From Sherman he went to Houston for a seventeen-year stay as superintendent, making a record for accomplishments in a large city system. A year spent in Mexico City as superintendent of the American schools, then a call to the presidency of the Southwestern University of Georgetown.

When Lubbock was selected as the city for the Texas Technological College, President Horn was elected to head that institution. It is the fulfillment of a dream that he had long entertained. Not a dream to be head of that particular college, but a dream to be able to take the lead in the running of a school that would train Texas youths to take the fullest advantage of the materials of the state, to be able to do the fullest part in the development of Texas as the empire of the nation in an economical way. He has long wanted to see Texas boys and girls trained to be the leaders in manufacturing and development of the raw materials now produced on the fertile lands of the Lone Star State.

"His dream is fast coming true." In relating some of the incidents of his early days as a school teacher, Dr. Horn said:

'I tried to be worth the money,' laughing as he recalled his first year as a teacher. That was thirty-six years ago, in a rural community in Missouri-and the money had a grand total of \$100 for the session of four months.

"Of course," he admitted, "there were other compensations. For instance—they had fried chicken one time that year at my boarding house, I was considerably put out, for I had made a but they were for the market!"




