They do best on new ground, preferably any heavy rich native soil, whether black or red, the they do splendidly on sandy soil if the clay is not more than two or three feet below the surface. They should be planted in a solid bed by themselves out in the full sunlight, the they may be put on the east or west side of a building, or fence. Do not plant them on the north and they want shrubs or vines. And where roses have been growing successfully a number of years, they should not be planted in the same soil again. Better make a new bed in the back yard or wherever an open place can be found that has no roots or trees nearby. If such a place cannot be found then give up trying to grow roses and plant shrubs or evergreens Roses are valuable only for the blossoms they produce. They are useless as a shrub, hence they should not be planted around the house, in any locality where a shrub effect is desired. Climbing roses, however may be planted around the porch, if desired, but it is even better to plant these on trellises.

While roses are great feeders, it is the safer plan not to use any fer-tilizer the first season. After they have made one or two rowth and are well established, it is beneficial to put two or three inches of stable manure on the ground in the fall or early spring and eave it there all winter. In be spaded in. Much of the so-called "Dairy loam" that is sold is a light porus chaffy soil that often does more harm than good, especially where it is applied in the late spring. Bush roses require a pruning every year or two, but should not be done here until

HIGHWAY DEPT.

R. W. Baker, district engineer for the State Highway Department who has established an office here in the courthouse, announced Tues day that the department is shipp ing all types of road building rua-chinery to this territory, and that a big repair shop in which the de partment's equipment will be kept me condition, will be established here

Though spacious buildingswi II be erected for this repair shon within the near future, Engineer Baker an nounced that the department con templates renting the buildings owned by the South Plains Fair Association for temporary use, inasmuch as there is a great deal of highway work being done in this district at this time and the need of the repair shop is already realized.

There will be steady employment

given fifteen men in maintaining this repair shop, in which the high way department's equipment used in the twenty four counties will be re-paired. Approximately \$300,000 will be spent by the department in the erection of permanent shops to Lubbock.

Mr. Baker stated that seven high-ways traverse his district and that about 2500 miles of these highways are under his supervision, these highways being numbers 2, 4, 18, 3.

Mr. Baker and two assistant engineers are now taking care of the business of the department in this district, but he is of the opinion that others would be added to the office force just as soon as a larger office can be secured, and this will probably not be done until the new city hall for the city of Lubbock has been built.

Mr. Baker helped to finish one hundred miles of the Bankhead Highway that traversed Howard, Midland, Martin and Ector counties just prior to coming to Lubbock, and is hopeful that such work can be completed in this district within the near future.
