THE PROGRESS AT LONDON.

The agreement which the dispatches report the committee on sanctions of the interallied conference to have come to seems to have left the parties to it considerably disagreed as to its implications. They have agreed that those who lend money to Germany to put the Dawes plan into operation shall have first lien on German resources, regardless of whether Germany discharges its obligations or defaults on them. But, according to the dispatches, at least the British and French members of the committee are at odds as to whether the Reparations Commission is to have authoirty to pass judgment on the German performance, and as to whether France, in the event a default is declared, is to have the right to reimpose penalties independently of the other allies. The French take the affirmative and the British the negative side of that question.

Such an agreement, it is evident, leaves good deal of the original controversy undisposed of. It is probably true that the assurance of a first claim to teimbursement will satisfy those who will be called on to lend the \$200,000,000 Germany will need to put the Dawes plan into operation. And if this is true, it is to be regarded as pretty certain that the plan will be put into operation. Hence the dispatches probably do not exaggerate much, if at all, in hailing this agreement as "a long step toward the success of the conference." But if France is to retain the power of independent action which it asserted in taking military control of the Ruhr, it is evident that a danger which has always loomed big to the British imagination is left intact and undiminished.

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

From the days of the Civil war to around 1900 farm land values showed lit-

The war brought higher prices for farm products, crop values increased.

During the prosperity period of the war many farms were bought. During the land boom it is estimated that 10 per cent of the country's fames changed hands. Following the war the collapse in prices of grains and live stock sent land values tumbling for the first time in twenty-five years. Average plow land decreased in value from an average of \$90 per acre in 1920 to \$95 in 1923. Crop values per acre fell from \$36 in 1919 to \$15 in 1921. During the
