A Lesson From the National Budget

After many months of speculation as to the financial outcome of government operations for the current fiscal years it is now certain that the Federal expenditure will come within the Federal revenues and leave a balance on hand, all due to the budget system which up to date has proved itself well worth while for the public purse, regardless of the political complexion of government.

General Lord, Director of the Budget, gives the figure of \$60,000,000 as his estimate of the balance that will be left on hand subject, of course, to possible developments that may occur within the next two weeks which may upset calculations

Bringing the lesson home, the figures show that the Federal Government is the only form of government in the United States that is showing a reduction in its financial levies and expenditures. The cost of government in the states, in the counties, in the towns and in the village is constantly rising.

The proportionate increase in government cost in the small communities is startling. The actual additional outlay in taxation may appear small to the individual, but in the aggregate it is found that the nation for some time has been on a wild spending spree. It is the aggregate condition that affects trade, Many villages where local improvements have forced up taxation or bonded indebtedness will soon begin to feel the effect in decreased real estate operations. Sooner or later home buyers will avoid the incorporations where taxes are high and seek to build on the outskirts of the incorporations to escape tax.






