# Ordinance Approving Engineer's Rolls or Statements for Improvements on the Hereinbelow Mentioned Portions of Streets and Avenues Determining to Assess a Portion of the Cost of Improvements Against Abutting Property and the Owners Thereof Ordering Hearing Fixing Time and Place Therefor and Directing Notice Thereof and Declaring an Emergency Account Poor Condition of Streets

WHEREAS, the City of Lubbock has heretofore odered that the hereinbelow mentioned portions of streets and avenues, among others, be improved by raising, grading and filling same, paving with foundation, and constructing curbs and gutters, all with appurtenances and accessories, and otherwise improving same, with a general system of storm sewers and drains in some units, and plans and specifications for such improvements were adopted and approved, and bids advertised for and received, and contract therefor entered into with Panhandle Construction Company, and pursuant to proceeding of the City, the City Engineers have prepared and filed with the City Commission rolls or statements for the improvements on the hereinbelow mentioned portions of streets and avenues, and showing thereon descriptions of the various parcels of abutting property, with names of owners, as far as known, with the amounts proposed to be assessed against each such parcel of property for improvements on the unit upon which the particular property abuts, and showing other matters and things, the said portions of streets and avenues in connection with which such rolls or statement have been filed being as follows, to-wit:

Broadway street from its intersection with the west property line of avenue K to its intersection with the east property line of avenue M, known and designated as District or Unit No. 1, the type of pavement to be 21/2 inch vertical fibre brick on concrete foundation.

Broadway street from its intersection with the west property line of avenue M, to its intersection with the east property line of avenue P, known and designated as District or Unit No. 2, the type of pavement to be 2 is inch vertical fibre brick on concrete foundation.

Broadway street from its intersection with the east property line of avenue P, to its intersection with the east property line of avenue U, known and designated as District No. 2-a, the type of pavement to be 2½ inch vertical fibre brick on concrete foundation.

MANILA, P. L. June 26-America's silk requirements could be met adequately by the Philippines, according to Dr. Charles S. Banks, former entomologist of the Philip-pine Bureau of Science, who dis-cussed the silk industry of the Isl-ands before the American Chamber of Commerce of Manila. only thing required to develop the Philippine silk industry is ade-quate capital, he stated, climatic conditions being deal. Not only does the silkworm thrive wonderfully in the Philippines, but it yields six crops annually, as com-pared with ony two, or at the

near Manila, operating on a small scale, mainly for experimental purposes. The resuts of his experiments have been such as to justify him in predicting a brilliant future for the Philippine silk industry, given the captal resources to back

it up. Would Insure Raw Silk
In view of the present strained diplomatic relationship between the Japanese and American Governments, the possibilities of the Philippine silk industry are assuming increasing importance in commercial circles.

Silk is Japan's principal export to this country and should the volume of shipments of this tex-tile be curtailed for any reason the American silk market would be seriously affected. With the Philippines to fall back upon, however, the United States is guaranteed a

source of raw material.

Just as in the case of rubber.

American industry could make itself independent of foreign silk farms for this important raw material were it adequately developed. Millions of acres of virgin soil suitable for rubber and silk production lie untilled simply because capital is hesitant about developing it, owing to the uncertain political situation.

Once the political situation is

clarified these rich regions would yield millions of dollars' worth of tropical products, which have become essential to American industry and which are now largely controlled by foreign nations.

How Silk Is Grown Silk is spun from cocoons con-taining the chrysalis of a certain species of worm, which, if it were allowed to carry on its natural development, would emerge finally as a butterfly.

At a certain stage of the process killed and the white or yellow raw the worm inside the cocoon is silk fibre is wound from the co-coon and spun into thread. The silkworm feeds exclusively on the leaves of the mulberry tree, which must be grown to carry on sericul-

The quality of the Philippine silk scientific tests have demonstrated, is up to that of the best Japanese and Chineses varieties. and Chineses varieties.

Dr. Banks, who has done this pioneer work in Philippine sericulture is famous in Manila as the man who cleaned up the mosquito plague there during the Forbes administration. After a campaign lasting about six months, he eliminated nated these insects from the city, where they had become a formidable pest, spreading disease and making the lives of the inhabitants







If you draw a line from Vego to Corona you will find at the point where this line crosses the western side of the four-sided figure that outlines the body of Hercules, a faint hazy patch of light visable without a telescope. Yet the distance between the nearest neighboring stars in this cluster is over a trillion miles. This cluster is so far away that its light takes something like thirty thousand years to travel to the earth at the rate of 185,000 miles a second.

Almost overhead during the early evening hours of July may be seen a perfect little semi-circle of six stars known as the Corona Borealis the Northern Crown.
