"Whereas, it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection and

Whereas both Houses of Congress have, by their joint committee, requested me to recommend to the people of the United States a day of pubne thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging, with grateful hearts the many and signal favors of Almighty God, especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of government for their safety and happi-

#### Twenty County Agents are Found In Plains Section

"Where you find a county that is rogressive enough to employ a couragricultural agent, there you will find a county that is a leader in stated D. P. McCalib, Panhandle-Plains supervisor of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, with headquarters in Amarillo.,

It may be news to some people to learn that the Panhandle-Plains country is getting near the top in the number of agricultural agents in its counties, but such is to be expected, for the first thing a stranger learns when he arrives in this country is that the people are always on the alert to find means of advancing the

country.

Of thirty-eight counties in the third district, as arranged by the Agricultural Agent at the Texas Agricultural and Mechanicaal College, twenty of them have agricultural agents. Six of the twenty have been employed during the past year, and seven other counties are now making arrangements to get agents as soon as they can secure them.

The counties that have secured agents during the past year are Knox, Gray, Dallam, Donley, Collingsworth, and Wichita, Hansford, Ochiltree, Deaf Smith, Briscoe, Motley, Parmer and Bailey are after agents.

This is a record to be proud of, taking into view the fact that in the extreme southwest part of the district there are several counties that have ess than 500 population each, but must be counted in as part of the

As the state and federal governnent will pay a good part of the salaries of county agents, there is litreason for any county not to have ne. Where there is not work enough ccording to the opinions of the councommissioners and others in auority, to keep an agent busy, they can cooperate with some other county in securing the services of the agent. This has been done by Potter and Oldham Counties, and the fourth place won by the latter county and he high standing of the first, at the Dallas Fair shows what can be done through the assistance of such experts, Mr. McCalib said in closing.



Cotton farmers, because of ever recurring low prices and boll weevil damage, are now unwilling and unable to depend solely upon cotton as a source of cash. In their search for an additional, dependable cource of cash, many have turned to

farm dairying. Dairying is not likely to make anybody rich overnight. But milking a few cows will bring in a cream check twice a month through out the year. And the cream check may well be made to pay the family expenses while we are growing, gathering, and selling a crop of cotton.

Many cotton farmers throughout the South have already shown conclusively that milking a few cows and selling cream, butter or milk is a very satisfactory side-line to cotton farming. They have made money by taking on the extra job of milking cows. It has given them profitable employment in the winter season and in mid-summer. It has given them checks every other week with which to pay cotton-growing expenses. It has given them a dependable income, whether cotton prices were high or low. It has enabled them to pay cash for supplies, thereby effecting a saving over buying on credit. It has given them a profitiable method for selling the abundance of forage that their lands grow so well. It has enabled them to sell much roughage that otherwise would have gone to waaste on their farms.

But it has given them a supply of manure which has built up the productive power of the And this land is now producing cotton at a good profit, whereas once it could grow cotton only at starvation wages. Truly, the milk cow will do this and more for other farmers. But to succeed, they must observe a few simple rules: (1) Start in a small way with the best cows you have. (2) In buying new cows get only those you know will produce enough to pay a profit. (3) grow an abundance of feed. (4) Feed liberally but not extravagantly; study the art of feeding. (5) Save the manure and put it on the land to grow more feed and better cotton. (6) Feed the skim milk to the calves, pigs, and chickens. (7) Begin on a small scale, study the job closely, grow up with it, stay in the business consistently regardless of the price of cotton, and increase the number of milk cows as conditions justify.

The same is true with other lines of business. The fellow away over in the other part of the State does not know anything about your business and what you have. 





#### Cotton Quarantine Being Enforced In Ennis Vicinity

Austin, Texas, Nov. 15.-When the pink boll worm law of the first called session of the legislature became effective at midnight last night. a proclamation by Governor Neff pro-claiming a special emergency quarantine in that portion of Ellis county surrounding the city of Ennis also became effective.

The proclamation says that since the pink boll worm has been found to exist in that territory that it shall be unlawful for any person to ship any cotton or cotton products of any kind from the quarantined area or any car or vehicle of transportation liable to carry the worm from the restricted district, except under rules and regulations of the commissioner of agriculture. It further says that the law shall be in effect until a hearing can be held by the pink boll worm com-mission created in the recent act, and the report of this commission acted upon



#### Wool is Slow Sale At Angelo Auction Last Week

San Angelo, Texas, Nov. 23.ZAccording to reports to the Agricultural Bureau of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce the Wool Growers Central Storage Co. of San Angelo, offered approximately 525,-000 pounds of short, six months wool of the 1921 fall production at its first auction of the season, but did posed of only one clipping, that of T. A. Kincaid of Czona. His clipping presented an accumulation of more than 60,000 pounds. The short wool however, is reported to have commanded around 21 cents per pound, the highest price so far paid this fall for Texas clippings. Six month wool clip recently disposed of at Del Rio and Kerrville brought 19

cents a pound. For 401,000 pounds of long, twelve months' wool of the 1921 spring production, the Wool Growers' Central Storage Co. received from 16 to 21-1-2 cents. The average was 16 cents a pound, bringing \$85,000 to \$90,000 to sheepmen in a half dozen West Texas counties. About 72,-000 pounds of short, six months' wool was in the lots sold here late in May.

"WOOL COTTON" IS NOT PROFITABLE IN TEXAS

Several samples of "Wool Cotton" or "African Cotton" have come to the classifying department of the Extension Service here at College Station, lately, with requests for infor-mation as to its adaptability here, and where seed can be secured, etc. Illinois, and Washington, D. #### Hibernation Places of Boll Weevils are Being Destroyed

Owing to the ravages of the boll weevil in Texas, the cotton growing section of our State is displaying active interest in the application of Fall and Winter measures for the distruction of the hibernation places of the boll weevil.

The Extension Service has been reliably informed that some communities are burning the grasses and trash along fences, ditches and similar places commonly used as hibernating places of the boll weevil. We believe this is a mistake at this time since the weevils do not go into hibsuffering a great deal of pain, weak, ernation until heavy frost becomes aervous, depressed. I was so weak, general and will continue their migration for some weeks. Should they find such places burned, they will simply continue their migration until suitable places can be found, advises R. R. Reppert, Entomologist, couldn't eat, and slept poorly. I Extension Service, A. & M. College of Texas, who recommends that the burning of these places be delayed until the middle of December at the earlest, although the first of January would be better. By this time all of the weevils should be congregated in the hibernation places and and the burning of hibernation places in the Winter. In regard to the burning of cotton stalks on the field, it is realized that this will accomplish great results in control, however, the Extension Service hesitates to recommend the burning of stalks as a general measure on account of the consequent removal of organic matter. The individual farmer must decide for himself which out weighs the other.
