WALTON CASE AGAIN DEFERRED

JOHNSON FIRES VOLLEY AT FORD

DEMANDS REASON SUDDEN CHANGE IN ATTITUDE **TOWARD NOMINEES**

WASHINGTON, Dec 22 ---Hiram Johnson took a caustic fling at Henry Ford tonight for the latter's endorsement of President Coolidge as a "safe" candidate for the presidency.

The Californian asked what happened between October 13, when Ford denounced Secretary Weeks for the sale of the Gorgas plant connected with the Muscle Shoals project and December 19, when "Mr. Ford gives out his 'safe' interview.

"If Mr. Coolidge were not safe, and if his administration were under the influence of private interests on the 13th day of October as Mr. Ford said to the 'American public'' demanded Johnson "what occurred between the 13th day of October and the 19th day of December to transmute the bitter denunciation of Mr. Ford against the edministration then into enthusiastic advocacy now?"

While Johnson conceded Ford was entitled to his political opinion, he declared "these opinions cannot control a republican nomination."

"Mr. Ford was for Mr. Wilson when Mr. Wilson was president," said Johnson.

"Mr. Ford was for Mr. Harding when Mr. Harding was president. Mr. Ford is for Mr. Coolidge when Cool-idge is president. Mr. Ford is a marvelous business man.



ing. No other candidate had ever done that. The housewives, although surprised at the methods, welcomed the man announced, "I'm Fred Koh-ler" and listened while he told them how he was going to be elected mayor of Cleveland, then went to the pells and voted for him. And Fred Kohler kept his promise

so far as his election was concerned, for he defeated a field of six candidates and rode into office on a wave of popularity that has been un-equaled in the city's history of elections.

Painted City Yellow. Dignified citizens awoke one morn ing to find their city had been paint-ed—painted a bright yellow.

ed—painted a bright yellow. Delegations called on Mayor Koh-ler and asked for an explanation. The mayor explained that the paint-ing was badly needed. "But why paint it yellow?" inquired the en-raged citizens. "Well, yellow is a swell color," he replied. 



Upon completiou of the building the defendant re-fused to pay for such labor and mafused to pay for such labor and material amounting to \$114.50. By way of cross action in the final judgment of cross action in the final judgment the defendant was given judgment against the plaintiff for the sum of \$32.25. This hotel with its red wind-mill as a source of water supply has long been a relic of the past and in its stead now stands the beautiful brick home of the Lub Tex Motor company, western distributors of Overland and Willys Knight automo-biles.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Dec. 22-U(ited Press.) --- Vacations might solve a ot of the farmer's problems, This suggestion was made at recent farm life conference here by one of the country's leading farmers, who has put the plan successfully

"So long as I let the day drag into the night, on the succeeding day I was not efficient either in the management of my farm nor in the performance of my own labor upon it," declared John R. Howard, Iowa farm er, former president of the American Farm Bureau, and now president of the National transportation institute. "Country life is too commonly sup-

"Such a thing as a farmer taking a vacation might sound impossible absurdity to many people.

"For my own part I want to say I consider an annual vacation for the farmer a business proposition. Successful agriculture is as much a matter of mental activity as it is of physical. The vacation is a productive investment because the new contacts made and ideas gained are made use of in the better management of the farm
