worry about it," Mayor Scarborough said. "Everything is coming nicely and we will soon have plenty of water. We want the people to continue to conserve the supply, but we also emphasize that the city is not going to be without water.'

Eleven carloads of pipe for construction of the line connecting the city with Lake Abilene, the 16, 000,000,000 gallon reservoir in the mountains, have arrived here, and thirty more are on the way. It will require 300 carloads of pipe to fill the contract. The pipe, consisting of 18 and 20-inch, is in 12-foot sections and weighs 150 pounds to the foot. There will be 35,000 feet of the pipe, weighing 5,250,000 pounds. The pipe is of cast iron and is practically two-thirds of an inch thick. The contractors will use a mechanical ditcher in the process of laying it and it is estimated that with a double shift of men a daily average of 2,000 feet can be maintained.

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





Dawson of Coleman reported for the foreign mission board the State convention, reciting figures on the number of missionaries missions, churches, schools and other institutions in foreign laads maintained by the Southern Baptist Convention and in which Texas Baptists have a large share of interest.

There are 469 missionaries; 970 native orkers, 661 churches, 187 of are self-supporting; 632 which. schools ith 22,866 in attendance; 1, 400 out-stations and 907 Sunday. Schools with an attendance of 41,000 students.

Church in Straits.

Reporting on the financial straits of the University Baptist Church in Austin, Judge O. S. Lattimore of Fort Worth and Austin recommended that every Baptist Church in Texas take an effering some time during the month of January to assist the church in paying its debt of \$130,000. This recommendation was referred to the executive board.

Reports on the work of women's part in the life of the Texas Baptist Church were made by Mrs. J. C. Williamson of Austin.

They see a gleam of hope that this conference will somehow gather the broken fragments of what Woodrow Wilson planned, and yet rescue peace for the world-that peace that was enshrined in the League of Nations covenant; that peace that he brought back from Versailles; that peace that he incarnated in his life; that peace for which, when he is gone, all the world will know he died.

The throngs will continue to ap-plaud, and their shouts of praise will increase with the passing years like the climing waves of the sea. And when history shall write its final appraisal of our honored Americans the name of Woodrow Wilson will shine resplendent as the greatest man this country ever produced.

In that day the only badge of immortality that Lodge and his crowd can claim will be that once they came into the orbit of the light of his majestic lie and were the men that hounded Wilson and bestrayed a suffering world .--- J. B. Cranfill, in Dal-
