San Angelo, April 30.—With long wools bringing 72 cents a pound, lambs \$10 each and bred ewes with the wool on from \$16 to \$25 each, the sheep industry in West Texas is enjoying the best markets in history. Wool never before brought more than 64 cents a pound, but almost 100,000 pounds sold here this week at 72 cents, and some predict that \$1 a pound will be paid before the season is over.

Growers at Sonora on Wednesday declined 90 cents for their fleece, indicating that the trend of the market is upward. The bulk of the wool

is yet to be sold.

West Texas will probably produce 8,000,000 or 10,000,000 pounds.

Live stock receipts today at the various Western markets were the largest in more than two months past. The increase in the supply was due to improved shipping conditions and the fact that many of the offerings today would have been on the market in April had not the switchstrike interrupted the move ment. Though demand showed larger volume than early last week, buyers were afforded ample opportunity cattle were steady to lower prices. Cattle were steady to 35 cents lower, hogs 10 to 25 cents, and sheep steady to 75 cents lower. With a decline last week of \$1.50 to \$2.00 in grass sheep and lambs and the market lower today, ovine stock seems to be seeking a pearer normal level to be seeking a nearer normal level compared with cattle and hogs.

Beef Cattle

Though cattle receipts were liberal today, improved shipping condi-tions gave a much wider outlet to the supply than lighter offerings last week and the market was steady for some good to choice steers in nearly all weights and 15 to 35 cents lower on plain yearlings and strong weight classes. Butcher cattle were steady to 25 cents lower and calves weak. Good to choice steers sold at \$12.25 to \$13.00, canner cows \$4.50 to \$5, fat cows \$8.00 to \$11.25, yearling steers \$11.50 to \$13.10, and heifers up to \$13.50. In the quarantine division steers sold at \$9.25 to \$10.50. Veal calves brought \$9.00 to \$13.50.

Stockers and Feeders Prices for stockers and feeders were not changed compared with last week, but the demand was larger. At the same time, receipts were the largest for some time past, and indications are that both incoming and outgoing shipments will soon be normal. Because of lower prices for fat steers, a good many prospective buyers are holding off.

Hog prices today averaged 10 to 15 cents lower than Saturday and 15 to 25 cents under Friday. The top price \$14.50 was paid by packers for light weight hogs, and the bulk of the offerings sold at \$13.75 to \$14.25. The price spread is showing a narrowing tendency and while light weights still command a premium, heavy grades are not as plentiful as a few weeks ago, and they are more attractive to packers. Stock

Of the exact manner of saluting one

writer says: "Between the rounds, before the days of rapid-fire guns, the old chief gunners used to walk up and down, pausing between ordering the fire. It was generally supposed that they regulated their orders so as to give the men exactly enough time to reload by muttering to themselves, 'Fire one!'

"Fire two!" "'Fire three!" " and so on until the required number of guns had been fired. Saluting between different powers is not by any means a mere mat-ter of courtesy, and one more than one occasion international difficulties one occasion international difficulties of a most serious order have been precipitated by the failure of one power to salute another. Our country would regard it as an insult if a foreign vessel failed to give the salute it ought to give when it meets one of our vessels. There is no mere "matter of form" in the salutes fired by naval vessels.

The number of guns to be fired for various persons is regulated and graduated in the most careful way. A consul has but seven guns fired for him, and no salute to an individual is allowable in the presence of the President. It is of interest to know that one the Fourth of July at every military post in the United States there is a National salute fired. This consists of one gun for each State in the Union. At no other time is this National salute fired.—Paul Creighton, in Kind Words.






Austin, Texas, May 1.—According to figures compiled in the office of the Industrial Welfare Commission and made public today by Mrs. Frances E. Sutherland, secretary, the average cost of living for female workers in four industries in Texas -telephone, mercantile, laundry and factory-was \$14.78 per week. The average for each was: Telephone, \$14.14, mercantile \$15.44, laundry \$13.78 and factory \$14.65.

The average cost for the State by population was : In cities between 3,000 and 9,000 inhabitants, \$12.77; from 10,000 to 30,000 population, \$14.27, and from 40,000 to 175,000 inhabitants, \$15.26.

Mrs. Sutherland's statement recites that 2,028 women were personally interviewed and their sworn averments taken, giving estimates of living for three months, including clothing, board, lodging, laundry, reading matter, doctors' bills, medicines, recreation, lodge dues and other incidentals.

Which said hearing shall be continued from time to time and from day to day as long as may be neces-sary and until all desiring to be heard shall be fully and fairly heard; and at which hearing any mistakes, irregularities or invalidities in any of the proceedings with refernce to the making of said improvements, contract or assessments may be corrected, and the benefits by means of said improvements and all sums to be assessed against such abutting property and the owners thereof, will property and the owners thereof, will be determined and the apportionment of the cost of said improvements will be made. And after all desiring to be heard have been fully and fairly heard, the said hearing will be closed, and thereafter assessments will by ordinance and in accordance with law be levied against said abutting tracts or parcels of land the true owners thereof, whether such owners be correctly named herein or not. herein or not.

The amounts to be assessed against abutting property and the owners thereof shall be payable as follows: One-third thereof immediately upon the completion and acceptance of maid improvements in front of and abutting such property, one-third shutting such property. abutting such property, one-third one year thereafter, and one-third two years thereafter. And such assessments shall bear interest from the date of such completion and acceptance and until paid at the rate of eight per centum per annum, payable with each installment as same matures. Provided, however, that each and every property owner shall have the right to pay any or all of such installments with accrued interest at any time prior to maturity; and provided that the failure to pay any installment promptly as the of the beneficial owner and holder of said assessments, mature the entire amount thereof, and the same shall together with reasonable attorney's fees, and costs of collection if ineurred, thereupon become immediately due and payable. And in all of said assessments there shall be in cluded costs of collection and reasonable attorney's fees if incurred, And such assessments when levied And such assessments when levied shall be a personal claim and charge against the owners of such property and the first and paramount lien on the property against which it is levied, which shall be the first enforceable claim against the property against which it is assessed, superior to all other liens and claims, except to all other liens and claims, except State, County and Municipal taxes.

Portions of said improvements when completed may be accepted by the City though ether portions of

the City though other portions of said improvements have not been completed. And the acceptance of any completed portions shall not in anywise affect or impair the assessments upon any portion, and shall empleted and unaccepted portions. And whenever as much as three continuous blocks of said improvements have been completed, same shall be accepted by the City, but the City less than three continuous blocks. Upon the acceptance of any such improvements, the City shall issue to the contractor assignable certificates evidencing the assessments therefor.

The City Secretary of the City of Lubbock is directed to give notice to the owners of said abutting property, their agents and attorneys, and to everyone else interested in the said improvements, contract, method of paying for same, the benefits thereof, assessments therefor, or any manner or thing connected therewith; of the time and place of such hearing, by giving no-tice thereof by publication at least

SUGAR ADVANCES REGULAR-LY ON LOCAL MARKET


Wholesale prices on sugar have varied several cents in Lubbock within the past three weeks. At that time sugar was wholesaled at 22 cents per pound, we are informed by a local wholesale man. Last week the price was raised to 25 cents per pound and this week sugar is being sold by wholesalers at 27 cents per pound. "Where the price will stop, we don't know," says this same wholesale man, who states that they are buying sugar on the open market and have no way of determining the prices to be paid for the next lots.

Wholesalers claim they are unable to handle potatoes, on account of the enormous price, which at the least would range around 12 cents. They claim the local market will not justify them to handle potatoes at this price as the people or consumers will not pay the price.
