

It was noted in these columns a short time ago that Knoxville had just completed a job of paving that the city put in itself and that a great saving was effected. In referring to the matter a recent dispatch from that town shows the cost to be considerably less than half the amount of con-

Perhaps the easiest way, says the dispatch, to appreciate the difference in cost of the two paving plans is to compare the payments actually to be made under the Knoxville plan and the payments which were to have been made to the O'Rourke Construction company for paving of the same extent and same materials, but only 6 inches thick instead of 7. The following shows the payment of a few of the property owners, the first column being the O'Rourke bid for 6-inch concrete, the second the actual cost of the city's 7-inch concrete:




