Sour Milk and Soda Biscuits 2 1-4 cups flour, or 2 cups bread flour, 2 tsp. baking powder, 1-2 tsp. soda, 3-4 tsp. salt, 4 tbsp. shortening, cold; 1 cup sour milk, cold. Make according to directions for baking powder biscuits. Sift the soda with other dry ingredients.
