The Journal does not believe that the Government, having already hown its good will and interest in the farmers, will now be a party to any such proceedure. That time extension of loan payments, in certain intences will be granted, is evidence of that fact. But it is our belief that the Government may go still farther in their assistance, and the Journal makes bold to offer the following suggestion:

That the Government take a portion of the farmers' cotton as collateral, and, if necessary a mortgage on next year's cotton crop, leaving the farmer some stated portion of his crop to set. The Government might even of arther, and give the farmer, say an advance guarantee or eight cents per pound, based on middling cotton, for such cotton as is put up as collateral. Also, let a similar proceedure be applied to other raised crops where the growers have borrowed money from the Federal Government.

Perhaps it would also be a good idea to again set up the various county committees who operated in securing these loans last spring, and let them again pass upon the advisability of renewals, extensions and part payments, as they deem advisable and as is warranted by conditions in the sum of the sum o
