

The plan put forward by Lodge was not approved either by President Coolidge or Secretary of State Hughes before it was offered.

Briefly, the resolution calls upon President Coolidge to convene a third Hague conference for the purpose of establishing a new international court of 16 judges who would be selected by an electorial commission composed of representatives of signatory powers. Harding proposed a reservation by which the ways will stand out without any representatives designated for the purpose so that membership in the league would not be necessary. The present world court provides compulsory jurisdiction only in cases involving sountries which have signed the optional compulsory clause. Other countries may not be called into


