When Texas was admitted as a State in 1845 it claimed considerable territory not now within its con-fines. In 1850 it sold to the Federal Government for \$10,000,000 all claimed outlying area which reduc-ed to the size as shown by present day maps. The enumeration of 1850, the first, was by no means complete The country was thinly settled and the Government facilities of seventy years ago were not as complete nor as carefully employed as today. Only as carefully employed as today. Only twenty-three cities and their popu-lations were separately listed in the first census. They were Austin 629, Bonham 211, Castroville (Medina county) 366, Comaltown 286, Cor-pus Christi 533, Crockett 150, Eagle Pass (then in Rever county) 282 Pass (then in Bexar county) 383, Fredericksburg 754, Galveston, Hor-tontown (Comal county 139, Hous-ton 2,396, Indianola 379, Lavaca 315, Marshall 1,189, McKinney 192, Nacogdoches 468, New Braunfels 1,-208 Palasting 212, Bickmand 222 298, Palestine 212, Richmond 323, Rusk 355, San Antonio 3,488, Victoria 806 and Zodiac '(Gillespie county) 160. Only eleven counties were listed, the largest being Harrison, with a population of 11,822, of whom 6;213 were slaves. 58,161 Were Slaves

Only 154,034 of the people in 1850 were white. There were 397 free negroes and 58,161 slaves. The population given for the cities and whs includes persons of all classes. Galveston had 678 slaves, Houston ner of Oklahoma in a semi-circle, in-527, Marshall 421 and San Antonio cluding Tarran and Dallas counties, 220. Of the white population throughout the State 84,869 were and males and 69,165 females. The persons of foreign birth were shown to be 17,620, of which 4,459 were Mexicans, \$,191 Germans, 1,403 Irish and 1,002 English. The greatest proportion of the native population came from Tennessee, Virginia, Georgia, North Carolina, Alabama, Mississippi and Kentucky. The State had only two members of Congress. The Northern, or first district, embraced all the territory north of a line running a short distance above the southwestern cor-

Kaufman of Sabinetown and Timothy Pillsbury of Brazoria. Kaufman died Jan. 31, 1851, and was succeeded by Richardson Scurry of Clarksville, and Pillsbury was succeeded by Volney E. Howard of San An-

The enumeration revealed there were only two schools listed as colleges, with seven teachers and 105 pupils. The public schools numbered 349, with 360-teachers and 7,946 pupils, and the annual income of the schools was \$44,088. There were ninety-seven academies "and other schools," with 137 teachers and 3,-389 pupils. There were 10,583 persons, including free negroes who could not read and write. Under the classification of professions, 701 persons were listed as "blacksmiths and whitesmiths," 1,361 carpenters, 25, 054 farmers, 107 boatment, 8 fishermen, 44 hat and cap manufactu-rers, 155 inn keepers, 152 "rangers" and 11 sailmakers.

#### Small Improved Acreage

The land embraced among farms was reported as being 639,117 acres improved and 10,759,220 acres unimproved. The farms were rated at an aggregate value of \$16,398,747 and the improvements at \$2,133,831. The following live stock enumeartion wasshown: Horses 75,403, mules 12,374, dairy cows 214,868, work oxen 50,-482, other cattle 652,174, sheep 99,-099, swine 683,604. The value of the live stock was given at \$10,267,710. Texas produced in that year wheat 41,729 bushels, rye 3,108 bushels, Indian corn 5,978,590 bushels, oats 198,717 bushels, rice 88,203 pounds, tobacco 66,897 pounds, cotton 57,-596 bales and 400 pounds each, wool 131,374 pounds, sweet potatoes 1,-322,955 bushels and butter 2,308,-080 pounds

Texas had 341 churches. There were 82 Baptist, 5 Christian, 5 Epis-copal, 7 Free churches, 176 Methodist, 45 Presbyterian, 2 Union, 6 minor sects and 13 Catholic. The total church property was valued at \$204,930. The Roman Catholic was the richest church with a property value of \$79,700.







#### CATTLE LOWER; HOGS HIGH-ER; SHEEP STEADY

A big advance in prices for fat cattle late last week, together with improved railroad service, resulted in fairly liberal receipts of cattle today, and prices were down 35 to 50 cents, though still materially higher than a week ago. Hog prices were 15 to 25 cents higher, top \$15.50, and bulk of sales \$14.50 to \$15.25. Sheep receipts were liberal but the market held steady.

Today's Receipts Receipts today were 8,000 cattle, 5,500 hogs, and 8,500 sheep, compared with 5,000 cattle, 750 hogs, and 3,000 sheep a week ago, and 14, 700 cattle, 19,600 hogs, and 16,800 sheep a year ago. Beef Cattle

More than 50,000 cattle, practical-ly all of them fat enough for killers arrived at the principal Western mar-kets today. This supply was too large considering the fact that shipping conditions are not fully normal. Late last week Chicago prices were sharply lower, and further declines prevailed there today. Here prices for steers, and butcher grades were 35 to 50 cents lower than Friday and 60 cents to 75 cents under Thursday, the high point last week, though still 40 to 50 cents higher than two weeks ago. Choice heavy steers sold up to \$14.25, and yearlings up to \$14.00. Cows sold mostly at \$9.50 to \$10.50 and heifers \$10.00 to \$13.25. Veal calves were 35 to 50 cents lower, top \$16.00.

Stockers and Feeders Today's receipts included few cattle, suitable for stock and feeding purposes. Demand was not urgent, and prices were unchanged. Neither dealers or commission men are counting on any large trade in thin cattle until normal shipping conditions are assured. Some feeders today sold at \$10.50 to \$11.50.

Hogs Hog prices today were quoted 15 to 25 cents higher. Shippers were not in the competition, and packers bought the entire supply. The top price was \$15.25 and bulk of sales \$14.50 to \$15.25. In buying the sup-ply, packers made less discrimina-tion between heavies and medium weights. Light weights still command a premium. Packers are in a position now to handle increasing supplies, and shippers are expected to be in the competition by the mid-dle of the week.

#### A Better Market For Farm Products, farmer often feels that the prices

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In these days of the extreme high cost of food it is necessary that every family save as much food as is possible by canning meats of different kinds, vegetables, fruits, etc., by drying fruits and vegetables, and by preserving a good supply of eggs in waterglass.

However, practically every farm that produces these things, and milk and butter, for home use, has a sur-plus which is offered for sale. 
#### Standardize Your Products

The next big mistake we make is in paying too little attention to the quality and appearance of what we have to sell. Too often we think in terms of quantity instead of in terms of quality. Consider the question of fresh vegetables, berries or fruit. is all graded as to size, color, soundness, etc., so that the merchant can estimate very closely at a glance what his profit or loss on each barrel, box or crate, will be.

But, if you are too far from a market to sell fresh vegetables you may want to sell some of your canned products. Here also is a need for standardization. Here thinking and planning and a careful estima-tion of the cost is required. Under Home Demonstration methods, club members, both girls, boys and women earn to put up fruits, vegetables and meats, pickles, preserves and jellies in such a way that these products will command just as high price on the market as any of the "577 varieties," or other factory products. When a canning club girl cans a can of tomatoes in this section it should contain exactly the same thing that would be found in any other canning club girl's can of tomatoes no matter what part of the State it comes from. Not only that, but if these vegetables are canned in tin and strictly according to demonstration methods, a sample of what you have to offer is so convincing that it usually guarantees a ready

Take the question of dairy prod-ucts, butter for example. As long as the home maker hastens her buttermaking by pouring quantities of boiling water into the milk, instead of ripening the cream properly and churning it at the right temperature; as long as the butter is overchurned, so that the milk cannot be washed out nor the salt worked in; so long is butter molded into various shapes and sizes and sent to market wrapin cloths or newspapers, . just that long will country butter bring a low price. On the other hand when the milk is properly cared for, the cream churned and the butter washand worked as it should be, the outter carefully molded into pound sizes, wrapped neatly in butter paper and placed in clean cartons and ent to market, the home maker can name her price. For this is a product that will not only sell readily that one time, it will create a demand for more of the same quality and she will have to call upon her neighbors to help supply the demand. Then she will wonder why more people are not selling that kind of butter. Well, aren't they?



#### But it seems to me that the one farm product most neglected, wasted, and for which it is hardest to get a good price is eggs. It is said that in the United States alone fortyfive millions dollars is lost each year through carelessness in the production and handling of eggs. Isn't it just about time we were stopping this enormous waste? And while stopping the waste we can build up a good market for our products. Let's consider Lubbock county: There being no large city in our county, it be found that the largest per will cent of families in the county produce their own eggs for home use. Nearly every family outside Lubbock and Slaton produce a surplus which they expect to bring in a little money. But, there being no great demand for eggs locally, the buyer here must depend upon shipping the greater number of eggs that he buys. These eggs must be shipped in car lots, but he can never get a car of eggs in one day or in two, so they must be kept here in Lubbock until enough are collected to fill a car. Lubbock has no cold storage plant. People at some distance from town bring in eggs only once a week. Maybe it takes a week to get enough to fill a car. Result: Fertile eggs two weeks old, kept at room tempera-ture for two weeks. Do you know what kind of eggs you would have? Do you, then, wonder why you cannot get a big price for your egga Here are some things you can do to help. As your eggs are being shipped they may be in cities where fair, medium, and fancy prices are paid for eggs. You can have eggs all of one size and one color if you keep standard bred poultry. If you keep a mixed flock grade your eggs according to size and color, discarding all dirty ones and those from stolen nests or from nests where the sun shines on the eggs. But, even when you have done all of this you still have something to do before you have a choice market eggs. Your eggs should be infertile. An infertile egg is an egg that will keep even if it does have to be kept for a few days in the summer time. Succession cropping can be made much more effective if a hot bed or cold frame is available in which to start a supply of plants to set in the garden whenever space is made available.

#### Paint Up The Farm Buildings

The same farmers who keep their houses in excellent "paint condition" often neglect their barns. The barn is often out of sight of the road and nobody pays particular attention to it anyway. Why paint it? The rea-son why barns should be painted may not have occurred to you. It is be-cause a barn that is regularly and well painted will last indefinitely. One that is not, will rot away and loosen up in a very few years. Give your barn a chance for a longer life. A barn 30 feet long, 16 feet wide and 16 feet high on the sides will have a painting area of about 1500 square feet. This will take less than four gallons of paint at. say \$4.00 per gallon, or \$16.00 to protect the barn for four years. That is at the rate of \$4.00 per year. Can you af-ford it? 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

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


