So have all the rest of us, colleges and universities in the United States. including those who are now inclined to sow the cow pastures to great expectations. Is cotton even at the present range of prices a profitable crop for the majority? There are a hundred risks against which no cotton farmer can insure himself. The boll weevil, is only one of them. He is not even the principal one. The main risk of cotton farming is in the advancing cost of production. There is no profit in 30c cotton if it costs 30c to get it ready for market. At this moment the South is facing another crop year that will rival 1920 in cost. The South was practically bankrupted by the 1920 crop, which cost 35c to aroduce and sold for less than half of that. The same thing may happen again. The only insurance against it will be in keeping the cost of raising cotton to something like the figures that governed when cotton was selling at 15c, or thereabouts. 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


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


