CALAMITY FACES U. S. UNLESS OVER PRODUC-TION OIL IS STOPPED

AUSTIN, July 17 .- "Unless oil producers of America desist from over-production, America will be importing petroleum in eight years," W. H. Gray, of Tulsa, president the National Association of Independent Oil Producers, declared here Thursday. He is in Texas seeking the curtailment of production.

Gray declared that there is 471,000.000 barrels of oil above ground now, more than half of its surplus, and over a billion gallons of gasoline in storage. Producers are losing twenty million barrels of oil and gasoline annually from evaporation, he said.






