SERVICE VERY DEFICIENT

BY MILTON MACKAYE United News Staff Correspondent

WASHINGTON, June 10 .--- Happenings of the last few weeks have brought home a cruel lesson to the War Department. They have shown the government's system of communication with the Orient to be absolutely unreliable.

The recent experience with the army world flyers is cited by high army officers as the most striking example of the breakdown of communication.

It proves, they declare, that in time of war America's cable connection with the Far-East would be largely a matter of good luck and a benign Providence.

Throughout the flight along the Aleution Islands, officials messages to the department were very slow. But it was not until the aviators reached the Kurile Islands, on the far side of the Pacific, that the real complications began.

The flyers landed at Kashiwabara Bay on a Friday, completing the longest jump on the circle of the globe. But it was not until Tuesday-a lapse of five days that the department received its first official notice that they were in the Orient.

That message was a cable from the Naval Attache at Tokyo, relaying a report from the U.S.S. "Pope.

As a result the government has been compelled to depend almost entirely upon commercial press re- | ports for the latest news.

Every effort has been made to get the last message from the Aleutians through. The relief ship Haida first picked up the word that the flyers had left for the Kuriles when it touched at a port where communication with them could be established.

The Haida radioed the news to Yukon, Alaska, where telegraph carried it to Seward, Alaska, from Seward the word went by cable to Seattle. From there it was relayed by army wireless to Cheyenne, Wyo., to Ft. Leavenworth, Kan., and from there to Wasihngton




