SHEEP ACTIVE AND STEADY

Kansas City Stock Yards, May 24.

—Trade in beef cattle today was quiet at about steady prices. Receipts were about normal for the ceipts were about normal for the season of the year. Hogs were steady to 15 cents lower, top \$14.55, and sheep were steady though receipts were large. Eastern markets reported a continued dull demand for fat cattle especially heavy steers and lower prices for hogs.

Today's Receipts

Receipts today were 10,000 cattle, 14,000 hogs, and 15,000 sheep, compared with 8,500 cattle, 18,000 hogs and 12,500 sheep a week ago, and 18,300 cattle, 15,650 hogs, and 10,-

700 sheep a year ago. Beef Cattle Prices for beef cattle today were quoted steady at last week's decline. Trade was rather quiet, and killers gave evidence that the day's receipts were ample for their immediate requirements. Heavy steers sold more slowly than light weights but this condition prevails at all markets. Good to choice weighty steers brought \$12.00 to \$12.50, and included choice pulpers at \$12.00 to \$12.50, and included choice pulpers at \$12.00 to \$12.10. Handy weight steers sold mostly at \$11.50 to \$12.25, and mixed yearlings up to \$13.00. Cows and heifers were in better demand than steers with prices fully steady. Veal calves were irregular, light weights lower and heavies strong.

Stockers and Feeders Some choice thin feeders sold rea-dily at strong prices, but the fleshy feeders and stockers were barely steady. Receipts continued moderate. Feeders sold at \$9.50 to \$11.50, and stockers \$8.00 to \$10.75. Small inquiry was reported for stock cows, heifers and calves.

Hogs Hog prices at the outset were steady to 10 cents lower, but before packers had bought many hogs other markets reported rather sharp declines and the close here was 15 to 25 cents lower. The top price was \$14.55, and the bulk of sales was the narrowest for some months past, and was made largely of medium to strong weight grades. Pigs and stock hogs were lower at \$12.50 to \$13.50.

Sheep and Lambs Prices for sheep and lambs were teady Demand was active and most of the liberal supply was sold. Spring lambs both native and Western, brought \$14.00 to \$15.75. Some 81pound Texas yearlings brought \$12, and wethers \$10 00 to \$10.35 with ewes \$8.50 to \$9.00. Goats were stea-





APPELLATE COURT OF KANG-AROO HELD SESSION

A trial by a jury of twelve in which the court assumed authority as the supreme appellate court of the province of Kangaroo, convened in special session last Sunday evening with Hon. G. K. 

INDUSTRIAL CONDITIONS AS SEEN BY LUBBOCK MEN

"Those who will suffer most from the present industrial unrest will be retailers," according to L. C. Ellis, Cashier of the Security State Bank & Trust Co. "The cutting of prices has been forced on these firms by the sentiment of the people and they receive very little encouragement from the wholesalers," as seen by another prominent business man by another prominent business man of Lubbock. Bankers of Lubbock are all agreed that there is no reason for the average man to fear any financial trouble. All banks say they will take care of their customers but will in the meantime work in accord with the regional banks in curtailing as much as possible the steadily growth of inflation in prices. "Undue and unnecessary speculation will be stop-ped to a great extent," in the opin-ion of other bank men whom the Avalanche representative talked with

"One problem that has recently been solved by Gov. Harding of the Federal Reserve System that did for a time look as though West Texas and the west as a whole would suffer. That was: The cattlemen had bought and sold on contracts, arrangements having been made in most instances with local banks throughout the country, to care for the purchase of these stocks. In the spring months or only a few weeks back many of these contracts were due and then it was that local banks were caught in a position where they were forced to call on the regional banks," says a Lubbock banker, and continued: The regional banks at first did not care to take or rediscount loans on the live stock industry, thus making a very serious condition for the local banks and the cattlemen." It was then that Gov. Harding of the Federal Reserve System, issued instruc-tions to the effect that these papers should be rediscounted by the Re-serve Banks." These instructions were followed, according to this banker, and paper now carrying cattle as collateral are accepted at the Reserve Banks. According to this man the same threatened the agricultural industries but not to the extent that the cattle industry was threatened. Instructions are out now to the effect that all loans secured with legitimate collateral for financing farmers throughout the growing and harvesting season would be made by the Reserve Banks. 





Men By Dr. Stephen S. Wise I cannot think of a finer service that parents can render a child than to help him rightly to appraise the moral and spiritual worth of men and women well known, of the bestknown, of the so-called great. To reveal Washington, Lincoln or Roose-velt to a child is to inspire and enrich a child, not only by placing a Titanic figure in the Pantheon of his imagination, but by making clear what are the greatnesses of the great.

It was said of a most learned and distinguished Englishman that he had no shrines. I am not afraid that American children will be shrineless, but I am concerned about the American child having shrines worthy of his reverence and honor. Parents cannot expect to reveal to a child the essence of greatness and nobleness in another until after they have answered for themselves the question of what greatness really is,-until they know that greatness is not a matter of passing fame, but of abiding worth, moral and spiritual and that in a democracy no man is great who does not greatly serve.

I would warn parents against the danger of filling the shrines of their children with second and third and even fifth rate figures. Parents must have the courage to say to a child,-"This man, however well-known is "Lord, I'll pray here in my pew!" not worthy of your respect for he lacks nobility. This man, however "Pray—but My laborers are few, An earth is nigh disaster?" rich or powerful, however numerous "Lord I'll serve with my sect and noble person.

We owe our children the truth at all times and under all circumstances. Let parents be generous in their appraisals of the worthy, but let them unsparing in their condemnation those who are unworthy of a child's love and reverence.







To provide a course in Home Nursing and Care of the Sick for the women of Lubbock County. A specially trained salaried nurse has already arrived here to help organize and conduct these classes. Actual instruction will begin June 7th. Full particulars relative to this course may be obtained by calling on Mrs. M. Fulton, Executive Secretary of the Red Cross, First Floor of Court House, or phoning 428.

To secure a salaried matron for the ladies' rest room on the first floor of the Court House, and to secure needed additional furniture and equipment for this rest room and provide a liberal supply of good magazines and newspapers which will be kept up-to-date. NOTE: This will be done as soon as due permission of the Commissioners' Court has been obtained.

To make this organization the clearing house of all cases where financial or other assistance is solicited. All firms and individuals of Lubbock are requested to refer all cases of this nature to the office of the Executive Secretary on the first floor of the Court House, where they will be thoroughly investigated by competent parties and such assistance as seems advisable rendered with the least possible delay.

To secure and install a suitable number of garbage or trash cans on the Court House lawn. This matter will be attended to as soon as permission of the Commissioners' Court has been duly obtained.



AND SAVE MONEY

The fair price commission declares that if consumers will buy more forequarter beef-whence come less expensive cuts—they will save money. Here is something which the United States department of agriculture re-

cently said on the subject:
"Because of its reputation as the choicest cut, the people ask for porterhouse steak, whereas if they would try a chuck steak, the chances are it would prove to be satisfactory and it would cost much less. The reputation of porterhouse steak with the consequent large demand for it, coupled with the fact that this cut forms only a very small per cent of the carcass, causes it to sell at a higher price than any other cut.

"If people in general could realize the value of meat from the fore-quarter as compared with that from the hind-quarter and would use more of it prices of meat as a whole would be greatly reduced and would be more stable.

"An abnormal demand for an commodity forces up the price and this condition applies to porterhouse steak or other choice cuts. People should use more fore-quarter meats and reduce the prices of living. Any of the fore-quarter meat is good for making meat loaves or Liberty steak, while in some markets, steaks are cut from the rib and sell as short cut steaks.

The department of agriculture shows plainly how expensive it is to discriminate against the fore-quarter

"The average consumer seldom re-alizes the difference in the selling price of beef taken from the hindquarters and that cut from the forequarters, and if he is aware of it very likely does not understand the reason therefor. The wholesale prices on hind and fore-quarters of beef are based on a differential of so much over carcass price for hind-quarters and so much under carcass price for fore-quaters. It is seldom that fore-quarters ever sell as high or that hind-quarters sell as low as careass prices. The average differential is usually 2 cents over on hinds and 2 cents under on fores. At present, the differentials are greater, both over and under.

"The differential is changed according to the market.

This is just the time of year for persons with porterhouse habits to get acquaisted with beef from the fore-quarter. Such meat is used largely for roasts and stews. On this account it requires more heat for cooking. In cold weather, when it is necessary to heat the house for personal comfort, there is a double reas-

on for using fore-quarter beef.

Neck Meat of Beef Loaf 2 pounds neck meat of beef,

1-2 pound lean pork, ground.

Mix the beef, pork, egg, pepper, bread crumbs and seasonings with sufficient milk or water to form into loaf. Arrange strips of bacon on top. Bake in loaf or in casserole in a moderate oven for two hours. Cover if necessary to prevent the top from becoming too hard and dry.—U. S. Department of Justice.





INSECTS AND DISEASES IN THE GARDEN

Insects which attack vegetables may be divided into two groups— those which eat or chew the leaves or fruit, and those which suck the plant juices.

Biting insects may be poisoned by spraying the plants with poisonous olutions or by dusting them with poison powders. Potato beetles, flea beetles, cabbage worms, striped cucumber beetles and similar biting insects may be held in check by spraying the plants with arsenate of ead paste at the rate of two pounds lead paste at the rate of two pounds to fifty gallons of water. The spray sticks better, especially on smooth plants like cabbage, if a little soap or molasses is dissolved in the spray. The arsenate of lead may be obtained as a dry powder, mixed in a quantity of flour or air-slaked lime and dusted on the plants.

Sucking insects like plant lice may be held in check by spraying with soap suds, kerosene emulsion or to-

soap suds, kerosene emulsion or to-bacco decoction. Most insects are al-so repelled to a greater or less degree by the presence of fine dust, which tends to close their breathing pores. For that reason, it is best to keep the surface soil well tilled to

keep the surface soil well tilled to maintain a dry, surface dust mulch. Wood ashes, air-slaked lime, insect powder or tobacco dust sprinkled on and about the plants also help to keep down insects.

Most fungous diseases such as celery rust and potato blight, may be held in check by spraying with bordeaux mixture; four pounds copper sulphate; four pounds lime; fifty gallons of water.

lons of water.

Where both insects and fungi are present, it is well to add two pounds of arsenate of lead paste to the fifty gallons of bordeaux mixture. This combination spray is to be recommended especially for potatoes to control the potato beetle and potato blight. Detailed information on the control of garden insects will be found in Extension Service Circular 15, of the University of Missouri College of Agriculture. lege of Agriculture.

CATTLE AND HOGS STEADY; SHEEP FAIRLY ACTIVE

Kansas City Stock Yards, May 31.

Considering that today was a holiday in other divisions of the market, live stock receipts were liberal, and trade was quiet. All the big packing houses were closed, but buyers were in the competition. They bought

in the competition. They bought yearlings and butcher cattle and calves steady, heavy steers slightly lower, hogs steady with Saturday, and sheep steady to strong.

Today's Receipts

Receipts today were 11,000 cattle, 14,000 hogs, and 8,000 sheep, compared with 10,000 cattle, 14,000 hogs and 15,000 sheep a week ago, and 15,000 cattle, 15,900 hogs, and 16,-200 sheep a year ago. sheep a year ago.

Beef Steers
Killers bought yearling steers,
mixed butcher cattle and cows and heifers at steady prices, in some cases paying strong prices for yearlings. Heavy steers, however, continued in slow demand and prices were weak. Other markets had moderate supplies but they were unable to resupplies but they were unable to report any improvement in the trade. Yearling steers sold at \$11.40 to \$13.25 and heavy steers at \$11.75 to \$12.50. About forty cars of Colorado steers were offered, and seventy cars of grass fat steers were in the quarantine division. Good cows brought \$8.50 to \$18.00, and were quoted fully steady. Veal calves were steady at \$9.00 to \$13.00.

Stockers and Feeders

Few country buyers were here owing to the general decoration holi-

ing to the general decoration holi-day, and while receipts of thin cattle were small they sold slowly at weak prices. Fleshy feeders were neg-lected, and thin feeders suitable for grazing were in meager supply.

Hog prices were steady at Saturday's decline of 15 to 25 cents.

Shippers were out of the trade at most markets. Pigs and thin hogs suitable for stock and feeding purposes were lower, at \$12.00 to \$12.75.

Though receipts were liberal packers bought freely and took the bulk of principal buyers. Southwest spring lambs sold at \$15.50 to \$16.00, and some clipped lambs at \$14.50. Ewes sold at \$9.00 to \$9.25, wethers \$10.50 and thin feeding lambs at \$11.00 to \$11.25. Moderate receipts are expected the rest of the week.




