### ROY CLARK HURT IN ACCIDENT AT WINTERS

Details of the accident in which Roy Clark, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Clark, 802 Avenue O, was hurt Sunday night at Winters, have just been received here.

Roy was driving a Buick six car when he met a car, the lights of which glared into his eyes, blinding him temporarily. He drove his car far to the right of the road, and just as the approaching car passed he saw another car which was standing still and without lights some twenty-five feet ahead of him. He was making about twenty-five miles per hour, and whirled his car to the left in an effort to miss the standing car, but just as he was about to pass it he noticed that his car was about to go into the ditch and when he whirled the wheel to the right in an effort to regain the middle of the road, the rear wheel struck the rear wheel of the standing car and the impact threw his car into the air, turning it upside down. It turned completely over, pinning him and Miss Faye Reed, his companion, of Winters, beneath it. He managed to free himself but it was some time before help came to take Miss Reed from beneath the car.

Roy was painfully but not seriously injured, while Miss Reed suffered several dangerous injuries, and is still in a Winters sanitarium where physicians have announced that she will get well.

The accident has been described as being unavoidable in that but for the coincident of the third car being parked at the roadside near the point that the running car net created a situation that could not be overcome, even with reasonable caution.

### LOCAL PASTOR IS INTERESTED IN EDUCATION

Stressing the importance of the Presbyterian movement for Christian education here the church has received a letter from their pastor urging support of the work being done.

Rev. Lewis in writing to the members of his church here brings out the following points:

"There has been launched in Texas, by order of the Synod, a movement of vital importance to every Presbyterian in the State. I refer to the Presbyterian movement for Christian education which is endeavoring to secure in cash and pledges the sum of \$1,350,000 for the following institutions: Austin College, Sherman; Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary; Daniel Baker College, Brownwood; Southwestern Home and School for Orphans, Itasca; Texas Presbyterian College, Milford; Texas-Mexican Industrial Institute, Kingsville; Presbyterian School for Mexican Girls, Taft; Church for University Students, Austin; Presbyterian work at College of Industrial Arts and North Texas State Normal, Denton; Work among Presbyterian Students at Normal School centers at Commerce, San Marcos and Huntsville; and Presbyterian work at A. & M. College, College Station.

"From our own schools and col-

leges must come ninety percent of our ministers and the bulk of our Christian leaders. We have talked vaguely and eloquently of our institutions becoming great in time. Time, without efforts, endows or equips nothing. If the future of these institutions is to be assured we must support this great movement now. They need you now; next year may be too late.

"Twelve other synods, where such splendid things have been done for Christian education, are watching us. Texas, the largest of them all, cannot, must not fail. Ask your pastor, I want to assure you that I am for this movement; that I think it is one of the most vital causes before the Presbyterians of Texas today and I am asking that you support it with (1) your prayers; (2) your benevolences and (3) by your cooperation and effort.

"Presbyterians have responded liberally to every other worthy cause and I know that our congregation will not fail now when their own church makes such an urgent and pressing appeal for necessary assistance."

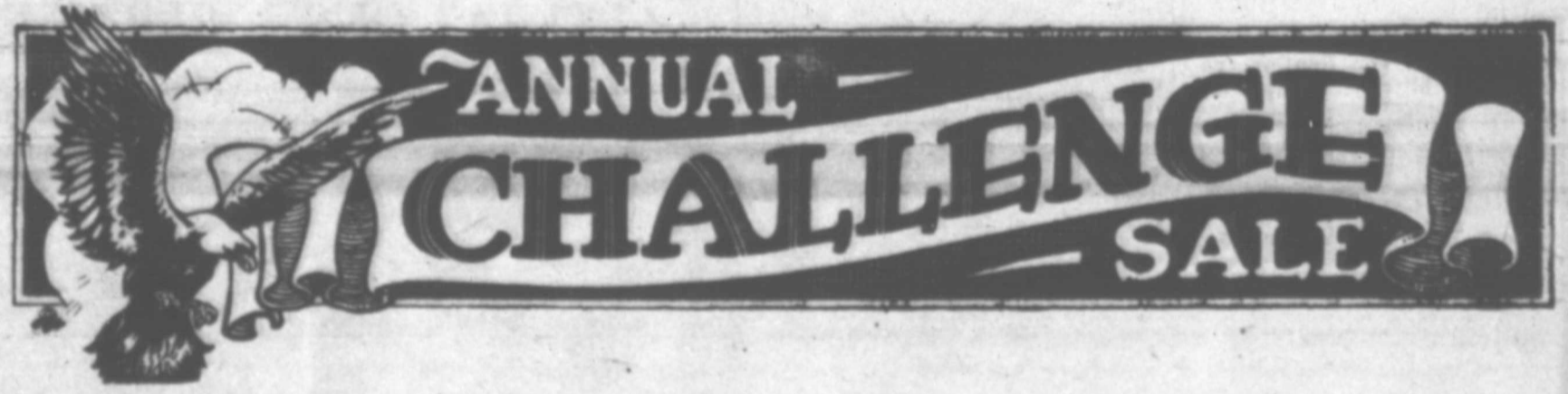

# LAND SUIT WON BY PETTIT IN COURT HERE

The jury in the case of Robert Pettit et al vs. W. E. and J. E. Spencer, returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff at 11:50 o'clock Friday after having deliberated more than four hours.

The case was completed and went to the jury late Thursday afternoon, but the jurors were dismissed from service until Friday morning, and it was after they had reconvened and gone into the case at eight o'clock Friday morning that they agreed upon the verdict.

The case involved land valued at approximately one hundred and eighty thousand dollars, and the verdict favored the plaintiffs by giving them claim to one half of the land involved.

# MARX WINS PLEA ACCEPTANCE DAWES PLAN

By United News. BERLIN, June 6.—Chancellor Marx has won his fight to keep Germany pledged to execution of the Dawes plan.

After the past weeks confusion, when in view of nationalist gains in the elections it seemed that Germany would repudiate the previous commitment to the project, the reichstag Friday, approved the Marx governments policy of executing the report.

The body voted 247 to 182 on a resolution approving the plan. The resolution also instructed the government to do its utmost to arrange that German prisoners in the occupied areas be freed and that Germans expelled from the areas be allowed to return.

The middle parties supported by the socialist and the Bavarian peoples party, voted for the Dawes plan.

The nationalists and communists opposed it.

An opposition viewpoint was expressed by Count Von Rentlow, nationalist, who bitterly warned for-

sign investors against believing that Germany would be stabilized. "Germany must not place confidence in the Dawes plan," he said, "since the signature of this government will not be worth anything."

Dr. Edward C. Bloom, well known local dentist who maintains an office here with his brother, Dr. Harry Bloom, arrived in Lubbock Friday from Breckenridge, where he has been the past three weeks visiting his sister. He returned to Lubbock to be in attendance at the twelfth annual convention of the West Texas Dental Society, which convened Friday morning for a two days' session.

Drs. Bloom became members of the society at the convention at San Angelo last year and are doing a great deal to further the interests of the society.

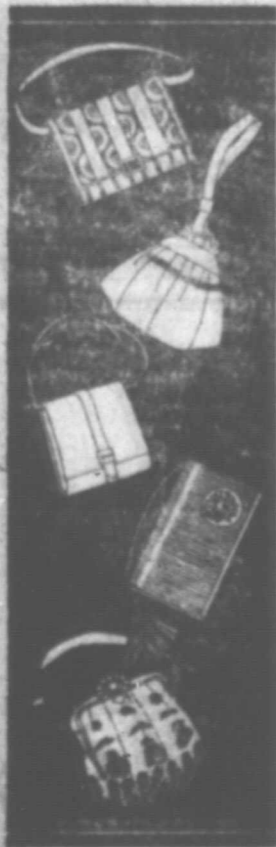

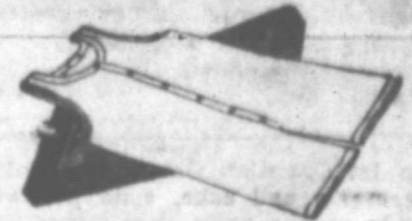
