. So he reduced his selling price from 20 to 15 cents, and the dealer reduced his from 30 to 25 cents. Even at this reduced price you will see that the manufacturer now made 40 per cent. on his turnover as against the old margin of 25 per cent. and the dealer made 40 per cent. as against 33 1-3 per cent. as before.

Naturally, the two other firms couldn't compete on price, so they went out of business. The dealer found that he only had to tie up one-third as much capital to stock the one brand as he used to tie up to carry the three makes on the shelves.

Now—Who paid for the advertising? Did the manufacturer? If you say "yes," how do you account for the fact that he reduced his selling price 5 cents per trap and still increased his gross profit, or margin from 25 per cent. to 40 per cent.?

Did the dealer pay for it? If you think so, how do you reconcile your opinion with the fact that he reduced his selling price from 30 to 25 cents and increased his margin from 33 1-3 per cent. to 40 per cent.?

Did the consumer pay for it? Obviously not, for he now got as good a trap for 25 cents as he used to get for 30 cents.

It looks like a case of money being spent and nobody having to pay for it, doesn't it? If we look close, however, we will find that the men who really paid for the advertising were the two manufacturers who did not advertise. The number of mice in that town remained just about the same, and so also did the number of traps sold per year. But every time either of these firms lost an account it went to the manufacturer who advertised. This steady increase in business enabled him to buy cheaper (because he bought his raw materials in larger quantities), to manufacture cheaper (because of better machinery, standardized methods, etc.) and to sell cheaper (because each salesman now sold three traps where he formerly sold one).

Who paid for the advertising? Think it over. And the next time that you run into this camouflaged knocker just ask him about the three mouse traps. The same principle works in pianos, oranges, pins, lemons, automobiles or marmalade. —Swiped.

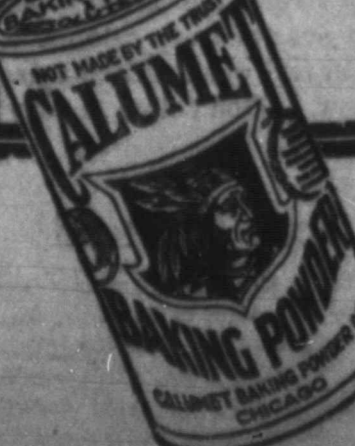

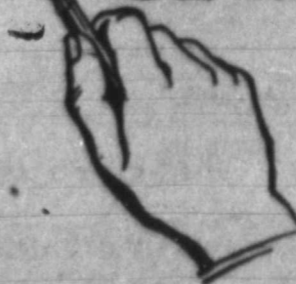

Dear Club Members:

I am glad that every club member is now going to be a reader of the "Avalanche" now through having a free copy in every school. And I am sure that every one of you who read it always look for the club news every week.

Girls, we have no free tomato seed this year, but seed do not cost much. I hope you have yours growing already in hot beds or in boxes and will have plants to transplant as soon as danger of frost is past and the worst sandstorms are over. Remember that your garden is just one-twentieth of an acre this year, or just half as large as it has been before. I want all first year members to raise tomatoes to can and other vegetables that can be used at home. Your exhibit will require one quart of peanut butter so if you do not have a peanut patch you had better plant one row in your garden. The girls who have been members longer will plant tomatoes and several other vegetables such as, beans, okra, beets and onions. You want to use the small, white silver skin onion that makes such nice onion pickle.

Boys and girls in the Poultry Club get busy with your chickens. Get any breed that you like just so it is pure bred stuff. We want you to keep a careful record and show a profit on your year's work and you cannot do that if you raise "scrubs." You may begin by getting you a pen, consisting of one cock and three or four hens, or by getting at least three settings of standard bred eggs or by getting twenty-five or more baby chicks. You want to begin working hard for you want to be ready for that big Fair we are going to have this Fall. Our merchants, bankers and other business men tell us they are backing the club members to the limit and will offer some good prizes to the winners. Will you be a winner? Let's see!

FARMERS URGED TO PLANT MORE FORAGE

Dallas, March 22.—Figures issued recently by the United States Department of Agriculture on crop production and acreages for 1919 are of the utmost importance to the country as a whole and especially to the South, according to a statement of D. N. Barrow, agronomist of the Texas Industrial Congress. The general prosperity of the United States during the past year has been unprecedented, and is due chiefly to the value of its crop production amounting to a grand total of more than fifteen and three-quarter billion dollars. Of this tremendous sum, fifteen Southern States, embracing the cotton belt, contributed over seven billion dollars.

"While there has been an increase in the value of the cotton crop, this increase has not been in proportion to the total increase," Mr. Barrow says. "The actual gain has not come from the increased acreage yield of other crops as compared with 1918. There was in the South in 1919 an increased production of 207 million bushels of corn; 46 million bushels of wheat and 32 million bushels of oats. For the rest of the country, outside of the South, the gain in corn was about the same but there was a loss in the yield of wheat of over 26 million bushels and 418 million bushels of oats. These figures are significant in that they point the road to true prosperity. As long as cotton remained the chief crop of the South it made a poor showing with other sections and was far outstripped in the race for accumulated wealth. But as soon as it turned attention to oth-

or, crops, it forged ahead with astonishing rapidity.

"It is inconceivable that our people can fail to take this lesson to heart. But just now is the turning point. Though the tremendous prosperity of the country last year is traceable directly to other crops than cotton, and almost entirely to the production of grains, yet, owing to various causes, there is just now grave danger of slipping back into the old and demonstrated unwise policy of making cotton the dominant

crop during the coming year. Already the falling off in the acreage of grain planted is alarming—being 25 per cent for the whole country and 900,000 acres for Texas. In some of the States it is still possible to at least partially retrieve this lost acreage by spring planting of small grain, but for Texas the opportunity is gone, except it be made up by greater acreage of corn and similar grains. "Despite the fact that it is still relatively the cheapest agricultural commodity of the South, the price of

cotton, when its other apparent advantages are considered, appears dangerously high and it is going to take a stiff upper lip to resist the temptation of putting extra acres in this crop. Yet we know it is unwise; we know we will not have the labor to handle the crop; we know that with the shortage of grains already apparent that the price of food and feed are going to be even higher during the present year than in 1918; ordinary wisdom should warn us against committing this error. Again, the

very conditions that have prevented our keeping up our small grain acreage have at the same time largely assured us of unusually good crops of corn and forage this summer. Seldom has Texas gone into a spring planting season with so great a promise of immunity from its great crop production enemy—drouth. Our soils are saturated and stored with moisture as seldom before and if we only half do our part we can rest assured that abundant corn and forage crops are almost certain despite

our lack of as thorough preparation as is generally desirable."—Texas Industrial Congress Bulletin.

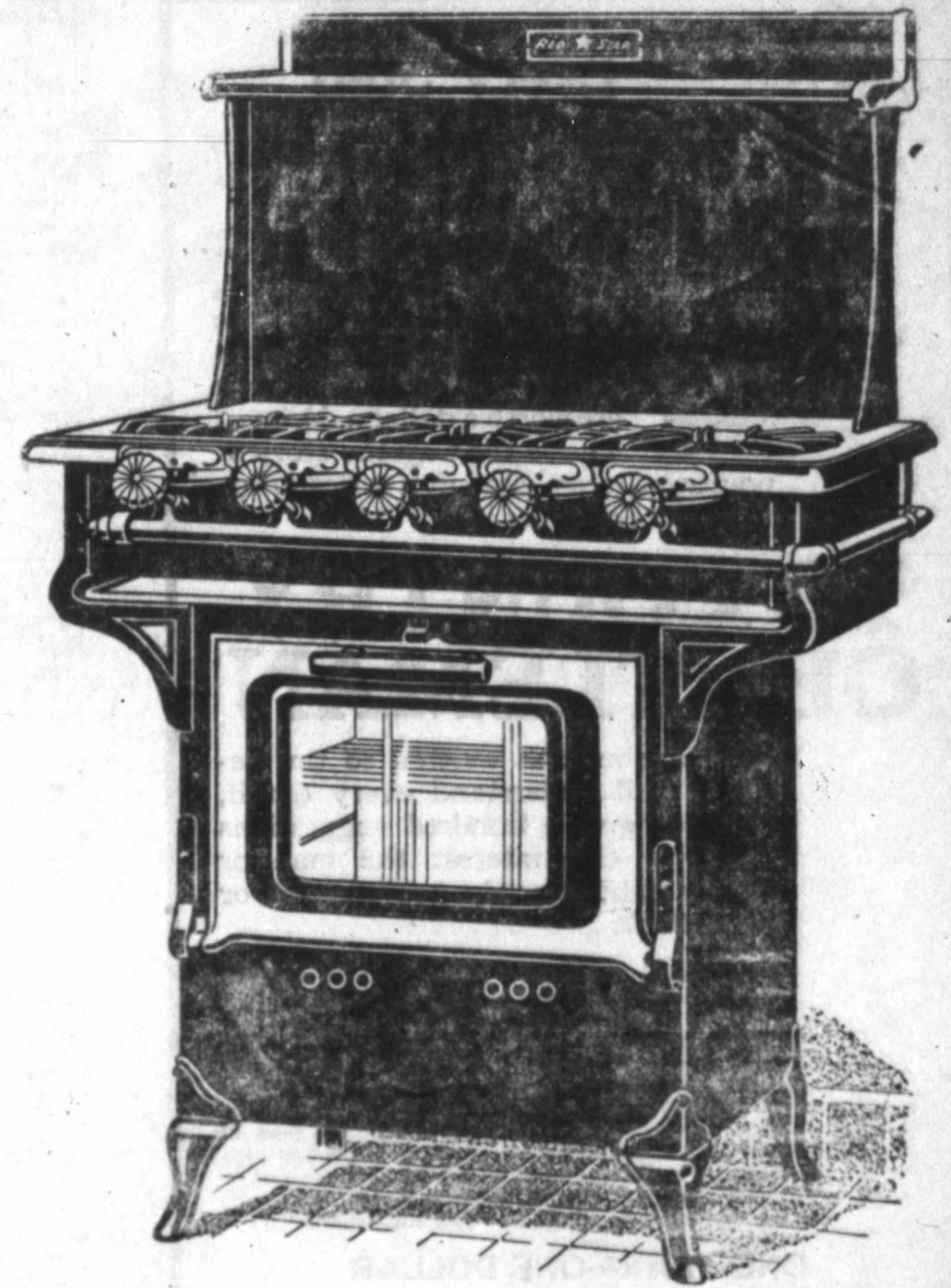

Plans outlined at the Convention on Friday, says Mr. Bowron, indicate still greater activity and advancement in the field of electricity for use in the country than has ever been experienced in any previous years.

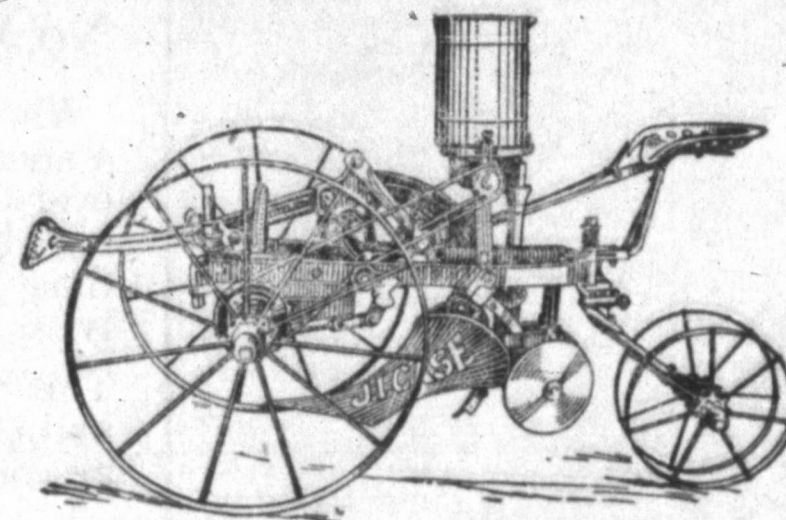
PETERSBURG FARMERS ERECTING 5 STAND GIN

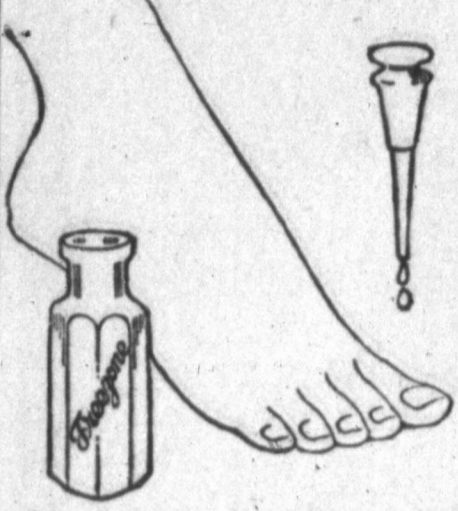

EXPERT DESCRIBES METHODS PRESERVATION OF EGGS

Fresh, clean eggs, properly preserved, can be used satisfactorily for all purposes in cooking for the table. When eggs preserved in water glass are to be boiled, a small hole should be made in the shell with a pin, at the large end before placing them in water, to allow the air in the egg to escape and prevent cracking. Here is a good thing to paste in your scrap book—or maybe in your poultry house somewhere. It is the method for the preservation of eggs—something about which the average farmer knows but very little and about which he ought to know much. The methods are recommended by Harry M. Lamon, senior poultryman, Animal Husbandry division, of the United States Department of Agriculture. The methods are the water-glass and the lime methods. The water-glass or sodium silicate, has been found to be good. Use one quart of water glass to nine quarts of water that has been boiled and cooled. Place the mixture in a five gallon crock or jar. This will be sufficient to preserve 15 dozen eggs and will serve as a guide for the quantity needed to preserve larger number of eggs. Clean a five gallon crock, scald it and allow it to dry. Heat a quantity of water to the

boiling point and allow it to cool. When cool, measure out nine quarts of water, place it into a crock, and add one quart of the water-glass stirring the mixture thoroughly. The eggs should be placed in the solution. If a sufficient supply of eggs are not obtainable when the solution is first made more eggs may be added from time to time. At least two inches of the solution should cover the eggs at all times. The crock containing the eggs should be kept in a cool, dry place, well covered to prevent evaporation. Waxed paper put on or tied around the top of the crock will answer this purpose. Here is a second best method that can be used when the water glass cannot be obtained. Many think that it is as good as the other, although in some instances the lime penetrates the shell and the egg tastes of lime. Dissolve two or three pounds of unslacked lime in five gallons of water that has previously boiled and allowed to cool. Allow the mixture to stand until the lime settles and the liquid is clear. Place clean, fresh eggs in a clean earthenware crock or jar and pour the clear lime-water into the vessel until the eggs are covered. At least two inches of the solution should cover the top of the eggs.

An order for \$49,000 worth of Edison phonographs was made recently by the Rix Furniture and Undertaking Company. Be believe this is the largest single order for phonographs ever placed in this section of the state. This company sold more than \$15,000 worth of phonographs in the month of December last year. They also handle the Columbia and Victrola machines, but they are shipped regularly during the year no such large order is necessary to handle a large number. 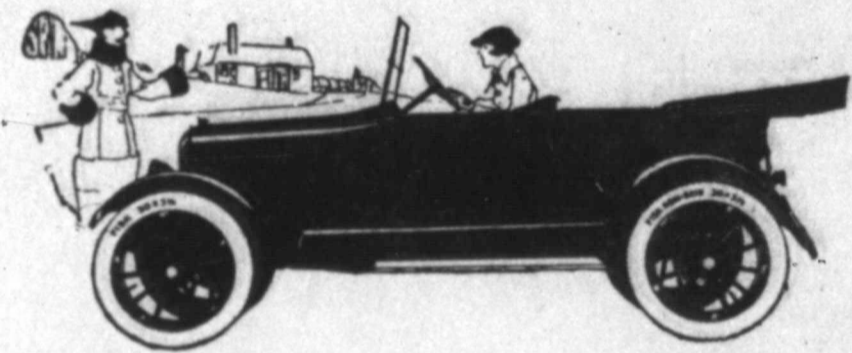

My people hold all their own notes, take only one deed of trust and will release portions of your land if you should sell off during the life of the loan. These are things more than important to you.
