# **New Leasing Prospects For** Callahan County Hospital

BAIRD - At this time, still no final decision has been reached, as to the possible leasing of the Callahan County Hospital. But, it seems that a new prospect may have appeared on the scene.

The Administrator of the West Texas Medical Center, in Abilene, is in the process of making a survey, or evaluation report, to see if it would be profitable enough, for them to lease the Callahan County Hospital. After this survey is made, and if they find the Hospital could be operated on a money - making basis, then possibly, they will talk to the zCommissioners to see if a contract can be arranged. At this time no contract has been made and no terms have been discussed, states Callahan County Judge A.E. Dyer, Jr.

The other group who is interested in leasing the County Hospital, is a group called Texas Medical Assistants Service Inc. This Group would like to lease the Hospital for five years and staff it with Doctors from the Phillipines.

# Hereford Association Completes Sale

The 34th Annual West Texas Hereford Assn. Auction Sale came to a close Monday afternoon with a big sale at the West Texas fairgrounds, grossing \$30,390 on 71 head of registered Herefords.

Animals were judged Monday morning to determine the sale order for the afternoon. Weldon Edwards of Clyde. president of the Texas Hereford Assn. had the champion bull with WE Silvertone 125, a two year old bull calved Oct. 15,

Edward's animal was sold first off and brought \$1,100. Edwards was also presented a trophy from ACCO Feeds of mail. Heretofore, a letter dropped into the mail streamwithout postage, would be delivered to the addressee upon the collection of the required postage.

Effective Sunday, Nov. 17, 1974, the U.S. Postal Service will no longer accept mail on which there is no postage for delivery to another customer. After Nov. 17, letters mailed

without postage will be returned to sender if there is a return address, or to the dead letter office if there if is no return address. Postal officials will attempt to find the sender of unpaid mail and return it for a slight fee, when there is no return address.

This new policy on mail without postage makes it doubly important that mailers include a correct return address on all their mail. This will avoid unnecessary delays, make the delivery more in keeping with the intent of the mailer, and save unnecessary clerical hours within the Postal Service.

Greenbugs are aphids 1 - 16 inch long and light green in color. Greenbugs with their piercing mouth parts such plant juices. Toxins are injected into the plant during the feeding process. Small grain infested with greenbugs first turn yellow to orange. As infestation increases, plants die and greenbugs move to uninfested plants, enlarging the affected area.

Insecticide need depends on the number of greenbugs present, size and vigof or plants, time of year, moisture conditions and stage of growth.

Armyworms are foilage feeders and can destroy an entire field in a matter of days in infestation is heavy. Color of armyworms may vary from a light green to black with dorsal stripes. Older plants can with stand higher infestations than seedling plants, he explains.





# Animals May Suffer Prussic Acid

"Animals that graze on pasture or forage that has recently been hit by a frost are subject to prussic acid poisoning", says Greg Gerngross, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Among grasses that are especially toxic to animals after a frost are Johnson grass, Sudan and other sorghum

Prussic acid poisoning is a disease which prevents oxygen in the blood from reaching the tissues and thus causes death due to suffocation.

Symptoms of the disease are suffocation and muscular twitching, and the animal may have head turned toward his flank. The blood of the animal has a bright red color. Animals usually become affected within 10 to 15 minutes after eating toxic material and rarely survive more than one or two hours.

'Livestock should not be allowed acces to wilted material after a frost until it has dried completely", says the county agent. "Grazing should also be prevented after a rain when new sprouts begin to form on plants.

Wilted material will usually dry out in a day or two of strong sunlight. New growth usually becomes non-toxic within a week to 10 days after a rain and can then be grazed safely by

One way to check a pasture is to turn out a less valuable animal that has been without hay or grass for 24 hours. A hungry animal will fill up faster and show toxic symptoms if the plant material is dangerous.

'If you think your animal shows signs of prussic acid poisoning, don't hesitate to call a vet immediately", warns Gerngross.

While pastor of the Austin Abenue Presbyterian Church in Brownwood he taught Spanish and Bible at Daniel Baker and in 1939 assumed the full time position as vice - president of Daniel Baker College.

Southern When the Presbyterian Church Synod of Texas decided to allow Daniel Baker to become independent, Dr. Moore traveled an average of 100 miles a day to raise money for the college.

In 1921 Dr. Moore and Dr. B.K. Tenney were honored by Daniel Baker as the first graduates to receive Doctor of Divinity degrees from the college

Dr. Moore has been selected to appear in the 1974 edition of Personalities of the South, a publication of the American Biographical Institute.




